• Don't overload your electric circuits. Check fuses or circuit breaker panels to see what your home can handle, and stay well within the limits.

• Watch for flickering lights, sparks from appliances or wall outlets, warm plates, plugs, or outlets, and dimming lights or television screens.

• Do not connect more than three light strings sets together. Light strings with screw-in bulbs should have no more than 50 bulbs connected together.

• Make sure there's a bulb in each socket. If a bulb is burned out, leave it until you have a replacement.

• Use only non-combustible and flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel and artificial icicles of plastic and non-leaded metals.

Carefully inspect each decoration before plugging into an outlet. Cracked, frayed, loose or bare wires, and loose connections may cause a serious electric shock or start a fire. Replace damaged items immediately.

• Always unplug an electrical decoration before replacing the light bulbs or fuses.

• Surge protector strips are a safe option if you need more outlets.


• When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant."

• When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.

• Make sure the base is steady so the tree won't tip over easily.

"Merry Christmas and happy New Year!" • To keep your tree fresh, cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better absorption of water. Store the tree outside the house until you're ready to decorate.

• When placing your tree, make sure it is kept away from sources of heat, like fireplaces or heat vents, and out of the way of household traffic.

• Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and a person touching a branch could be electrocuted.

• Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use. To hold lights in place, string them through hooks or insulated staples, not nails or tacks. Never pull or tug lights to remove them.

• Take care when using candles. Keep them away from decorations and the tree. Place them where they cannot be knocked over or reached by children. Do not leave lit candles in an unattended room.

 Make sure your smoke detectors are working properly.

• Don't allow children or pets to play with electrical decorations. Even small light decorations can produce a deadly electric shock if they are misused.

• Turn off all electrical decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

## Light up holiday savings with LEDs

Decorating with lights this holiday season? Consider light-emitting diodes (LEDs). They cost more initially but last twice as long as traditional lights, and you'll recover the difference in three to four years.

 Efficient. LEDs use between 1 kWh and 3 kWh of energy, compared to between 12 kWh and 105 kWh for traditional lights, saving \$11 every holiday season.

 Durable. LEDs last about 4,000 hours. They're also made of plastic and less likely to break.

Don't want to use LEDs? Consider trimming back the number of hours your traditional lights are on to six hours or less each day.
