## Board of Directors - Question/Answer




Richard Liefer is retired from a life-long farming operation. He now enjoys spending time with his precious grandchildren and being the family handyman.

How much time on average do directors dedicate each month to serve their cooperative? What does this time include?

Directors must be willing to attend the regularly scheduled monthly board meetings. As a general rule, most of these meetings are completed in the vicinity of three to four hours. On occasion, special board *meetings* are held but are usually much shorter in nature. Four members of the board are also elected to represent MCEC on related boards. This involves an extra one to two meetings per month.

Board policy *requires* all directors become certified by *completing a series of* five one-day courses offered by our national association. Completion is expected by the end of one's second three-year term. Normally each of these classes last six to eight hours and involves a one-day trip to and from Springfield.

All directors are also encouraged to attend other annual local, state and national electric co-op meetings. The time commitment associated with these range from a same day meeting to three nights away from home on the national level.




Richard Neff owns and operates a farm, growing corn and soybeans. He also has a hog finishing enterprise.
