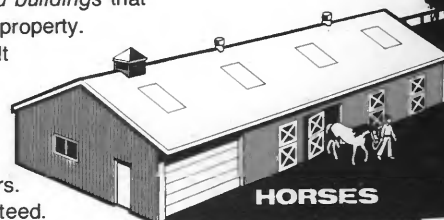

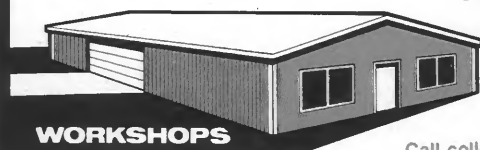
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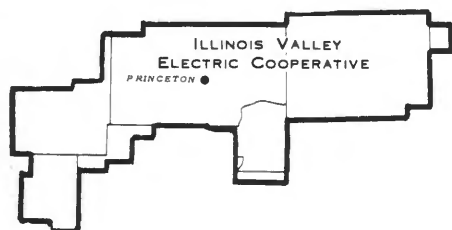

Stanley E. Greathouse, president of the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives, will be guest speaker for the Illinois Valley Electric Cooperative annual meeting Tuesday, September 28.

Greathouse, of Johnsonville, is a director of Wayne-White Counties Electric Cooperative of Fairfield. He served as president of the Wayne-White board from 1972 until 1976 and is now vice president. Elected to the AIEC board in 1972, Greathouse became president in April, 1975, and was recently reelected president of the state association for the coming year.

A native of Wayne County, Greathouse holds a bachelor of arts degree in social studies and a minor in English from Southern Illinois Univer-

sity in Carbondale.

A 15-year veteran of one-room elementary schools, Greathouse has been active in teaching and school administration in Southern Illinois for over 31 years. He is presently principal of Orchardville School, part of Wayne City Community Unit School District.

A teacher, minister and, since 1946, a grain and dairy farmer, Greathouse is Pastor and Board President of Poplar Creek Branch, Church of the Latter Day Saints. He is a member of the Wayne County Farm Bureau and past member of the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service Council and Wayne County Soil Conservation District which awarded him the District Conservation Teacher of the Year Award in 1973.

Greathouse and his wife, the former Iona Lamb, reside at R.R. 1, Johnsonville. They have one daughter, Mrs. Jon Schwengel of DuQuoin, Illinois, and one grandchild.

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The Old Gives Way to the New

Illinois Valley Electric Cooperative Inc., has changed to computer billing.

The day you receive your bill, please read your meter and enter the reading in the five squares outlined in red where it indicates "ENTER METER READING HERE." Please remember it is necessary to have your METER READING ON THE CARD WHEN PAYMENT IS MADE.

When you make your payment be sure to send the right hand portion of the card with your payment. It is marked in red "RETURN THIS PORTION." This portion contains your name, account number, the new meter reading, and the amount of your payment.

The code letters and other information are printed on the back of the bill explaining the code letters that

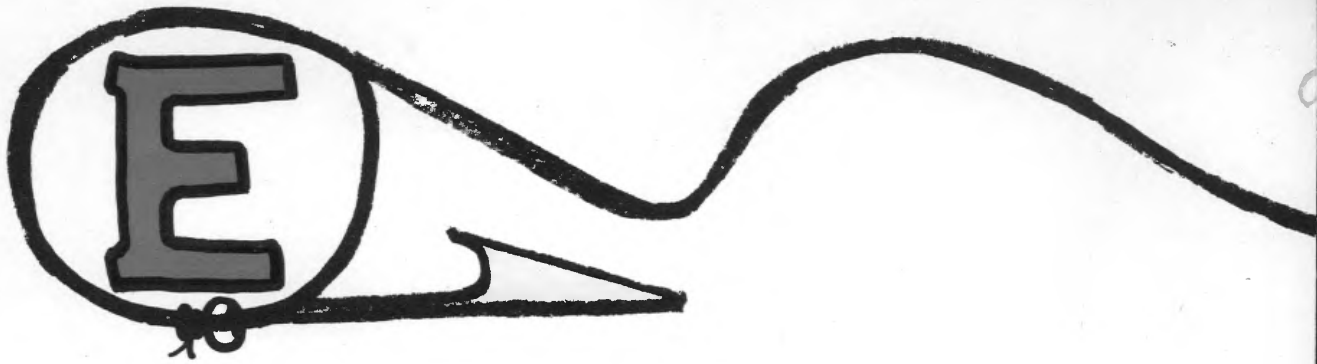
will appear on the face of the bill.

It is important that you send readings in on time and no later than the 15th because if sent in late we cannot use them for billing. You will be estimated. Readings and payment are both a must on this new system, or you will be disconnected.
