It all begins in pringfield on April 21, 2010, during the Illinois Electric and Telephone Cooperative Youth Day where nearly 300 students will visit the State Capitol and spend much of the morning meeting with legislators. You will tour the Supreme Court and spend the afternoon touring local sites. While there, two students will be chosen to represent MEC on the Youth to Washington Tour.

This year marks the 51st trip to the nation's capital and promises to be as exciting as ever. Students learn the principles required to keep cooperative members working together for the cooperative's success by establishing their own "chip and pop" cooperative while on the bus trip.

While in Washington during the week of June 11-18, in addition to meeting with Congressman from Illinois, students are treated to tours of historic sites, given the opportunity to make life-long friends and receive information to help determine career paths

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### **Billing Schedule to Change** Your bill will arrive a week later

Menard Electric will implement a new meter reading and billing schedule with your March bill (containing February's usage). Basically, everything moves a week later; you'll receive your bill a week later and it will be due a week later.

Traditionally, our meters have been read sometime around the 22nd of each month, and members received their bills on or about the first day of the next month. Members then have had until the 21st of that month to pay the bill.

When we had meter readers, we needed quite a few days to read meters, enter readings into our computer, calculate and then print the bills. Now, we read all meters simultaneously through our automated meter reading system.


Essentially that means we can now choose to read all meters on the last day of the month.

But why make this change? Two reasons. The first is that we thought it would be easier for you, our members, to figure out your usage each month. Instead of having part of your usage in one month and part in another, your usage will be measured to coincide with the first and last days of the month.

Secondly, the change will help us to better calculate line loss. Line loss is a term used to describe the difference between the amount of power we purchased from our power supplier and the amount of power we sold to our members. Our power supplier reads our substation meters on the last business day of the month.

By reading our members' meters on approximately the same day each month, we'll be able to accurately calculate if we are losing kilowatt-hours because of an unusual problem with our system.

The date change shouldn't have



a large impact on your bill amount. We've slowly moved our reading date a few days later in the month.

You should be receiving your bill for this month, for electricity you used from December 29th to January 26th approximately. Next month you'll receive your bill about a week later. See below for a quick look at future billing dates.

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## **Upgrades to System and Web Site Planned**

### New technologies to be added through grant

Contract negotiations are complete for the Department of Energy Smart Grid Regional Demonstration Grant to Menard Electric Cooperative (MEC) through the Cooperative Research Network. MEC was one of 17 co-ops to receive a portion of the \$33.9 million grant.

MEC has been granted \$417,000 to fund two projects: adding controlled capacitors to the distribution system, and upgrading our Web site to provide more two-way services to members. The grant requires that MEC match those funds as well as provide the Department of Energy with detailed data about how the new technologies have affected our system and our members.

#### Automatic Capacitors.

During the rest of 2010, our engineering team will work on the planning and designing of the electric system necessary to add the controlled capacitors. Our crews will install them sometime in 2011. We primarily use capacitors to regulate voltage drops and decrease line losses created by the large number of irrigation systems and grain elevators on our distribution system. To tell you exactly what they do would mean a lot of engineering and mathematical formulas concerning volts and currents, square roots and right angle triangles – information that, let's face it, you probably don't really want to know.

Simply put, capacitors help to maintain adequate voltage and decrease line current on the distribution circuits. This reduces line losses, which allows for a greater percentage of power purchased from our wholesale provider to reach our members. Line losses account for 6-7 percent of the power we purchase from our wholesale power supplier. A decrease of even 1 percent of these losses would represent a savings of more than \$100,000 per year.

Currently we turn the fixed capacitors on our system on in the spring and off in the fall. But irrigation systems don't run continuously all summer – sometimes it does actually rain when we need it to ... sometimes. When the irrigations aren't running, the fixed capacitors can actually create a negative effect on line voltage and line losses. Controlled capacitors can react to the load on each circuit and will only run when they are needed. And as an added benefit, we won't have to send out linemen each spring and fall to manually switch on or off each and every one.

The new capacitors will replace some of the fixed ones on our system and supply us a number of additional units. It's a big chunk of our grant money, approximately 75 percent.

Because the new capacitors are expensive, paying the total cost ourselves has been cost prohibitive – we wouldn't save enough to make it worthwhile. But thanks to the grant, we'll be able to install these capacitors and save both time and money.



#### Web Site Improvements.

The second project MEC will implement involves the Web site. Hopefully, you've visited our new Web site, which went online in November. We will be adding additional features to the site in late 2010 or early 2011.

Adding some new technology to our current computer information system, we will have a secure feature allowing you to view your billing and usage history and even securely pay your bill online. It will also eliminate some re-entry on our end, by automatically updating our system when you pay.

Working with our automatic meter reading system, we'll have the means to allow you to easily view online how your electricity usage changes throughout the day, the month or across several months. You might be surprised how much electricity your home is using at 2 a.m. when everyone is asleep!

Another new feature will allow our members to see current real-time energy prices. You can see how much the electricity you're using right now is costing out on the electric grid. This will allow us to possibly look at different rate structures in the future for members who may wish to track that information and adjust their usage accordingly.

We expect to take approximately four years to complete both large projects. We'll keep you informed of our progress. MEC will add automatic capacitors to reduce line loss and incorporate usage history and automatic bill pay into the Web site.

### **Long-Time Employee Terry Entwistle Retires**

Terry Entwistle, Manager of Operations for Menard Electric, will retire at the end of this month after more than 39 years of service.

Terry is well known at the co-op for his exceptional memory. He seems to know every pole on this system. If there was ever a question of what had been done at a location, chances are Terry would be able to tell you. And if you needed to find something or someone, he could tell you that, too. That experience and knowledge will be missed at the co-op.

Chances are you've seen Terry at an annual meeting, handing out prizes or perhaps at your property working on a line. Mostly though he works behind the scenes, coordinating the line crews to make sure repair and maintenance work on the lines is completed quickly and safely. During storm outages you can find Terry busily coordinating all the line

#### FOLLOW THESE TIPS FROM YOUR ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE TO STAY SAFE:

- Assume all power lines are energized and dangerous. Even lines that are de-energized could become energized at any time.
- Never touch a downed power line! And never touch a person or object that is touching a power line.
- If someone is injured as a result of contact with electric current, do not try to assist him or her. You could be injured or killed. Call 911.
- If a power line falls across your vehicle while you are in it, stay inside until help arrives.
- Call 911 immediately to report a downed power line. Then call your electric cooperative.

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# **Board Meeting Report**

The monthly Board Meeting of the Board of Directors of Menard Electric Cooperative was called to order by President Gary L. Martin at 6 p.m. at the headquarters of the cooperative, 14300 State Highway 97, Petersburg, County of Menard and State of Illinois.

On roll call the following Directors were present: Jerry W. Brooks, Michael L. Carls, D. Jay Frye, Warren D. Goetsch, Gary L. Martin, Donald E. McMillan, Michael E. Patrick, Roy H. Seaney and Steven L. Worner. Also present was Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith.

President Martin reviewed the Consensus Agenda. It was moved and seconded that the Consensus Agenda be approved. Motion carried.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month of October 2009. He reviewed the Balance Sheet, Budget, as well as the Outage Summary and Safety Report.

Under the Operations Report, Manager Frasco reported on the work done by the cooperative crews for the month.

He advised that there had been no response to the cooperative's Smart Grid Grant Application. He advised that there was a Co-Bank regional customer meeting scheduled for March 29-30, 2010. He suggested that Board members might wish to attend that meeting.

Manager Frasco advised that he had received a request from Viper Mine employees asking that the cooperative send a letter to Congressional Representatives inquiring as to why the Mine Safety Health Administration had changed its protocol in dealing with mine safety issues.

Manager Frasco advised that he had received correspondence from the Mayor of the Village of Mechanicsburg advising that the Village had increased its utility tax from 3% to 5%, effective January 1, 2010. Manager Frasco advised that such would affect approximately 18 cooperative members, who reside in the corporate limits of the Village.

He reported on the results of the Safety Accreditation Inspection and advised that Menard had passed and received a score of 91, which was higher than last accreditation score. It was moved and seconded that the Manager's Report be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Manager Frasco presented the Financial Report for the month of October. Year to date margins were \$1,294,355 compared to \$1,532,132 a year earlier. Equity as of the end of October was 34.73% and the number of members served was 10,519 compared to 10,484 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of October was \$35,373,683 compared to \$34,177,515 last year. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of the RUS, FFB and NRUCFC.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities.

Director Carls reported on Prairie Power, Inc., and the Board meeting held November 4, 2009. He reviewed the October energy charge.

Manager Frasco discussed his proposed recommendations for

changes to the Menard's Health Savings Account Plan. It was moved and seconded that the Cooperative adopt the recommended changes to the Health Savings Account Plan, as presented by Manager Frasco. Mo-

Manager Frasco reviewed a summary of the proposed 2010 Financial Budget.

The Board reviewed, for second reading, the Policy entitled Section V- "Computer, Network, E-mail & Internet Use." It was moved and seconded that the policy be adopted. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed revisions to the Policy Section IV - "Billing and Terms of Payment." It was the consensus of the Board to move this to second reading for approval at next month's meeting.

The Board reviewed a new policy - Section V - "ARC Rated Apparel & Personal Protective Equipment." It was the consensus of the Board to move this to second reading for approval at next month's meeting.

Manager Frasco discussed who would be attending the NRECA Annual Meeting scheduled for February 15-17, 2010, in Atlanta, Georgia.

Manager Frasco reviewed the Capital Credit Estate Refunds Report.

President Martin advised that next month's Board Meeting was scheduled for December 22, 2009, at 6 p.m.
