Eric Dewitt, a lineman for McDonough Power, was one of 12 volunteers from nine Illinois electric cooperatives that brought electricity to four villages in Bolivia. The linemen spent three weeks in March in Bolivia constructing almost 30 kilometers of power lines and installed 21 transformers. Two schools and a facility for handicapped individuals were electrified.

Dewitt said that this experience was life changing and that he would do it again. "We take electricity for granted in the states. It is hard to image a world were electricity does not exist. The Bolivian people were very excited and grateful to finally receive electricity. The children said they will be able to do their school work after dark because now they have a light," Dewitt stated.

"These three weeks in Bolivia were a life changer," said Matt Eisenmenger, safety instructor for the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives (AIEC). "Not only do I have a newfound appreciation for the blessings and opportunities we have here at home, but I'm also optimistic about the future of the villages we illuminated. I was honored to have the opportunity to power and empower the people, and it's an experience I'll long remember."

The bylaws of the cooperative provide that nominations to the Board of Directors may be made by (1) the Nominating Committee or, (2) a petition signed by 15 or more active members, the petition must be received at the principal office of the cooperative at least 30 days before the annual meeting.

Directors presently serving on our Board of Directors are: District 1. Michael D. Cox; District 2, Jerry Riggins; District 3, Walter Lewis; District 4, David Lueck; District 5, Steven L. Lynn; District 6, Jeffrey N. Moore; District 7, Steve Hall; District 8, Robert Dwyer; and District 9, Steven Youngquist.

It shall be the duty of the board to appoint, not less than 40 days nor more than one hundred twenty days before the date of a meeting of the members at which board members are to be elected, a committee on nominations consisting of two members from each district in which a director is to be elected and one member from each of the other districts served by the cooperative. No member of the board may serve on such committee. The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office, at least thirty days before the meeting, a list of nominations for directors, which shall include at least one or more candidates for each board position to be filled by the election.

The secretary shall be responsible for mailing with the notice of the meeting or separately, but at least seven days before the date of the meeting, a statement of the number of board members to be elected and the names and addresses of the candidates nominated by the committee on nominations.

Any fifteen or more members acting together may make other nominations by petition and the secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. Nominations made by petition, in order to be valid, must be received at the principal office of the cooperative at least thirty days before the meeting.

Any nomination by petition which meets the requirements of the bylaws shall set forth in the annual meeting notice as nominations made by petition and any such nominations shall appear on the official ballot. 9226D6-317B

## Please make room for roadside crews

When the power goes out, so do McDonough Power's line crews. Lineworkers are the first to respond after an outage occurs, and they work tirelessly to restore power to the communities we serve.

If you're traveling and see one of our crews on the side of the road, we kindly ask that you move over if possible and give them a little extra space to work. We deeply care about the safety of all, and this extra precaution ensures just that.

If you approach a crew while traveling on a two-lane road, moving over to the next lane might not be an option. In this case, we simply ask that you slow

down when approaching roadside crews. If you approach a crew while traveling on a four-lane road, and safety and traffic conditions allow, we ask that you move over into the far lane.

Scott's Law, also referred to as the "move over" law in Illinois, requires drivers to slow down or change lanes when driving by a stopped emergency vehicle. Beginning in 2017, the law also includes any vehicle on the side of the road with hazard lights flashing.

Utility crews aren't the only ones who could use the extra space. Emergency responders, such as police officers,

firefighters and emergency medical technicians, often find themselves responding to emergency situations near busy roadways. We ask that you follow the same procedures mentioned above to help keep these crews safe.

"Our linemen worked tirelessly in challenging environments for three weeks, and we're all proud to be part of such an important mission," said Duane Noland, AIEC president and CEO, who attended the celebration. "The coop spirit of service and our commitment to our global community is alive and well, and we all welcome the opportunity to share our expertise with communities thousands of miles away who can now have a promising future."

A celebration was held on March 30 at the Lajas school and was attended by the entire crew, village leaders, the mayor of Samaipata and several board members of Cooperativa Rural de Electrificación (CRE), the Bolivian cooperative.

"This mission involved helping CRE, a Bolivian electric cooperative, to extend the electric service to these remote areas," said Phil Carson, NRECA Board president from Illinois who joined the team for the celebration. "NRECA has had a relationship with CRE that spans more than 50 years, and this work is a testament to our global commitment in helping expand access to reliable electricity to communities that were very much like ours 75 years ago."

The trip was sponsored by AIEC and managed and coordinated by NRECA International.

NRECA International, an affiliate of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) has been working in developing countries since 1962. Today more than 300 member electric cooperatives support its work through monetary contributions, material donations, and sending hundreds of electric co-op linemen and employees abroad as volunteers.
