We are proud members of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) that is working through their affiliate, NRECA International, and the NRECA International Foundation to help bring power to people in developing countries like Haiti and Liberia. - 3 scholarships are reserved for students enrolling full-time at a two-year Illinois community college who are the sons or daughters of Illinois electric cooperative members, employees or directors.
- scholarship, the Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship, is awarded to a student who is the son or daughter of an Illinois electric cooperative employee or director.
- scholarship, the LaVern and Nola McEntire Lineworker's Scholarship, is awarded to a student to attend the lineworker's school conducted by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College, Springfield, IL.

Fireplace FACTS VS.

FICTION: My fireplace will cut down on my winter heating bills.

FACTS: Using a fireplace can increase your home heating costs. Heat from a fire is generally confined to the area near your fireplace, making it an inefficient way to heat your home overall. And warm air inside your home is channeled up the chimney, so incoming cold air must be heated by your central heating system. If you prefer to heat your home with wood, think about a wood-burning stove. Newer models are more energy efficient and burn more cleanly than their predecessors.

If you're mainly looking for a nostalgic mood from your living room fireplace, sealed-combustion gas fireplaces use outside air instead of drawing air from inside the home. Electric fireplaces also offer very realistic effects, and can be operated with or without an electric heater for comfort control.
