More Power to You Another Successful Year at Rock Energy

s a member of Rock Energy Cooperative, you are a part of something big. When the trade magazine *Intelligent Utility* recently polled utility experts to see what they consider to be one of the biggest power breakthroughs in the past 100 years, rural electrification was near the top of the list. Today, nearly every corner of this country has access to electricity. The movement began nearly 80 years ago when President Franklin D. Roosevelt created the Rural Electrification Administration. We are extremely proud at Rock Energy that we can play a small part in such a significant breakthrough.

That was one of the pieces of information I shared with about 625 co-op members, guests, and employees who attended Rock Energy's 79th Annual Meeting on Monday, March 30, at the Eclipse Center in Beloit. Our annual meeting is always scheduled for a Monday evening in late March or early April. We're glad that we picked March 30 since there was a spring snowstorm the previous Monday and the Badgers played in the Final Four championship game the next Monday. We are either very good planners or incredibly lucky.

In my remarks, I told members that the co-op is in terrific shape. We provide natural gas and electric service to nearly 27,000 meters. Operationally, we continue to invest in our infrastructure to ensure that we can provide you with extremely reliable service. In fact, we recently reached \$100 million in utility assets, up from \$17 million when I came to the co-op 15 years ago.

The electric utility system in North America is recognized as the single most complex machine ever built. While it is one of the most complex, it also is one of the most reliable, especially when you consider all the interconnections between the various grid participants. Our industry has seen many changes through the years, and I'm certain many more are ahead. As I enter my 30th year working for co-ops, I want us to make sure that the actions taken today will allow the largest, most complex machine ever built to provide reliable and affordable energy long into the future.

To illustrate my point about the complexity of our business, I showed some video clips during the meeting

that received some laughs from members. The videos were produced by E Source, a utility research and advisory company, in a format similar to Jay Leno's Jaywalking segments where random people are asked what appear to be simple questions.

In the first video, producer Bill LeBlanc asked: "What exactly is electricity?" Most people stuttered and stammered before admitting that they really didn't know. One woman said that electricity gets to her house through the electric plugs. It was obvious that people really didn't care that they couldn't define electricity as long as it was there when they needed it.

Another video asked: "What's the difference between a kilowatt-hour and kilowatt?" A few people were on the right track with their answers, but most didn't have a clue. The third video asked: "What does a pound of carbon weigh?"

In case you're wondering, a kilowatt is a unit of electrical power equal to 1,000 watts, and a kilowatthour is the basic measure of energy use. For example, a 100-watt light bulb burning for 10 hours uses 1 kilowatthour. The third question is a tricky one, because the answer can be found in the question. A pound of anything weighs a pound.




