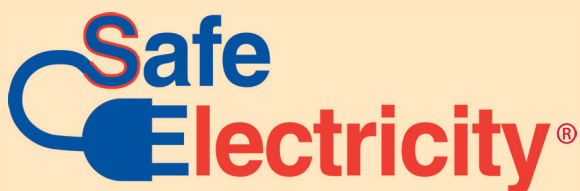




Always keep metal ladders a safe distance from power lines.

Tips from Safe Electricity:

- Use caution when using long tools like ladders, pool skimmers, and pruning poles to keep them away from power lines.
- Keep equipment and yourself at least 10 feet from power lines.
- Never trim trees near power lines. Leave that to the professionals.
- Never use water or blower extensions to clean gutters near electric lines.
- If it is raining or the ground is wet, do not use electric power or yard tools.
- Inspect the height of farm equipment to determine clearance.
- Use a spotter when operating large equipment near power lines.
- Look up and use care when moving any equipment, such as extending augers or raising the bed of grain trucks around power lines.
- Always set extensions to the lowest setting when moving loads to prevent contact with overhead power lines. Grain augers should always be positioned horizontally before moving.
- Never attempt to move a power line out of the way or raise it for clearance.

LET'S ALL HAVE A SAFE 2017

Many folks start the new year by making resolutions to lose weight, exercise more, get organized, stop bad habits, or improve their lives in a variety of other ways. But by the middle of January we usually break those promises to ourselves and return to our old ways. But here's one resolution you can make that will take you through 2017 and last for a lifetime: Become more aware of electrical dangers around you. You should consider this even if you don't traditionally make resolutions.

At Rock Energy Cooperative, we take safety very seriously. We have regular safety meetings, daily safety checks of equipment, and the extensive evaluation process of the Rural Electric Safety Accreditation Program. This national program involves a third-party evaluation of everything from safety policies and procedures to our facilities and equipment.

Co-op employees receive regular safety training to make sure they do their jobs as safely as possible. But safety awareness doesn't stop when they're off the clock. We want them to practice electrical safety in everything they do.

We want the same for you—our members. Our safety team wouldn't be complete without you. You are the co-op's eyes and ears at your home, workplace, and throughout our communities. By being more aware of your surroundings and the electrical hazards in your daily lives, you can protect yourself and your loved ones.

I received a report the other day from Federated Rural Electric Insurance Exchange, which insures many energy co-ops nationwide including Rock Energy, about electrical accidents that occurred in October:

- The driver of a dump truck raised his bed into overhead lines.
- Painters contacted lines after losing control of their ladder.
- A co-op member raised a ladder into overhead lines.
- A member grabbed a downed line believing it was a harmless cable.
- A cement truck driver raised his boom into overhead lines.
- A contractor contacted lines while tying a neutral line.
- A member contacted a line that was downed by an extended auger on a grain cart.

Fortunately, these accidents didn't result in any deaths, but they certainly could have. On average, 400 people in the United States die each year from electrocution and 4,400 are injured because of electrical hazards.

The most important part of safety around electricity is awareness. Whether you're using a metal ladder to clean your gutters or operating large farm machinery, always survey the area first so you know where power lines and other potential hazards are. A large piece of machinery is vulnerable to hitting power lines because of its size, height, and extensions. Being aware of the location of overhead power lines and planning a safe equipment route is essential to help reduce accidents.

Remember that you are part of our safety team. We count on you to let us know if you see a sagging power line that might cause a problem or any other potential hazards.

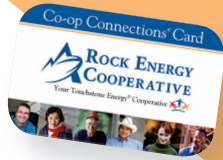
