ast month you learned about the co-ops plans to upgrade our communications infrastructure in order to begin offering more advanced services. I am happy to announce that the first stage of those upgrades is now underway.

We have begun upgrading our connectivity here in the office. You will note from the photos that we now have a new connection in place with Wabash Telephone Cooperative, Inc. One of the cooperative principles is "Cooperation among Cooperatives" and I firmly believe that Clay Electric should support other cooperatives when it makes good business sense to do so. In this case, not only were we able to adhere to that principle, we were also able to upgrade at the same time

The next steps require some changes in the office. In the near future, we will begin the process of changing our internal servers so that we may fully utilize the new connection. Once that is done, we can then make a few changes in equipment in our substations. After that, we will have a good base upon which to build the new service offerings. You can expect to hear about those offerings in this part of the magazine.

In addition to the upgrades going on physically, we are currently in the process of redesigning our website. Did you know that 55 percent of people now use their cell phone to access the Internet, with nearly 1 billion people globally using a mobile device as their primary connection? Unfortunately, our website just wasn't originally built to work on those devices, so accessing it there is awkward at best. The new design will allow you to view the site on any device you choose so you can find out information about outages, pay your bill or even find contact information for your cooperative.

All of these upgrades are our way of keeping you informed about what is happening here at your cooperative.

I also wanted to let you know about an ongoing campaign to let the EPA know our concerns about the rising costs associated with increasing environmental regulations. You will find information on this call to action on the following page. Affordable and reliable energy is vital to American families and businesses. These new proposed EPA regulations target existing power plants and will increase the cost of electricity. I have heard some estimates say wholesale power costs could double!

Please join us in taking action

Every day we rely on electricity. We depend on the refrigerator to keep our food fresh, air conditioning and heating to keep us comfortable and, of course, lights on a daily basis. We also depend on electricity to re-

The EPA has drafted a regulation that adversely and disproportionately affects electric cooperatives. That's why we are telling the EPA that this regulation simply does not work for us.

When the EPA drafted regulations limiting greenhouse gases from new power plants, the agency received more than five hundred thousand emails opposing the regulation. Today we ask you once again, please join us. Visit www.Action. coop again and tell the EPA you cannot afford these new regulations.

Your voice was heard last time. The EPA took note of electric cooperatives, and our collective voice showed that co-op consumers were
