Avoid a holiday decorating disaster

Pew traditions are as unique to the holidays as decorating our homes and yards with twinkling lights and festive decorations. While these displays add to the magic of the season, they also increase our risks for holiday fires and injuries. So follow these steps to ensure that your traditions result in a safe, bright, and happy time for your family.

- Carefully inspect each electrical decoration and extension cord before use, and discard any damaged items. Cracked sockets, bare or frayed wires, and loose connections may cause a serious shock or fire. Avoid overloading outlets, which can overheat and also cause a fire.
- The Electrical Safety Foundation International recommends never connecting more than three strands of incandescent lights together. Do not pinch cords





in windows or doors, or under heavy furniture.

 When decorating outside, make sure outdoor outlets are equipped with ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs).
Check that all items and extension cords are marked for outdoor use. And exercise extreme caution when decorating near overhead power lines. Use a

- wooden or fiberglass ladder instead of metal. Keep yourself and all of your equipment at least 10 feet from power lines.
- Take special care with Christmas trees. If purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. Heated rooms dry out live trees —even fresh ones rapidly. Place the tree at least 3 feet away from all heat sources, including fireplaces and space heaters. Be sure to keep the stand filled with water. For artificial trees, look for the label "fire resistant."
- Decorate your tree, live or artificial, with non-combustible or flame-resistant materials.
 Never use burning candles on or near your tree.

Whether your house is the most festive on the block or you prefer a more low-key style, make safety an important part of your holiday preparations.

2013 Thomas H. Moore IEC Memorial Scholarship Program

he AIEC Board of Directors in 1994 voted to establish an Illinois Electric Cooperatives (IEC) Memorial Scholarship Fund. The Fund is designed to financially assist deserving students in the "electric cooperative family," while also providing a means for co-ops and individuals to honor deceased members of the co-op family through memorial gifts. The "driving force" behind the fund's creation was Thomas H. Moore, Executive Vice President and General Manager of the AIEC from 1961 to 1994. The AIEC Board voted to rename the scholarship program to honor Mr. Moore following his passing in 2008.

The scholarship program prospered under the leadership of Earl W. Struck, who succeeded Mr. Moore and served as President/ CEO of the AIEC from 1994 to 2006. Mr. Struck passed away in August 2007. The AIEC Board of Directors that month voted to honor Mr. Struck's memory by naming the annual scholarship awarded to the son or daughter of an electric cooperative employee or director the "Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship." Mr. Struck was born and raised in Murphysboro and was active in the 4H program during his youth. His parents were long time members of Egyptian Electric Cooperative.

The Illinois Community College System Foundation (ICCSF) administers the Thomas H. Moore IEC Memorial Scholarship Fund. Eight scholarships a year are awarded.

Four scholarships a year are awarded to students who are the sons or daughters of an Illinois



electric cooperative member. An additional scholarship (the Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship) is awarded to a student who is the son or daughter of an Illinois electric cooperative employee or director. These five scholarships can be used at any two-year or four-year accredited college or university in the United States, including vocational/technical schools. The sixth and seventh scholarships are awarded for use at an Illinois community college, and sons and daughters of Illinois electric cooperative members, employees and directors are all eligible.

The above seven scholarships are for \$1,500 each and are not renewable. Applicants must be high school seniors and apply through their local electric cooperative. The deadline for submitting completed applications to the local electric cooperative is January 1 of each year.

The eighth annual scholarship, the "LaVern and Nola McEntire Line

worker's Scholarship," was awarded for the first time in 2011. This \$1,500 scholarship will help pay for costs to attend the line worker's school conducted by the AIEC in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College in Springfield, Ill. LaVern McEntire served as a lineman for McDonough Power Electric Cooperative from 1949 until 1991. He and his wife, Nola, helped to endow and establish the new scholarship to financially assist deserving individuals in becoming trained line workers.

Cooperative members and their children, relatives of co-op employees or directors are eligible for the line worker's scholarship, as are individuals who have served or are serving in the armed forces or National Guard.
