### Former director passes away

Edwin T. Henson, age 84, of Xenia, IL passed away at 5:25 a.m. on Sunday, June 9, 2013 at his home in Xenia.

Edwin was born August 26, 1928 in Wayne County, IL to Ralph Cecil and Myrtle Mae (Burgess) Henson. He married Norma Jane Childers on August 15, 1950 in Flora at the United Methodist Church. Edwin was a lifelong farmer and drove a school bus for 21 years.
