

Rock Energy Cooperative



ennis Conerton started his volunteer work with Beloit's Minor League Baseball team in 1990 when he was working full time. Now, 25 years later, he is retired, president of the team's board of directors, and still works some 12-hour days.

"I'm working as hard as I did before I retired," Conerton said with a smile.

When the Beloit Snappers are in town during baseball season, he is busy at Telfer Park's Pohlman Field. Things are less hectic when the team is on the road and slow down even more during the off-season, but the president's position is definitely a hands-on one.

Conerton has been a member of Rock Energy Cooperative since 1978, when he moved to rural Boone County from Milwaukee. He initially was skeptical that a cooperative would be supplying electricity to his home, but now he wouldn't have it any other way. In fact, when he later moved to the Villas of Oakfield in South Beloit, he was concerned that the co-op might no longer be his energy provider. But he was relieved to learn that he still lives on co-op lines.

Conerton said he not only appreciates the reliable service that Rock Energy provides, but he also likes that members have a financial interest in the co-op. "The service is as good, and with the co-op there's a sense of ownership with the capital credits," he said.

The similarities between Rock Energy and the Beloit Snappers are apparent, Conerton said. Both are

not-for-profit organizations that exist to serve the community, not to make money. "We put everything back into improvements," he said of the Snappers.

That not-for-profit connection perhaps is responsible for the link between the two groups growing stronger over the years. In 2002 Rock Energy sponsored its first Family Night at the Ballpark with discounted ticket prices, food specials for members, and a fantastic fireworks display after the game.

Shane Larson, the co-op's chief executive officer, recalled that the event was started as a way to bring families together for a fun summer evening. Fourteen years later, the event is as strong as ever and continues to be a favorite among co-op members.

"I've said it before, and I'll say it again, there's something special about watching a Snapper game at Telfer Park in Beloit," Larson said. "The facilities aren't quite major league, but neither are the prices.

baseball was played for the game and not the millions in guaranteed contracts permeates throughout the park.

"Mix together a handful of hokey between-inning contests, a dancing turtle mascot, a bunch of ball players who are younger than some of my neckties, two hot dogs, a bag of peanuts, and one enthusiastic 50/50 raffle guy, you definitely have a recipe for a fun evening at the ballpark."

That sense of community is exactly what Conerton likes about Minor League Baseball in general and the Beloit Snappers in particular. The backbone of the Snappers is its network of volunteers from the community, he said.

"We couldn't do it without the volunteers," Conerton said. "We have seven full-time employees, 25 to 30 game-day employees, and 130 to 140 volunteers. We figure that about \$40,000 a year in hourly wages is saved by having the volunteers."

The volunteers not only staff the concession stands, take tickets at the gate, serve as ushers, and work in the information booth on game days, but they also open up their homes and hearts to players by serving as host families during the season. Volunteers also have spearheaded many improvements at the ballpark, Conerton said. An indoor batting cage facility was built this spring using all volunteer labor. "It was like an old-fashioned barn raising," he said.

Conerton's favorite Snappers memory occurred in 1995 when the team won the Midwest League Championship. After the game in Battle Creek, Mich., champagne was flowing and players were all checking their ring sizes so they could order their championship rings.

"I remember coming back to Beloit," he said. "The TV cameras were here. We arrived back at 3 a.m., and the crowds were waiting to welcome the team home. That team was one of the best I've ever seen."

Conerton has appreciated Rock Energy's support over the past 14 years. "It's been great from the Snappers' standpoint," he said. "Rock Energy Night is always one of our biggest nights of the year attendance-wise."

In addition to the annual night at the ballpark, Rock Energy also partners with the Snappers to sell discounted tickets to co-op members. The popularity of that

member perk has grown through the years. In the first few years of the promotion, co-op members bought about 500 tickets each season. That number has jumped to more than 2,000 during the 2014 season.

Conerton started his volunteer work in the community as an employee of Regal Beloit when a co-worker asked if he wanted to help out the organization known as the Beloit Brewers at the time. Through his years working at Regal Beloit and later

at Blackhawk Bank, Conerton has given many volunteer hours to various organizations, including United Way, Junior Achievement, Hands of Faith, and Beloit Health System Foundation.

"You do what you can for the community," said Conerton, who retired as president of Beloit's Blackhawk Bank in 2001. "That's what makes Beloit unique."

Volunteers like Conerton who give freely of their time and talent are truly a treasure to the groups they serve. If you see him at the ballpark or around town, take a moment to introduce yourself and thank him for all he does to make our community such a special place to call home.
