Operation Round-Up

Donates \$4,350 to Local Organizations

McDonough Power Cooperative Cares recently awarded \$4,350 to three local charities through its Operation Round-Up Program. The charitable organizations that received funding are:

McDonough District Hospital Foundation

Macomb Project H.O.P.E., Inc.
\$500 for their food pantry

Bushnell Fire Protection District
Up to \$1,850 for the purchase of two handheld radios

Interested applicants are required to submit an application to the Operation Round-Up Trustees for



their consideration. Applications are reviewed by the trustees quarterly. In order to qualify for a grant, an organization must be located generally in the area served by McDonough Power Cooperative and provide services within the local communities. Teachers may also apply for grant funds. Applications and further details may be found

under the Community tab at www.mcdonoughpower.com or picked up in the McDonough Power office in Macomb.

These life-changing charitable programs are made possible by the generous members of McDonough Power who voluntarily make the decision each month to "Round-Up" their electric bill up to the next highest dollar; and donating the "extra change" directly to the Operation Round-Up program. One hundred percent (100%) of these funds are then donated back into the community as charitable grants. The average donation a member makes annually is about \$6... mere pennies per month.

Cooperatives participate in Youth Day

Staking is a complex technology that combines both science and art to produce a set of plans and specifications by which a construction crew can build an electrical distribution line that will be safe, reliable, and efficient. After completion, he will become a Certified Staking Technician.

We are prepared for summer storms

Summer is here, school is out and families are gearing up for a few months of fun and relaxation. While summer brings much fun in the sun, it can also bring the occasional severe storm. In the event of a power outage, you can trust that McDonough Power Cooperative is ready to respond.

The major cause of most power outages comes from damage to power lines due to falling trees and branches. We work year round – through right-of-way

clearing – to ensure power lines in our service territory stand little risk of being damaged by trees, branches or other types of vegetation.

Despite our best efforts, during major storms, damage can occur to transmission stations, substations and power lines. When this happens, our first priority is to safely restore power to as many members as possible in the shortest amount of time.

We start by mobilizing our line crews

and other critical staff. Every phone line available is utilized to take your outage report calls. The big problems are handled first – like damage to transmission lines, which serve thousands of people. These problems must be corrected before we can focus on other areas where more localized damage may have occurred.

McDonough Power's line crews inspect substations to determine if the problem starts there, or if there could be an issue down the line. If the root of the problem is at the substation, power can be restored to hundreds of members.

Next, line crews check the service lines that deliver power into neighborhoods and communities. Line crews repair the damaged lines, restoring power to hundreds of people. **5323B9-260B** If you continue to experience an outage, there may be damage to a tap line outside of your home or business. Make sure you notify McDonough Power so crews can inspect these lines.

District 3 – (composed of all Hire, Tennessee, Colchester and the West half of Chalmers Townships in McDonough County and parts of Fountain Green and Hancock Townships in Hancock County): Jan Irish, 1485 N 1200th Rd, Blandinsville and Linda Huston, 12405 E 0th St, Blandinsville.

District 4 – (composed of all Blandinsville, Sciota and Emmett Townships in McDonough County): Jerry Brookhart, 155 Emmy Rd, Macomb.

District 5 – (composed of the East half of Scotland and all of New Salem, Eldorado and Mound Townships in McDonough County and part of Harris, Farmers and Vermont Townships in Fulton County): Ed Coker, 16380 N 1100th Rd, Macomb.

District 6 – (composed of all Macomb, Walnut Grove, Bushnell and Prairie City Townships in McDonough County and part of Lee in Fulton County): Eric Riebling, 19005 E 1300th St, Good Hope.

District 7 – (composed of all Raritan and Media Townships in Henderson County and Point Pleasant, Swan Creek

and Greenbush Townships in Warren County): James Grant, 497 20th Ave, Roseville, and Leroy Tappe, 212 30th St, Roseville.

District 8 – (composed of all Biggsville in Henderson County and Tompkins, Ellison, Roseville, Lenox, Monmouth and Spring Grove Townships in Warren County): Tom Vary, 269 80th Ave, Roseville.

District 9 – (composed of Kelly, Coldbrook, Floyd and Berwick Townships in Warren County and parts of Galesburg, Cedar and Indian Point Townships in Knox County): Marc Hanson, 1347 200th Ave, Monmouth.

The bylaws of the cooperative provide that nominations to the Board of Directors may be made by (1) the Nominating Committee or, (2) a petition signed by 15 or more active members, the petition must be received at the principal office of the cooperative at least 30 days before the annual meeting.

The terms of directors from Districts 1, 3, and 7 expire this year. Directors presently serving on our Board of Directors are: District 1, Michael D. Cox; District 2, Jerry Riggins; District 3, Walter Lewis; District 4, David Lueck; District 5, Steven L. Lynn; District 6, Jeffrey N. Moore; District 7, Steve Hall; District 8, Robert Dwyer; and District 9, Steven Youngquist.

It shall be the duty of the board to appoint, not less than 40 days nor more than one hundred twenty days before the date of a meeting of the members at which board members are to be elected, a committee on nominations consisting of two members from each district in which a director is to be elected and one member from each of the other districts served by the cooperative. No member of the board may serve on such committee. **525HHS52-951A** The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office, at least thirty days before the meeting, a list of nominations for directors, which shall include at least one or more candidates for each board position to be filled by the election.

The secretary shall be responsible for mailing with the notice of the meeting or separately, but at least seven days before the date of the meeting, a statement of the number of board members to be elected and the names and addresses of the candidates nominated by the committee on nominations.

Any fifteen or more members acting together may make other nominations by petition and the secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. Nominations made by petition, in order to be valid, must be received at the principal office of the cooperative at least thirty days before the meeting.

Any nomination by petition which meets the requirements of the bylaws shall set forth in the annual meeting notice as nominations made by petition and any such nominations shall appear on the official ballot.
