Look up for hazards during harvest

After working in a field on a neighbor's farm, Jim Flach parked his equipment and stepped out of the vehicle. Sadly, Jim did not realize his equipment was touching an overhead power line, and he became a path for the electrical current as he placed his foot onto the ground. Jim received a severe electric shock that ultimately resulted in his death a few months later. Safe Electricity urges farmers to take the proper precautions when working around power lines.

"The rush to harvest can lead to farmers working long days with little sleep," cautions Kyla Kruse, communications director of the Energy Education Council and its Safe Electricity program. "It is important to take time for safety. Before starting work, make sure to note the location of overhead power lines."

To stay safe around overhead power lines, Safe Electricity urges farm operators and workers to:

- Use a spotter when operating large machinery near power lines.

- Use care when raising augers or the bed of grain trucks around power lines.
- Keep equipment at least 10 feet from power lines — at all times, in all directions.
- Inspect the height of farm equipment to determine clearance.
- Always remember to lower extensions when moving loads.
- Never attempt to move a power line out of the way or raise it for clearance.
- If a power line is sagging or low, call Norris Electric Cooperative (877-783-8765).

If contact is made with a power line, stay on the equipment. Make sure to warn others to stay away, and call 911. Do not leave until the utility crew says it is safe to do so. The only reason to exit is if the equipment is on fire. If this is the case, jump off the equipment with your feet together, without touching the ground and vehicle at the same time. Then, still keeping your feet

together, hop to safety as you leave the area.

Some additional safety tips from Safe Electricity include:

- Do not use metal poles when breaking up bridged grain inside and around grain bins.
- Always hire qualified electricians for any electrical issues.
- Do not use equipment with frayed cables.

"You need to double check, even triple check, to see what is above you," says Marilyn Flach, Jim's widow. His son Brett adds, "Be conscious of your surroundings. You need to keep your eyes open and beware of overhead lines."

Utility pole inspection

Norris Electric has contracted pole inspections in the Birds, Lawrenceville, Bridgeport, Flat Rock, Robinson Correctional, Kedron and West Liberty areas. This work will be performed by contractors, not by Norris Electric Cooperative employees. The contracting company is Lee Inspection & Consulting Services. They will have Lee Inspection signs and Contractor for Norris Electric signs on their vehicles. This inspection started in August and will finish in December.

You, as a member can help with this process. Please make sure all poles on your property do not have anything attached to them. Satellite dishes, bird houses, rain gauges,

posting signs, hanging banners or tying ribbons and balloons onto utility poles can endanger our linemen and is a violation of local ordinances forbidding placement of anything on poles. Help protect our linemen when they are working on your service. Remember that anything on a pole can cause our linemen to slip. The clamped, safety boots worn to climb poles are especially vulnerable to becoming snagged and caught on staples and nails embedded in poles. Foreign objects can also tear clothing or injure a lineman despite the safety gear they wear to avoid contact with rough surfaces. Please help us to work safely and refrain from hanging objects on utility poles!

This work will be performed by contractors, not by Norris Electric Cooperative employees. The contracting company is HD Supply. They will be driving White Ford Vans with HD Supply signs and Contractor for Norris Electric Cooperative signs. In most cases, installation of the new electric meter is simple, requiring a brief, five minute interruption to your electric service. You do not need to be present when the meter is changed.
