

**Geothermal Open House**

Experts from Norris Electric Co-op, R & H Heating, Cooling, Electrical, and Plumbing, and GeoComfort Geothermal Systems will be on location to guide you through a complete working system and explain why the EPA recognizes geothermal as the most efficient heating and cooling source for your home, shop, or business.

The Open House will held Saturday, September 15th at the Dan Roedl family residence (5335 E. 900th Avenue) just south of Altamont from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. The Roedls are in the process of finishing up a new home construction where they used the following participating contractors:

The Roedl residence with over 2,600 sq ft will heat and cool at an average monthly cost of \$58.

"Anyone even remotely interested in lowering their utility bill will benefit from attending our Open House," says Tim Bohnhoff, Member Services Coordinator at Norris Electric Cooperative. "Whether a member is looking to lower their utility bills by retrofitting their existing home, shop, or business's current heating and cooling system or they are considering building in the near future."

Norris Electric Co-op has partnered with R & H Plumbing, Heating, Electrical of Altamont, IL on the project. "Dan is building a unique style single level home that is equipped with a GeoComfort four ton, two stage water to air heat pump" said Phil Schultz from R & H. "Of the four loop types we decided to use a horizontal style system. At the Open House we will have pictures of the loop installation process." Come and see, you will be glad you did.

## Let the light shine in: Safe lighting in the workplace

Proper light in the workplace is more than a matter of standing on a chair and shouting, "Let there be light!" Too little light, or too much, or the wrong kind, can be a safety hazard for your workforce, causing eyestrain, headaches, and physical injury (if people can't see obstacles clearly, for example). Take an illuminating look at these good lighting guidelines:

- Look around. Check your workplace often for light bulbs that need replacing and any areas that need increased visibility.
- **Keep it clean.** Dust off your lighting fixtures so their illumination doesn't get blocked.
- Lighten up surrounding areas. Walls should be painted or papered in light tones that reflect light easily but don't produce glare.
- **Mix it up.** Provide a combination of natural light that's healthy and easy on the eyes, and artificial light that can be easily controlled by employees for their needs.
- Shade employees' eyes. Outfit windows with shades and blinds so

employees can adjust the amount of natural light that falls across their workspaces.

- **Shift as necessary.** Employees shouldn't face a light source or window directly (where glare can be distracting and damaging) or sit with their backs to the light (casting shadows across their work). Position computers, desks, and people at right angles to light sources for safety and quality.
- **Suit the light to the task.** Task lighting can provide the illumination needed for detail work. Give employees lamps and other options so they can get the light they need.



# **Planting a Tree?**

while trees clean our air, provide shade and beauty, and make our yards and homes more comfortable, planting them is complicated and must be thoughtfully planned out.

Where you plant your tree is very important. When planting your tree, you may be tempted to plant where the tree would look the best or provide the most shade, but that could be a mistake. Not only could you damage an underground utility line when you plant it, but as your tree matures its roots may grow into your utility lines and disrupt your service, requiring you to remove what you've planted. Or, a tree planted too close to your home

could damage your foundation. Smart digging is no accident: always call 811 before you dig.

Know the growth habits of the tree you are planting, and how its roots will grow when mature. For instance, the root systems of willow trees are particularly aggressive and should be planted well away from any underground impediment. Think above you too...make sure your new tree will not grow tall enough to interfere with overhead lines either.

All states require those who plan on digging to call ahead to get their utility lines marked before digging, and while your desired spot might make a great location for a swing, it may be directly above an underground utility line. By calling 811 a few days before you dig, you'll make sure your tree will provide all the benefits you want while still protecting your property and family. One easy phone call to 811 gets your underground utility lines marked for free.

Remember, know what's below. Always call before you dig.


### Not watching your credit rating.
