#### 2014 rate increase

Torris Electric is committed to delivering quality, reliable power at the lowest possible cost. To maintain the quality, reliability and long term financial stability of the cooperative it is necessary for us to adjust our pricing structure again in 2014. This increase is based on numerous factors, the largest of which is purchased power. Norris Electric's rates remain very competitive with other utilities on an average basis, generally lower than those of other utilities serving Illinois residents.

To lessen the impact of the rate increase to you, our members, the Board of Directors approved a stepped plan increase over a three year period beginning in 2012. Your January 2014 bill will reflect the third step of these adjustments. A typical residence using 1000 kWh per month will see an increase in

their bill from \$120.50 to \$136.00 in 2014, an increase of \$15.50 per month. Other residential kWh usage increases are below:

Please keep in mind this is the third of a three year rate increase plan. Smaller increases may be needed in the future to maintain long term financial stability. A cost of service study including a rate design was performed in 2013 to ensure that our rate structure is balanced to be fair to all members.

While rate adjustments are never easy, we must ask you as members of the Co-op to share in these costs. Maintaining dependable service at

the most affordable price possible remains the cornerstone of our business. To accomplish the goal, we must also protect the integrity and the long term financial stability of the cooperative.

#### **Board of Director election update**

There are three board seats up for election with one board member to be elected from each of the following counties: Richland, Lawrence and Wabash. Shown below are the counties and the incumbents from those counties that are slated for election this year.

County	Incumbent
Richland	Dean Dietrich
Lawrence	Ron Viehman
Wabash	Larry Seals (Retiring)

All of the incumbents except Larry Seals of Wabash County intend to seek re-election. They must submit a petition signed by at least 25 members to be placed on the ballot. Any other members that reside and take service in any of the counties above may also submit a petition and be placed on the ballot.

Petitions are available now. Members wishing to obtain petitions may call the office and one will be mailed or members may stop at the office and obtain a petition in person. Completed petitions must be in the cooperative headquarters by noon on December 11, 2013.

Petitioners with qualified petitions will be placed on the ballots. Ballots may be voted by return mail or by internet as instructed on the ballots. The results will then be announced at our annual meeting to be held on February 8, 2014.

## **Director's responsibilities**

ccording to information compiled by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) in Washington, D.C. a director's responsibility consists of having the ability and knowledge to set policy and approve programs that are the basis for operating the cooperative. A director must have the time to attend monthly board meeting, other special meetings, and seminars. These special sessions are necessary to keep directors informed on the various aspects of the cooperative and the electric utility industry. Other criteria of a board member as identified by NRECA include:

- Be an independent thinker, but also a cooperator
- Be capable of acquiring the knowledge necessary to cope with the issues of a modern electric utility, including finances, management and public issues
- Possess the character and demeanor that will reflect favorable on behalf of the cooperative

- Have the willingness to listen and learn
- Be one who can accept and direct change
- Be of sufficient stature to command the respect of management, employees, fellow board members, cooperative members and the public
- Be willing to commit adequate time to the work of the board to be an effective member and properly discharge the duties of the board
- Subordinate personal and other business interests to the needs of the cooperative when making a decision
- Be willing to accept the unpleasant moments of a director's experience
- Let management manage

#### What the board does and does not do

■ The board does not oversee Norris Electric Cooperative's

- day-to-day operation. Directors establish policies and point the cooperative in the direction they want employees to follow. The employees decide the best way to get the job done.
- Directors aren't required to be walking encyclopedias about electric utilities when they are elected. But it is their job to become knowledgeable about issues facing Norris Electric so they can make intelligent decisions.
- Directors must be accessible to the members they represent. While it helps to be sympathetic to the needs of the members, the director must keep the best interest of the entire cooperative in mind.
- It is expected that each director will be able to attend most regular board meetings and any special meetings that come up from time to time.
