Aiding Corn Belt Energy

Apprentice Lineman Stormy Hild, Area Serviceman Seth Parker, Leadman Jeremy Willis and Lineman Jason Beggs traveled to the Princeton area Dec. 28 to aid an Illinois electric cooperative, Corn Belt Energy, as it sought to rebuild the damage to its system caused by ice and high winds.

The co-op reported more than 130 broken poles, along with other damage that caused widespread outages for its members.

First on the scene

The same storm system that caused Corn Belt's ice, brought flooding here. During troubled times like power outages and storms our linemen do whatever they can to aid our members; it's no surprise that this sense of duty carries over to coming to the aid of others any way they can.

Because our service territory is made up of rural roads and secluded areas, our crews can be the first to arrive at an accident scene. This is just what happened when Groundman/ Mechanic Michael Justice discovered a delivery truck overturned in a field along a water-filled roadway. Upon investigation Michael discovered the driver of the vehicle was trapped inside. He was able to pry open the door and lift the man out, staying with him until other help arrived.

Our linemen worked for four days alongside Corn Belt employees, linemen from other co-ops, and contract crews. Our line-

He then worked through our apprenticeship program to become a Lineman before moving to Crew Leader and a few years ago to Assistant General Foreman. He has worked to fill in as General Foreman as needed, but says working outside with the crews is the part of the job he always enjoyed the most.

Randy has the most experience of anyone in our Operations Department. He's seen a lot of changes in 40 years. "The men have always been good workers. That hasn't changed. It's the equipment we have available that's been the biggest change. It's a little easier on the body now; not that we don't still work hard! It used to be we had to hand tamp all of the poles. My gosh, we did a lot more shoveling back then compared to now," he says.

When Randy started there were no bucket trucks or hydraulic tools, and the co-op had to rely on subcontractors more to bring in equipment. "The equipment we have now makes the job easier and faster and enables us to perform maintenance without disconnecting power to our members. People often don't realize how much work we do on an everyday basis that is maintenance work. We don't have to take them offline to do that now like we used to," he says.

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Board Meeting Report

Present were Manager Eric Hobbie, Attorney Charles Smith, Manager of Accounting & Information Systems Chris Hinton and Directors Jay Frye, Jerry Brooks, Warren Goetsch, Gary Martin, Donald McMillan, Michael Patrick, Roy Seaney and Jodine Tate. Director Steve Worner was absent.

Hinton and Hobbie reviewed the proposed 2016 financial budget summary and discussed options with the Board. They discussed Prairie Power, Inc. deferred revenue options for 2015 and 2016. The Board approved that the cooperative proceed with the revenue deferral at the \$1.00 level for 2015. Hobbie advised staff would review 2016 further and report back at the next meeting.

Hobbie presented the Manager's report. Hobbie reported on the status of delinquent State of Illinois accounts totaling \$87,962.56, and discussed what action, if any, was being taken by other cooperatives.

Hobbie presented the financial report for the month of October. Year to date margins were \$2,228,928 compared to \$2,063,798 a year earlier. Equity as of the end of October was 38.71% and the number of member accounts served was 10,824 compared to 10,766 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of October was \$43,958,360 compared to \$42,855,308 last year. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of the RUS, FFB and NRUCFC.

Board went into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

Director Goetsch discussed AIEC guidelines for State of Illinois delinquent accounts.

He also discussed the AIEC Bolivia project (an international program sponsored by the AIEC). The Board voted to follow his recommendation to donate \$5,000 to the project.

Director Martin discussed PPI solar energy options.
