

Biofuels And America's Energy Independence Illinois will have large role in the nation's energy future Illinois is the second largest producer of farm based. Imilians of gallons per year. And people 50 percent

Illinois is the second largest producer of farm-based fuels, such as ethanol and biodiesel, in the United States. As the nation begins to rely more heavily on renewable sources for its energy future, Illinois will be at the center of this movement, greatly contributing to the economic growth and national influence of the state's farmers and rural communities.

According to the U.S. Government's Energy Information Administration, the United States imports approximately 69,000 barrels of crude oil a month from the Persian Gulf. When we invaded Iraq in 2003, Americans, among many concerns, once again feared for the nation's energy security. This fear was felt in real terms at the pump when the price of gasoline drastically increased after the invasion, and again after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita temporarily disrupted production in refineries off the Gulf Coast.

As difficult as these price hikes were on the individual American, they forced all of us to review our energy policies, and as a nation we began to look toward alternative fuels as a solution to our problems. This was evidenced in President Bush's 2006 State of the Union Address, in which he outlined his Advanced Energy Initiative. This initiative provided for a 22 percent increase in clean-energy research at the Department of Energy (DOE) and aimed to replace more than 75 percent

of our oil imports from the Middle East by 2025.

Since 2001, we have spent nearly \$10 billion in this country to develop cleaner, cheaper and more reliable alternative energy sources. From this effort, in Illinois alone, a half-dozen ethanol plants have been built, most of them located

outside small, rural towns. These ethanol plants in Illinois and elsewhere now produce 40 percent of the ethanol consumed in the United States. Investment by the ethanol industry in Illinois has exceeded \$1 billion and has generated 800 jobs in plant operations and 4,000 jobs in the industry-related service sector. Additionally, Illinois now leads the nation in biodiesel consumption, with more than 6,000 vehicles running on B20, amounting to

millions of gallons per year. And, nearly 50 percent of Illinois farmers use biodiesel in their operations.

Thanks to increased investment and President Bush's support, we are on the verge of a major breakthrough in the alternative fuels market. The industry just needs real commitment from our policymakers to provide the resources necessary to push biofuels to center stage.

I am proud to say there are efforts underway in Congress to do just that. The Congressional Biofuels Caucus, of which I was co-chair, has continuously fought for a Renewable Fuels Standard (RFS) to create a nationwide paradigm for the use of domestically-produced renewable fuels. We achieved success on this front when the Energy Policy Act was signed into law last year, mandating that production of ethanol reach 8 billion gallons by the year 2012. Economists predict that the Energy Policy Act's RFS will have a significant impact on both the farm economy and our national economy. We will see a reduction in crude oil imports by two billion barrels per year and a reduction in the outflow of dollars to foreign oil producers by \$64 billion. In addition, the RFS will create 234,840 new jobs, increase U.S. household income by \$43 billion, and add \$200 billion to our GDP between now and 2012. It will also lead to the investment of another \$6 billion in renewable fuel production facilities.

We cannot underestimate the importance of renewable energy and its potential benefit to the United States. The use of renewable fuels will give a much needed boost to our farm economy while making our air cleaner and breaking our ties to foreign oil. In the near future the majority of our nation's energy supplies will come from biofuels, and Illinois farmers stand ready to contribute to America's energy security and independence.

Lane Evans was U.S. Representative of Illinois' 17th Congressional District from 1983 until his retirement this past year. He supported issues important to electric co-ops such as renewable energy financing and was the recipient of the Illinois Electric Cooperative Public Service Award in 1995. Evans was also very supportive of the co-ops' Youth To Washington program for many years.



Waste-To-Energy Projects Gain Momentum

A large number of projects are now underway throughout the United States to convert waste

into electricity. Most projects are using methane generated either by landfills or by anaerobic digesters, devices that use anaerobic bacteria to break down manure and other organic substances.

Landfill gas-to-energy efforts are progressing in Alabama, California, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Indiana. Wabash Valley Power Association, Indianapolis, Ind., has aggressively been working on landfill gas energy projects as part of its

EnviroWatts® program. Working closely with Waste Management of Indiana the G&T has developed seven landfill gas projects totaling

22.4 mw. Wabash Valley Power supplies wholesale power to four Illinois electric co-ops.

Tim Franklin, Manager-Gas Recovery for Waste Management, says, "These plants not only provide an economic boost to the local economy, but also allow Wabash Valley to continue to diversify its generating resources."

Dairyland Power Cooperative, La Crosse, Wisc., also operates a landfill gas-to-energy plant. It also has five animal waste-to-energy projects that are either in planning or under construction on dairy farms in Dairyland's service territory, which

encompasses 62 counties in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Illinois. As many as 3,000 homes will be powered by this new form of renewable energy.



Six Degrees Of Energy Efficiency Challenge

Co-ops Get Green Light For Renewable Energy Financing

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has approved 78 renewable energy projects proposed by co-ops in 22 states for financing through the issuance of Clean Renewable Energy Bonds.

According to the IRS, co-ops allocation of not less than \$300 million in tax credit bond authority will support 33 solar facilities, 13 wind projects, 13 landfill gas facilities, 12 open-loop biomass facilities, six hydro projects and one refined coal production facility. Co-ops allocations ranged from \$120,548 to \$31 million.

State and local governmental borrowers received the go-ahead to issue some \$500 million in the bonds for more than 500 projects in 24 states. The bonds, provided for by the Energy Tax Incentives

Act of 2005, offer co-ops and other not-for-profit utilities tax incentives for renewable generation projects that otherwise would be unaffordable.

These incentives are comparable to those provided to IOUs through the production tax credit.

The law created a two-year window, through Jan. 1, 2008, for the program. It also capped bond authority at \$800 million, which has proven insufficient. Co-ops have sought some \$554 million in bond authority and other potential program participants more than \$2 billion, leading co-ops to urge program extension through Jan. 1, 2011, with a significant increase in the annual authorization.

Is Your Home's Wiring Up To Date And Safe?

While use of electric power has increased, electrical systems, particularly in homes built more than 20 years ago, have not kept up with the demand or the technology. Aged wiring, overloaded circuits and worn outlets are among the hazards that can start fires and cause electrical shock.

Most shocks and fires from electrical systems can be prevented. Have your electrical system inspected by a licensed electrician. Fix dangerous defects, install smoke detectors, arc-fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs), ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs), and check lighting and home appliances for wear and tear.

Have your house inspected if your home is 40 or more years old; if it is 10 or more years old and you've completed a major renovation or installed new major appliances; or if you're the new owner of a previously owned home.

Here are just a few hazards to look out for in your home system:

Dim and flickering lights.

- Arcs and sparks

 flashes of light or showers of sparks in your electrical system.
- Sizzles and buzzes unusual sounds from your electrical system.
- Overheating overheated wires can give off an odor of hot

insulation; switch-plates or receptacle covers are hot to the touch or discolored from heat buildup.

 Electrical shocks – any shock, even a mild tingle, may be warning of an electrical danger.


February Expected To Be Warmer Than Normal

The weather phenomenon known as El Nino has continued to persist during the last couple of months and will be one of the main influences on the weather patterns across the United States during February. As a result of the ongoing El Nino, the weather pattern across the country is likely to remain in a spilt-flow regime. This type of weather pattern tends to keep the cold polar air masses entrenched further north across southern Canada instead of diving southward across the eastern two-thirds of the

United States.

Another important climate indicator is the NAO (North Atlantic Oscillation). This index is forecasted to be primarily positive during February. A positive NAO means that areas of lower pressure will be in place across the North Atlantic Ocean. In response, upper-level ridging generally develops and brings milder temperatures to eastern portions of the country.

The combination of a steady



moderate El Nino and a positive NAO is expected to bring warmer than normal temperatures to much of the northern United States and parts of the Ohio Valley, including Illinois, during the month of February. As can be seen in the Illinois map, El Nino has already made its mark on the winter of 2006-07 as the total heating energy usage as measured by heating degree days was near to below normal across the entire state during the

November thru January time period. With mild temperatures expected to continue during February, total heating energy usage is expected to be slightly below to well below normal across Illinois, which will be a plus for the consumer.

Fire Prevention Tips

An estimated one-third of residential fires are related to electrical distribution or appliances and equipment. According to the United States Fire Administration (USFA), each year these electrical fires claim about 500 lives, cause more than 2,000 injuries, and translate into more than 800 million dollars in property damage. Safe Electricity urges homeowners to perform an electrical hazard check to help keep families safe from fires.

Many avoidable fires can be traced to poor maintenance and misuse of electrical appliances and electric cords. Do not place cords underneath rugs and furniture or run them behind baseboards, curtains or in high-traffic areas. Damaged, abused or worn extension cords can pose a major fire hazard.

"Begin a habit of regularly inspecting all appliances, cords and plugs," suggests Safe Electricity Director Molly Hall. "If you discover a frayed cord or loose prongs on a plug, discontinue use until repaired or replaced."

Another common fire hazard is overloaded electrical systems. Fuses blowing frequently, dimming lights when an appliance goes on, a shrinking TV picture, and slow-running or heating appliances are signals of overloaded circuits. Safe Electricity suggests that if you notice any of these warning signals, disconnect the appliances and call a

qualified electrician to get expert help.

To prevent electrical overloading, avoid using extension cords on a permanent basis and never plug more than two home appliances into an outlet at once. Use only outlets designed to handle multiple plugs. Give special consideration to appliances that use 1,000 or more watts, such as refrigerators, hot plates, irons, microwave ovens, dishwashers, heaters and air conditioners.

Additional safety measures include:

• Use only three-pronged outlets for appliances with a three-prong plug. Never remove the grounding pin or force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord.

- Never "piggy-back" extension cords or power strips to make them longer.
- Replace any appliance that overheats, shorts out, gives off smoke or sparks, or causes small electrical shocks.
- Do not use light bulbs with wattage that is too high for the fixture, and replace all halogen bulbs with fluorescent bulbs.
- To prevent overheating, allow air space around heat-producing appliances such as TVs, plug-in radios, stereo sets, computers and powerful lamps.
- Do not let children play with or around electrical appliances, such as space heaters, irons and hair dryers.
- Keep clothes, curtains and other potentially combustible items at least three feet from all heaters.
- Be sure all electrical equipment bears the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label.

Home electrical wiring causes twice as many fires as electrical appliances. Check periodically for loose wall receptacles, loose wires or loose lighting fixtures. Listen for popping or sizzling sounds behind walls. Immediately shut off and have a professional replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that spark or flicker.

The majority of fires caused by electrical wiring flaws occur in the bedroom. For this reason, Safe Electricity encourages homeowners to have Arc Fault Circuit Interrupters (ACFIs) professionally installed on bedroom circuits. AFCI is a relatively new technology to address electrical fire hazards, and the National Electric Code now requires AFCIs for bedroom circuits in new residential construction.


In many older homes, the capacity of the wiring system has not kept pace with today's increase in modern appliances and electrical usage. If your house falls under this category, have a licensed electrician check for hazards and make essential updates to keep your home safe.

"Finally, a functioning smoke alarm dramatically increases your chances of surviving a fire," reminds Hall. "Replace the batteries twice a year, and remember to practice a home escape plan with your family."

ORGAN DONATION Ats Mont Life

Nick was 16 years old in May 2002. He was a son, a brother, a friend. He was a typical teenage boy. He and five friends from the drumline were out one evening after school, just a typical night. Then all their lives changed as the car they were in collided with a semi. Two friends survived. Three died at the scene. Nick died four days later.

"Nick was a good kid," says his mother, Sue Volk. "He liked to have a good time and he liked a good joke as well as anyone; he was no angel by any means but he was a good kid and everyone liked him."

Just after her son's death, Volk was asked if she wanted to donate Nick's organs. The answer, for her, was an easy one. "Since Nick was just 16 it hadn't been that long since I went with him to get his driver's license. That's one of the questions they asked him and his attitude was, 'well of course, why not,'" says Volk. "It was easy to say yes because I knew that's what he wanted to do."

Dave Bosch, Communications Director from Gift of Hope Organ and Tissue Donor Network, an organ procurement organization serving much of central and northern Illinois, says, "Our main education message is to get people to talk about donation with their families - to talk about what they would want. People

just don't talk about death and dying and end of life decisions. But organ donation is about life, it's not about death."

Volk's decision allowed more than 50 different organs and tissues to be donated from her son. She now encourages others to speak freely about organ donation and to learn about their loved one's wishes, providing information and support each year through Nick's Race (see information on page 13).

Laurie Vial, Marketing and Member Relations Coordinator for Corn Belt Energy in Bloomington, also knew what her father wanted when he passed away seven years ago. Richard Vial had a heart attack while cross-country skiing with his son at the family farm on a bitterly cold January morning. "My entire family had always been really big on organ donation and my dad had a signed card in his wallet," says Vial.

Because Richard hadn't been on life support, the family was only able to donate his tissues. "My mom told them she wanted them to use as much as they could that would benefit other people," says Laurie. The family received a letter from the organ procurement agency saying that they had used her dad's skin to protect burn victims until their own skin grew, his major joints for an arthritis study and his bones for bone grafts.

And one woman received his corneas. "She wrote this letter, which was forwarded to my mother. She doesn't know my dad's name or anything. So she's writing a person she never met, who gave her this gift. She said she hadn't been able to see for many, many years and that she received the corneas and is now able to see. She told us what a tremendous gift it was and how grateful she was," savs Vial. It's hard to say how many lives were improved by the donations. Bosch says that

Bosch says tens of thousands of people benefit each year from tissue transplantation. Tissues include the corneas, veins, bone, bone marrow and skin that are used for a large number of procedures.

"There are eight organs available for transplant, as well as the different tissues, and it's easily more than 25 people whose lives can be saved or enhanced by a single donor," says Bosch. In Illinois alone, there are presently 4,700 people waiting for an

doctor came in and asked Reeves if he would consider having a liver transplant. Reeves remembers, "He said, 'I must warn you that we stopped doing liver transplants with this type of cancer because we had no survivors." But a new protocol had been successful in two cases, performed within that year. "It was my only option and for a while I didn't know I had that option," says Reeves. "They



organ transplant.

Jeff Reeves, President/CEO of Corn Belt Energy, was one of those people in 1994 as he waited for a liver transplant. He was diagnosed with cancer in July of that year. "The plan was to send me to the Mayo Clinic and the surgeons up there would remove the cancer and stitch me up and then I would go on my merry way, maybe with radiation or chemotherapy, but the prognosis was good," says Reeves.

But five days after his arrival at the clinic, Reeves learned that the cancer in his bile duct was too close to the liver and surgery wasn't an option. "They basically told me there was nothing they could do."

A few days later, the attending

said I had to agree that I wouldn't smoke or drink in the future but I said that wasn't a hard thing to agree to."

After extensive testing, doctors determined that Reeves' cancer was isolated and he was otherwise in excellent health, making him a candidate for a transplant. He was in and out of the hospital for four months before he received a new liver on Thanksgiving Day 1994. "I started feeling better

after I regained consciousness and was aware of what was going on. I didn't have nausea and started feeling better immediately. That just showed how much better the new liver worked compared to the old situation," he says

Just before Christmas that year, Reeves came home, and has stayed healthy now for 12 years. "I've been very fortunate, very blessed. A lot of prayers were answered and family and friends were all very supportive, especially my friends in the electric cooperative program," he says.


Reeves enjoys talking about his experience because he's eager to get the word out. "I want people to consider being a donor. That's the most important thing. Just one donor can save a lot of lives," he says.

"Now four months is not anywhere near what you have to wait for a transplant, if you get one at all. There are so many people on the list," Reeves comments. More than 300 people in Illinois die each year while waiting for an organ.

"The Illinois Secretary of State's office has done a good job of making everyone aware of the need for organs. You can't do much with them when you die anyway, so you might as well let someone else have them," says Reeves.

Randy Nehrt, Spokesperson for the Secretary of State, says, "We spend a lot of resources in Illinois to educate the public on this issue and it's an important issue for Secretary of State Jesse White. It's one of the top issues he speaks about. It's a personal issue for him as well, as his sister received a second chance through a donated kidney."

The office's work has paid off. Illinois has the largest donor registry in the country, with more than 6 million registered donors. The Secretary of State's office controls and provides the list of registered donors in Illinois to the state's organ procurement agencies Gift of Hope and Mid America Transplant Services.



Most registered donors in Illinois have registered when renewing or receiving their driver's license. In the past, persons were asked if they wished to join and their names were added to the registry. They were then asked to sign the back of their driver's license and to tell their family. But when a person in this registry dies, the family still has the final decision. "It's just a very difficult time for a family to make an important decision

like that," says Nehrt.

Bosch says it's hard for people to think about what their loved one would have wanted when they are in shock and dealing with their grief. And about 19 percent of families have said no when asked whether they agree to donate a loved one's organs, even when that loved one has a signed driver's license and has joined the registry. "The reason they were saying no was because they said,

'we hadn't talked about it' and 'I don't know' and 'I can't figure that out right now," says Bosch.

That's why the registry has now changed to first person consent, which could save 100 more lives each year. The new registry is a contract and legally binding. If you sign up on this registry, your wishes cannot be overturned and your family won't have to make a decision at a very upsetting time. Families will still need to give consent for the donation of organs of persons under the age of 18.

See the information on page 13 to learn how to join the new registry. "There is truly one thing you can do that will directly save lives and that is to join the first person consent registry. By doing that you may give someone a second chance at life. It's a wonderful gift that you can give," says Nehrt.

Nick Volk and Richard Vial gave that gift, improving the lives of many individuals with their donations. At a very difficult time, their families made the decision to honor their wishes, and should be commended for doing so. Don't wait - talk to your family today about your decision regarding organ donation.

Living Donation~

Organ donation doesn't have to occur only after a donor dies. Randy Mead, Control Room Operator for Southern Illinois Power Cooperative in Marion, knew that his son, Gabe, who was born with a defective kidney, would someday need a transplant. In January 2001, when Gabe was 18, the defective kidney finally gave up and Randy was approved as a donor.

Randy considered himself an obvious choice since he was the oldest of his family. "Doctors said at the time that he would possibly need another organ in his lifetime. I told my wife that since I was the oldest

I would try to donate now and if he needed another organ later, maybe she or a sibling could donate," says Randy.

"It wasn't a big decision for me. I'm glad I did it. I'm just fortunate that I could do it, that's the thing," says Randy. "I thought just anyone could donate, but it doesn't work that way. I was really surprised at what all the doctors tested me for."

Randy and Gabe both came through the transplant surgeries very well. Gabe, now 23, has been married for two years and is living a normal life. "He has to take rejection medicine, but he does whatever he wants to do. It doesn't seem to affect him at all," says Randy.

Kidney donation is the most common type of living donation. Portions of a liver, lung or pancreas, or bone marrow can also be transplanted from a living donor. Most often, this type of donation occurs between family members or friends.

"The people I really admire are those who do this for friends or total strangers. There are a lot of good people out there, that's for sure. No matter what, the operation will probably always affect you a little bit. I can do what I did before, but I know it's there and so someone who does that for a stranger to me is pretty special," says Randy.



sister wanted to do something as a tribute to him. As an event planner, she decided to use the biggest thing she and Nick had in common—running—and make it an event. Nick's Race was the result, a 2-mile run and walk through Sam Parr State Park in Newton. "It's not just about Nick," says his mother, Sue Volk. "We're really rural, but we have a lot of people who are organ and tissue donor or recipient families."

The race's mission is to spread the word about organ donation and the importance of discussing your decision with your family. More than 200 participants registered for the run and walk last year. And many more people come to hear the speakers and provide support. Speakers have included donor and recipient families and representatives from Gift of Hope. Many local businesses and organizations, along with people touched by organ donation, donate prizes for a large raffle.


In its four-year history, the race has raised more than \$36,000 for Gift of Hope, the Nick Volk Memorial Scholarship Fund and the Newton Community High School Cross Country Team and Drumline. Gift of Hope has used the money received from the race for educational programs and materials; the scholarship

Safe Installation of Backup Generators

A backup generator can be a real life saver or killer

Sorry...we're all sold out." These are words that became very familiar to those shopping for generators in stores in central and southern Illinois during December's ice storm. This ice storm caused one of the worst power outages to hit this area in many years.

So what do you do when your electricity goes out? Many people powered up the generator they already had or they were lucky enough to find a store that still had them for sale. This brings a situation of good news-bad news. The good news is that most electric cooperatives welcome the safe use of backup generators by co-op members. Some electric cooperatives even have generators for sale. The bad news is that there have been serious injuries and even fatalities because of the improper use of generators.

If you have already purchased a generator, or are thinking about it, we want you to know and take proper safety steps before operating an electric generator in your home or business.

First and foremost, properly connecting a generator into the electrical system is a critical step for safe use. A transfer safety switch to prevent a flow of electricity back through the lines must be used with your generator. This prevents "back feed" of electricity through lines that may be having

work done on them. It is our recommendation that you have a licensed professional electrician install your standby generator.

Another consideration of safely using a generator is the fact that a generator emits deadly exhaust fumes that can enter living spaces if placed too closely to the living environment. Always keep the generator outside in a dry protected area.

Known as the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas produced by incomplete burning of fuel, such as propane, kerosene, gasoline, oil, natural gas, wood and charcoal. Several tragic deaths have been caused by carbon monoxide already this year. A new Illinois law calls for homes to be protected with carbon monoxide detectors. Although this is not required in all-electric homes with detached garages, it still might be a good idea if you might

ever need to use supplemental heat or a generator.

A few other reminders about using a generator safely include:

- Turn off the generator and allow it to cool before refueling.
- Before shutting down a generator, turn off and unplug all appliances and equipment being powered by the generator.
- Read and follow all manufacturer's operating instructions.
- Make sure the generator is wired properly with proper grounding.
- Know the rating of the generator and do not overload it.
- Always use properly rated power cords designed and rated for heavier, outdoor use to connect appliances.
- Never plug a portable electric generator into a wall outlet or connect directly to a home's wiring. As stated earlier this could energize utility power lines and injure you or workers down the line. Back feed also has the potential of damaging the generator or appliances in the home.
- Place the generator as far away from the home as possible, and never in the house, a garage or near doors and windows. Being mindful of these guidelines helps ensure that the carbon monoxide generated will not be pulled into the home where it can poison and kill.

Linemen from across Illinois and surrounding states worked long hours in dangerous and cold conditions to repair miles of line downed by the terrible December ice storm. We are proud of their dedication. We are grateful that, except for a few scrapes and bruises, no one was hurt seriously. Please, please, please make sure you keep your family safe during the next extended power outage. One will surely come again someday.

Cut Flower Care

Simple steps for longer life expectancy

In the middle of the month, a slew of people, mainly those of the male persuasion, will be purchasing flowers in order to say "I Love You." Valentine's Day will come with florists scrambling to fill every order, and people scrambling to get them to their loved ones in one piece.

Flowers can bring so much joy — and — potential grief. Nothing says the same thing as a bouquet of fresh flowers. Nothing says the same thing as those fresh bouquets fading and falling apart fast. What looked fantastic one day may be a mess of petals everywhere or limp stems the next day.

These bouquets are an investment, not just for the cost of the flowers. You want them to last.

Most of the failure can be laid on the recipient or giver, and not on the florist. Short of keeping the flowers out of water for more than 24 hours, which seldom happens even though many of the blooms are grown in South America or the Middle East, about the only damage a florist can do is freeze the flowers.

So, the problem lies at your feet, or more accurately, in your hands.

The typical rose should last at least seven to 10 days. Carnations and chrysanthemums should last at least two weeks. Orchids can stick around for three weeks.

"The cut flower life of roses, carnations and snapdragons can be doubled by using floral preservatives." With a little extra care, you can be sure any of these flowers last as long as possible.

First, make sure the container you use is large enough to hold ample water. More importantly, make sure it's clean. Scrub out

the container and rinse it thoroughly. Bacteria from dirty containers will rapidly plug the stems of your flowers and make them wilt. Non-metallic containers are usually best if you use floral preservatives.

It doesn't hurt to fill the container and pour in a cap-full of bleach. This goes a long way to sterilize any bacteria you might have missed.

Strip off leaves that will be under water. They will decay and cause bacteria to grow. Nothing can make water as green and rancid as fast as leaves floating beneath the surface.

Next, carefully cut one inch from the base of each stem just before you put the flower in water. Some people will tell you that cutting should be done under water. There is no definitive "yes" or "no" to this; if it makes you feel good, do it.

Warm water is the best initially. That's about 100° degrees F, or what you'd feel comfortable bathing in. You might think cold water will keep the flower longer, but the blooms need the warm water to allow for uptake of water later. Plants take up warm water quite readily after cutting but will seldom take up cold water. If your water is very hard or is from a water softener, use distilled water instead. The salts in the undesired waters also clog the stems.

The cut flower life of roses, carnations and snapdragons can be doubled by using floral preservatives. These materials are available from your florist. Or make your own using a bottle of lemon-lime soda (not the diet type) with an equal amount of warm water and a teaspoon of household bleach. Use it instead of water in the container. Floral foams (called Oasis) used in arrangements contain preservatives. Be sure the foam is immersed in water thoroughly before using and kept moist throughout its use. Do not reuse the foam for other arrangements.

Keep your flowers in a cool place out of drafts. At night, put them in the refrigerator or a cool, 35 to 40 degree, room. Also, avoid direct sunlight on the plant.

THE MOST IMPORTANT POINT: Change the water at least once every two days. There's nothing wrong with changing the water every day, washing out the vase and washing down the stems. For some flowers, making a fresh cut every three or four days can also prolong the life of the flowers.

While these procedures will get the maximum life from your flowers, the fact that cut flowers only last for a brief time is part of their charm. No matter how you look at them, they're so much better than silk or plastic flowers.

It's Easy To Start Saving Now

Control your energy bills with easy, inexpensive steps

As I mentioned in last month's column, there are ways to make energy efficiency improvements,

one step at a time, without spending a lot of money. This month I want to discuss some more simple steps you can take to help lower your energy usage in your house or commercial building. Some of the things that I'll discuss with you will save a few dollars a month. Some will save you lots of dollars per month.

If you are really serious about lowering your energy usage simply make each improvement before the next month's column. If you will do that, it will spread the costs of the improvements over several months. When we finish, you should notice a considerable reduction in your utility bills. No two houses are exactly like, so your results may vary some from

your neighbor's. And remember, if you don't take action, you will see no improvement.

After thinking long and hard about what to suggest first, I chose an item that costs less than \$20 that will apply to every family that has a water

heater (which should be you). Most water heaters have standby loss. In other words, they actually lose heat even when the water heater is not being used. Example: The gas or electric element in your water heater might actually come on several times during the day or night if it is located in a cold environment, such as a garage or carport

storage room. If it is located inside the conditioned area of the house, it can add heat to your living space during the summer, which may increase your cooling cost.

So here's what you can do. Before next month's column, I want you to purchase a water heater insulation wrap from your local home improvement store. In most cases, it can be installed in about

10 minutes. Just follow the instructions in the package.

This improvement might save you \$1 a month or it might save you \$20 a month, depending on your particular house and the number of occupants. For another \$2, you can also buy pipe insulation to install on the hot water lines coming from the top the water heater.

If you have a water heater that is 10 years old or older it would be wise for you to purchase a Marathon water heater, which is so well insulated that it needs no blanket.

Low-flow faucets and showerheads can also lower your hot water heating costs, especially if your home contains a few teenagers. Why is it younger children hate baths and you can't

seem to get teenagers to get out of the shower until all the hot water is gone?

Adding an insulation wrap to your hot water heater is easy. You can do this even if you are all thumbs. Solving the teenager issue is definitely more challenging. But what do you want from me? I can't solve all your problems, just the energy problems.

Next month we'll have a really bright idea for you that is probably the easiest energy efficiency change you can make. Stay tuned for more. Speaking of staying tuned, check out my radio program. For more information contact your local electric co-op.



STOPPING METH

Illinois law enforcement finding new ways to fight a deadly rural drug war

The production and abuse of methamphetamines (meth) in Illinois poses an increasing threat to the state and its citizens. Meth is a highly addictive central nervous system stimulant that can be injected, snorted, smoked or ingested orally. It is easily produced in illegal laboratories or meth labs using a variety of ingredients available in any pharmacy.

Meth labs can be very dangerous due to the volatile and toxic chemicals and by-products used. The danger of a meth lab not only lies in the hands of the person making meth, but also the community in which the lab is located.

Awareness of the dangerous affects of meth production and use is spreading through laws, training and education, youth-led curriculum and Web site creation, as well as a new media campaign. Attorney General Lisa Madigan, Governor Rod Blagojevich and U.S. Senator Dick Durbin

are working to minimize the threat meth has on rural areas.

Madigan's office initiated the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act, which took effect Sept. 11, 2005. The Act consolidates and strengthens criminal laws against meth production, distribution and use and, as a result, gives prosecutors additional tools to go after meth makers who tamper with anhydrous ammonia tanks.

"The Meth Control and Community Protection Act gives our state's law enforcement agencies additional tools to fight the illegal and dangerous activities that occur during the manufacture of meth," says Steven Mange, Senior Policy Advisor for the Attorney General. "Because the production of meth in Illinois causes as much harm as the use of this deadly drug, it was and is important that we continue to tighten the net around criminals who participate in

all stages of the meth chain: manufacture, delivery and abuse."

Madigan's office also initiated the Methamphetamine Precursor Control Act that went into effect in Jan. 2006. The act imposes stricter controls on the display and sale of cold and sinus products containing pseudoephedrine, a key ingredient in making meth. For the past year, to purchase cold and sinus medications such as Sudafed or Tylenol Cold, you have to be 18 or older and can get no more than two packages at a time from a pharmacy employee.

Mange says, "As compliance with the restrictions on sales of meth precursors has increased, the number of meth labs in Illinois has dropped. For example, the number of meth labs seized by the Illinois State Police fell by nearly half (47 percent) during the third quarter of 2006, when 136 labs were seized, compared to the third quarter of 2005, when 257 labs were

seized. Law enforcement authorities also report a drop in the size of the average meth lab, as meth cooks struggle to obtain sufficient quantities of pseudoephedrine."

Madigan's office has also trained more than 1,000 law enforcement officers and prosecutors during 2005 and 2006 on the investigation and prosecution of Illinois meth cases.

An innovative youth-led prevention curriculum and a Web site that provides meth-related information (www.IllinoisAttorneyGeneral.gov/methnet) was also created to help spread the word about the dangers of meth.

Businesses in Illinois are also taking steps to prevent the production of meth.

In December 2006, Blagojevich awarded 35 fertilizer dealers nearly \$140,000 in grants to assist in preventing the theft of anhydrous ammonia, which is also used in the production of meth. The funds will allow agrichemical dealers to be reimbursed for up to two-thirds of the cost of their security

improvements; such as lighting, video surveillance or tamper-proof locks on anhydrous ammonia tanks.

"Methamphetamine is one of the fastest growing and most addictive drugs, especially in downstate communities. It ravages users, families and households and neighborhoods where it's made and sold. These grants will help keep a key ingredient to making meth out of the hands of manufacturers," Blagojevich says.

To promote awareness and prevention of meth abuse throughout southern and central Illinois, a partnership between Durbin, the Illinois Sheriffs' Association and the Illinois Broadcasters Association was created.

More than 200 billboards will be covering southern and central Illinois

to spread meth awareness and prevention. The campaign will also use TV and radio commercials.

Durbin asked the University of Illinois to gather and analyze data on how meth is affecting Illinois and ways to fight back. The data suggest that most meth victims are white adults living in rural areas. Most of the people affected by meth are poor and have less education than the average Illinois citizen. In 2004, more than half of the children entering foster care in some areas of rural southeastern Illinois were

forced into the program because their caretakers were meth users.


"The University of Illinois report speaks to the role of media and the value of a growing community awareness in turning the tide against meth use. The goal of this ad campaign is to make sure our communities know that this is happening – right here in Illinois. We know that awareness campaigns can help shape attitudes and spark conversations. These are not quiet ads. Our hope is that these ads will make people think," Durbin says.

Durbin stated that before we can work together to protect our communities from the damaging effects of meth addiction, we have to recognize that there is a problem – and that everyone needs to be part of the solution.

Under the Methamphetamine Precursor Control Act:

- All cold and sinus products containing pseudoephedrine (PSE), except small convenience packages, must be kept behind pharmacy counters.
- When purchasing a PSE product, a consumer does not need a prescription but must show identification and sign a confidential log.
- Without a prescription for a greater amount, a consumer may purchase
- no more than two packages of PSE in a single retail transaction or more than 7500 milligrams of PSE in a 30-day period. (7500 milligrams exceeds the maximum amount of PSE an adult may take in a month.)
- Away from pharmacy counters, a consumer may purchase one convenience package of up to 360 milligrams of PSE in liquid or liquid-filled capsule form in a 24-
- hour period. (360 milligrams is the maximum amount of PSE an adult may take in a day.)
- A consumer with a prescription for PSE is not subject to the quantity limits stated above.

2 C. flour


1/4 tsp. salt

1 bunch of scallions


1 (8-oz.) pkg. cream cheese
