

High-Voltage Transmission Lines



However, when damage does occur-usually due to high winds or ice buildup-these towers and lines must be repaired before other parts of the distribution system are inspected, because they serve thousands (or tens of thousands) of people.

Restoring the power after a thunderstorm, tornado, ice storm or flood involves much more than just flipping a switch at a substation or pulling a tree off a downed power line. Highly trained workers from your rural electric cooperative, crews from neighboring co-ops and even specialists from the Illinois Association of Electric Cooperatives will work together around the clock to restore service in areas affected by severe weather.

Shown here are the steps co-ops follow in restoring power. At each stage, the primary goal is getting the greatest number of co-op members back on line in the shortest time possible.

enard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, September 30, 2003, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Edward Allspach, Michael E. Carls, Jerry Brooks, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch and Steve Worner. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the September 3, 2003, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed and approved Inventory of Work orders for the month of August in the amount of \$116,591.31.

The board reviewed August 2003 General Fund Checks #11505 - #11729 amounting to \$2,050,399.61. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

The board reviewed 51 membership applications and 14 service permits for the month. The membership applications and service permits were approved and accepted.

It was moved and seconded that the agreement for electric service for Robert A. Dunton was approved as presented.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. Manager Frasco reported on the Youth to Washington Trip, which is scheduled for June 11th through the 18th of 2004. The price has risen from \$850 to \$950 per student. He discussed the Sporting Clay Event, which was scheduled either for Saturday November 1st or 8th. The board had no preference as to either date.

The Manager advised the board that a few irrigators were waiting to pay their bills until the end of the harvest season. He advised that there were four or five irrigators who followed this practice, but they ultimately pay their bills in full. He inquired if the board was interested in making any changes as to the manner in which these accounts were handled. It was the consensus of the board to make no changes at this time. The Manager reported that there was 1,400 feet of new underground installed along with five new services and eight temporary services. He discussed the ATS/CIS installation.

Manager Frasco advised that the ATS Staff would be present next week to do the data conversion and that the cooperative would probably go "live" around November 1st with the new bill format. He reviewed the proposed new bill format with the board and also the format for past due notices. He discussed the status of the new building project. He advised that Adams & Associates had submitted a modified proposal and the latest proposal had removed about \$13,000 from the original price. The Manager reported that he had a couple of meetings with an Architect in Springfield to review the proposed plans. It was Manager Frasco's recommendations that that the board proceed with hiring Adams & Associates. He discussed with the board the reasons, and after discussion by the board it was moved

and seconded that the Manager proceed in such a manner to negotiate an acceptable contract with Adams & Associates.

There was a discussion about the possible joint meeting with Illinois Rural with possible dates during the latter part of January 2004. It was the consensus of the board that a meeting be scheduled for January 29, 2004. He reviewed with the board the IEC Continuing Education Program from the AIEC.

The Manager presented the financial report for the month of August 2003. Year to date margins totaled \$250,690 compared to \$944,058 for the same period in 2002. Equity as of August 2003, was 37.29 percent and the number of members served was 9,989 compared to 9,893 a year ago. The average farm and residential bill was \$135.59 compared to \$153.98 a year ago. Net utility plant at the end of August 2003 was \$25,990,497 compared to \$25,147,936 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The Manager's report was accepted as presented.

It was moved and seconded that Director's special occasion vouchers in the amount of \$345.36 as presented be approved.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities

Manager Frasco reported on the capital credit estate refund report.

Manager Frasco discussed with the board the non-union salary adjustments. He reviewed a pay and range salary adjustment report. After discussion by the board, it was his recommendation that the cooperative implement a 3 percent COLA adjustment on each pay rate with four to five step increases for various employees at the discretion of the Manager.

Manager Frasco reviewed the NRTC "Wild Blue" business opportunity executive summary. It was the consensus of the board not to participate in the program.

Director Carls reported on Soyland/CCS activities for the month.

Manager Frasco reviewed with the board the AIEC annual meeting survey as submitted to the members at the last annual meeting.

Director Graff and Manager Frasco reviewed with the board the NRECA Region V Meeting they had attended.

President Martin called the board into Executive Session. President Martin reconvened the monthly board meeting.

President Martin reviewed the letter he had received from the Cass-Morgan Farm Bureau with regard to power outages. The letter discussed the fact that there had been services interrupted in their area. Manager Frasco advised that there had been ongoing construction in that area. The board discussed a draft response and the Manager advised he would send a response to the Farm Bureau.

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, October 28, 2003, at 7:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

enard Electric Cooperative's board of directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 28, 2003, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Edward Allspach, Michael E. Carls, Jerry Brooks, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch and Steve Worner. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the September 30, 2003, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed and approved inventory of work orders for the month of September in the amount of \$78,702.93.

The board reviewed September 2003 general fund checks #11730 - #11928 amounting to \$2,799,095.17. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

The board reviewed 46 membership applications and 20 service permits for the month. The membership applications and service permits were approved and accepted.

The manager introduced the staff, who discussed their proposed budgets for fiscal year 2004. Manager Frasco presented the proposed General Manager's Budget and the proposed Director's Fees and Expense Budget.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. He advised that Leo Savage's truck had been received and has been placed into service. He reported that he had attended the Northern District Managers Meeting. McDonough Power Cooperative still had not reached final terms with the IBEW for their contract and they were still in negotiations with the IBEW. Spoon River Electric Cooperative announced that the proposed Ethanol Plant in their service area appeared to be stalled. He advised that the RECC board had increased its Director Per Diem to \$200 per meeting for Credentialed Directors and \$150 for non-credentialed Directors. Manager Frasco advised that the ATS billing conversion was going "fairly well." He stated that the cooperative was running both billing systems and that later that week the coop would be running bills on those systems. He discussed an e-mail from the cooperative's auditor discussing FASB 150. He advised that the Accounting Standards Board was proposing that the obligation to pay capital credits be shown as a liability rather than an asset. This would mean that the cooperative would reclassify capital credits as a liability on its balance sheet and obviously this would have an effect on the equity position of the cooperative. Manager Frasco discussed the fact that if this change were to occur it would take effect in December 2004. He discussed the need then to change the cooperative's by-laws with regard to patronage capital if this went into effect. He discussed the Broadband Over Power Lines Conference. He reviewed with the board correspondence from a member with regard to PowerNet Global. The member had checked other rates and felt that the cooperative could be more competitive. Manager Frasco discussed this correspondence and his proposed response.

The Manager presented the financial report for the month of September 2003. Year to date margins totaled \$626,937 compared to \$1,246,153 for the same period in 2002. Equity as of September 30, 2003, was 38.58 percent and the number of members served was 10,098 compared to 9,921 a year ago. The average Farm & Residential bill was \$123.44 compared to \$131.48 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of September 2003 was \$26,005,834 compared to \$25,173,605 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The Manager's report was accepted as presented.

There were no Director's Special Occasion Vouchers for the month.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities Manager Frasco advised that he had successfully negotiated a contract with Adams and Associates for Phase 1 and Phase 2. He discussed the changes that had been agreed upon to the original contract and reviewed the time frame schedule.

Manager Frasco advised on the status of the plans for the Sporting Clays Event scheduled for November 8, 2003.

Director Carls reported that the Soyland/CCS meeting was scheduled for the following week.

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, November 25, 2003, at 6:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

And this experience is unique to cooperative members because cooperatives follow a set of seven principles that differentiate them from other electric utilities. These principles are:

- 1) Voluntary and Open Membership. Cooperatives are open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.
- 2) Democratic Member Control. Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. The elected representatives are accountable to the membership. In electric cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one vote per member).
- 3) Members' Economic Participation. Members contribute equitably to, and democratically con-

trol, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital is the common property of the co-op.

- 4) Autonomy and Independence. Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members and maintain the co-op's autonomy.
- 5) Education, Training and Information. Cooperatives provide education and training for their members, elected representatives and employees so they can contribute effectively to the development of their co-ops. They inform the general public about the nature and benefits of co-ops.
- 6) Cooperation Among Co-ops. Cooperatives serve their members most effectively by working together through local, national, regional and international structures.
- 7) Concern for Community. While focusing on member needs, cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies accepted by their members.

enard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 25, 2003, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Edward Allspach, Michael E. Carls, Jerry Brooks, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch and Steve Worner. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the October 23, 2003, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed and approved Inventory of Work orders for the month of October in the amount of \$43,415.53.

The board reviewed October 2003 General Fund Checks #11929 - #12115 amounting to \$1,742,592.10. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the Outage Summary and Safety Reports.

Manager Frasco discussed the ATS Conversion. He advised that the cooperative sent out reminder notices under the new billing system, along with bills under the new billing system. He stated that there were several problems that had to be overcome. He advised that the Dell server had some sort of flaw. The Dell representative had been present and had made the necessary repairs to the hardware.

The Manager reported that there had been problems with regard to anyone who had a meter change out. It was his opinion that the number of problems would decrease each month. He advised that there were many telephone calls from members inquiring about the \$16.00 service charge appearing on the bill. The Manager reported that this \$16.00 service charge had been charged by the Cooperative for many years and was something that had not been itemized on previous bills. The new bill itemized this \$16.00 service charge separately. He advised that he and the staff had fielded many telephone calls in this regard.

He discussed Senate Bill 1330 with the Board and how it affected current policy. The Manager reported on the recent Sporting Clay event. He reminded the Board that the NRECA 2004 Annual Meeting was scheduled for February 15th through 18th in New Orleans. He discussed with the Board the plans for that meeting.

He reported that the Financial Accounting Standards Board had indefinitely suspended the

proposed change to FAS 150.

Manager Frasco and Attorney Smith discussed the status of matters with regard to the Horizon/ Turris Coal Bankruptcy. There was a discussion that Peabody Energy was pursuing a possible purchase of Turris and its possible effect on the Cooperative.

Manager Frasco presented a report on the status of Missouri Electric Works. He advised that he had recently received a report which indicated that things were going reasonably well and that there should be \$4.5 to \$5 million in refunds that the cooperative would share in as a potentially responsible party.

The Manager presented the financial report for the month of October 2003. Year to date margins totaled \$687,567 compared to \$1,199,162 for the same period in 2002. Equity as of October 31, 2003 was 38.50 percent and the number of members served was 9,969 compared to 9,979 a year ago. The average Farm & Residential bill was \$118.85 compared to \$114.41 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of October 2003 was \$26,220,201 compared to \$25,187,306 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The Manager's report was accepted as presented.

It was moved and seconded that Directors' Special Occasion Vouchers in the amount of \$530.64 were approved as presented.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities Manager Frasco reviewed with the Board the preliminary 2004 Budget.

Director Carls reported on the Soyland/CCS monthly board meeting.

The Board postponed viewing the NRECA video on economic development.

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, December 23, 2003, at 6:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the Board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

Surge suppression program expands


Today, more than any time in the past, our homes are filled with sophisticated electronic equipment and expensive appliances that are more sensitive than ever before. As a result, voltage irregularities due to lightning can easily damage appliances, televisions, stereos, telephones and other electronic devices resulting in costly repairs. It is for this reason your cooperative has expanded its program even further in reducing this type of expense and allowing members a choice in the coverage they purchase.

The cooperative will continue to provide whole house protection for "white" appliances at a monthly cost of \$4.95, as it has in the past. In addition to this basic service, you can now protect the sensitive electronic devices in your home as well as electromechanical appliances for a minimal investment of \$49.95 and a monthly cost of \$5.95.

For members who want to protect the major electromechanical appliances in their home, such as the refrigerator, washer, dryer, range, dishwasher, etc. the cooperative will continue to offer the Basic Surge Protection Plan. For \$4.95 per month on your bill we will install a whole house surge protector on your electric meter which offers excellent protection for these "white" appliances. This is less than 17 cents per day and not only covers the cost of the surge protector and installation, but also all future maintenance.

For members who want to go one step further and protect the sensitive electronic equipment in their home such as a computer, television, stereo, telephone, answering machine, clock radio, etc, the cooperative is now offering the Premium Surge Protection Plan. For an initial investment of \$49.95 and a monthly payment of \$5.95, you will receive a point of use surge protection package in addition to the installation of the whole house surge protector. This package includes four individual point of use surge protectors that can be used to protect a television, entertainment center or computer center, along with a cordless phone or answering machine and two or three other pieces of electronic equipment. This kit also includes a handy circuit receptacle tester to let you know if your home grounding is adequate or if changes need to

With these individual devices installed on your telephone, computer, television, etc. to offer protection at the electric meter, you will be able to rest easy the next time a storm is in the area.

enard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, December 22, 2003, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Michael E. Carls, Jerry Brooks, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, and Steve Worner. Director Ed Allspach was absent. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco, and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the November 25, 2003 board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed and approved Inventory of Work orders for the month of November in the amount of \$61,332.31.

The board reviewed November 2003 General Fund Checks #12116 - #12279 amounting to \$1,327,063.16. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the Outage Summary and Safety Reports. Manager Frasco discussed the ATS Conversion and a problem that had arisen as to the manner in which the software handles staff members who were paid on a monthly basis. He updated the Board on the Low Income Energy Assistance Program. He reported that General Foreman Terry Entwistle had located a Vermeer Trencher that could be purchased for a substantial savings, \$14,000 under the list price. It was the consensus of the Board to authorize the purchase of the trencher. Manager Frasco asked Attorney Smith to give a report on the Horizon/Turris Bankruptcy and the effect it would have on the cooperative. The Manager advised the board of a \$500,000 grant the AIEC received from the Illinois Clean Energy Foundation to promote geo thermal systems. He reviewed the details of the grant program. He advised the Board that a member of the board had discussed the possibility of the cooperative paying interest on prepayments of electric bills. He reported that certain cooperative members had prepaid their power bill prior to the end of the year for income tax purposes. There was a discussion whether or not the cooperative would pay interest or would provide some sort of discount as was done by other businesses. After discussion, it was the consensus of the board to have Manager Frasco investigate whether or not the new software had a feature, which would deal with interest on prepayments of electric bills. The Manager gave the Board an update on Menard Rural Water Cooperative and he advised that he attended the cooperative's annual meeting. He reviewed with the Board a map of the water cooperative which indicated the possible extension of service called Phase II. He also reviewed with the Board the status of the headquarters building project. He advised that he had received a copy of the drilling report that stated that soil conditions were more than adequate for construction of the new headquarters building. He reported that the percolation test would not support a standard septic system. He discussed the type of septic system that would have to be installed.

The Manager presented the financial report for the month of November 2003. Year to date margins totaled \$717,771 compared to \$1,154,668 for the same period in 2002. Equity as of November 30, 2003 was 39.17% and the number of members served was 9,944 compared to 9,984 a year ago. The average Farm & Residential bill was \$103.46 compared to \$104.90 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of November 2003 was \$26,392,197 compared to \$25,168,204 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The Manager's report was accepted as presented.

There were no Directors' Special Occasion vouchers for the month.

Director Brooks reported on AIEC activities

Manager Frasco reviewed with the Board the 2004 Budget. It was moved and seconded that the budget be approved as presented.

Manager Frasco reviewed the Touchstone License Agreement for 2004.

Manager Frasco advised that after completing the 2003 Inventory there was a shortage of \$3,826.81. It was moved and seconded that the inventory adjustment be approved.

Manager Frasco reviewed with the Board the PCB Spill Plan. It was moved and seconded that the plan be approved.

Pool Safety

t's prime time for installing swimming pools. So if you're considering adding a pool this year, make sure that you choose your site carefully, with an eye to any power lines that may be overhead or underground. When doing so, consider these key safety points:

- Make sure overhead electrical lines do not pass over the pool. In fact, it's best to keep your pool at least 25 feet away from power lines in all directions.
- Allow at least 18 feet of clearance between overhead power lines and a diving

board, deck, platform, slide or observation area.

- Never build an in-ground pool or set up an aboveground pool over underground electric cables. Pools and pool decking should be installed at least five feet away from all underground utility lines.
- Except for specially designed lighting fixtures, don't put electrical fixtures or receptacles within five feet of a pool. Any electrical wiring that is within 20 feet of a swimming pool should have protection from a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter.

enard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, January 27, 2004, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Michael E. Carls, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch and Steve Worner. Directors Ed Allspach and Jerry W. Brooks were absent. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

The manager introduced Joe Van Lear, who was the representative for Menard Electric Cooperative on the Youth to Washington Tour. Mr. Van Lear was also selected to represent the State of Illinois at the NRECA National Convention in New Orleans in February 2004.

Minutes of the December 23, 2003, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed and approved inventory of work orders for the month of December in the amount of \$106,587.99.

The board reviewed December 2003 general fund checks #12280 - #12433 amounting to \$3,450,542.31. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

Manager Frasco presented the manager's report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. Under the operations report the manager discussed work completed by Terry Entwistle and the operations department. The manager reminded the board that the Irrigated Growers Meeting was scheduled for February 20 at the Mason County Farm Bureau Building. He reported that Jim Rechner would be representing the cooperative at the meeting.

Manager Frasco discussed the proposed changes to the service area agreement between the cooperative and Illinois Power. He reviewed the proposed changes and advised that this matter would be referred to Attorney Tice for his review and comment. He advised that the cooperative would be conducting a hot water heater load control survey. He reminded the board that this survey was necessary because several load control receivers did not operate properly during the summer of 2003.

He reported on the ATS conversion and noted

that the staff had found many issues to deal with, but they were moving ahead with the conversion. He discussed the various problems, which had arisen as part of the conversion process. He reminded the board that there was a strategic planning course from NRECA scheduled at the AIEC headquarters on February 3 and 4, 2004. Manager Frasco reported on the various meetings he attended in the last month.

The manager presented the financial report for the month of December 2003. Year to date margins totaled \$680,142 compared to \$759,823 for the same period in 2002. Equity as of December 31, 2003, was 38.62 percent and the number of members served was 9,931 compared to 9,968 a year ago. The average farm and residential bill was \$113.58 compared to \$109.34 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of December 2003 was \$26,481,051 compared to \$25,304,025 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The manager's report was accepted as presented.

There were no directors' special occasion vouchers for the month.

In the absence of Director Brooks, Manager Frasco reported on AIEC activities.

It was moved and presented that the uncollectible accounts as presented to the board be written off.

Manager Frasco discussed capital credit refunds for 2004. The board agreed to retire up to \$300,000 in general retirements of capital credits and up to \$100,000 to estates during calendar year 2004.

Director Carls reported on the Soyland/CCS activities during the month.

The manager reviewed with the board an analysis from Adams and Associates with regard to the design bid finalists. After discussion the board agreed to select the five design bid finalists.

The manager reviewed proposed rate adjustments from Burton Tree Service. After discussion the board approved an hourly rate increase of 3.00 percent for Burton Tree Service

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, February 24, 2004, at 6:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.



Menard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, February 24, 2004, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Michael E. Carls, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, Steve Worner, Ed Allspach and Jerry W. Brooks. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco, and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the January 27, 2004, board meeting were reviewed

and approved as presented.

The board reviewed January 2004 general fund checks #12434 - #12713 amounting to \$1,299,796.98. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

Agreements for electric service for John O. Willett, Dean Pfeiffer, Lloyd Behrends, John Ermeling, and Robert E. Fornoff were approved as presented.

Manager Frasco advised that for the month of November 2003 there were 31 membership applications and 13 service permits.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. Under the operations report the manager discussed work completed by Terry Entwistle and the operations department. The manager reported that he believed the Thompson case was finally drawing to a conclusion. He advised that there had been a hearing in the Menard County Courthouse and Mr. Thompson did not appear. An application would be made to the NRUCFC Integrity Fund for reimbursement of the legal fees that the cooperative had incurred with this case. He reported on the status of a small claims suit with regard to some tree trimming problems in Mason County.

The manager reported that he had signed addendums to the Power Net Global Agreement related to rate reductions for PNG Long Distance Service. He informed the board that the AIEC had sent a notice to the cooperative asking us to participate in Project Safe Child, which involved the distribution of gunlocks. He also advised that he had visited with individuals who were trying to develop the ethanol plant in Elkhart. He reported that things were going reasonably well with the ATS Conversion. He reported that next month the bills should have the historic usage graph on them. A review was made of the materials that detailed and described the new headquarters building and the status of the construction project. He advised that Jim Rechner and John Whitehurst attended the irrigated growers meeting.

Director Frye reported on the meeting and advised that he felt Jim Rechner had done a good job. He reviewed with the board the results of the water heater load control test conducted by the cooperative's staff. He reported that the results of the test had shown that it was necessary to check water heater switches. The test found that many of the switches were not operating properly. He also reported on the testing of the irrigation control switches.

The manager presented the financial report for the month of January 2004. Year to date margins totaled \$29,383 compared to \$38,325 for the same period in 2003. Equity as of January 31, 2004, was 37.86 percent and the number of members served was 9,902 compared to 9,940 a year ago. The average farm and residential bill was \$124.97 compared to \$121.08 a year ago. Net utility plant at the end of January 2004 was \$26,575,657 compared to \$25,410,921 a

year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders; RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The manager's report was accepted as presented.

Directors' special occasion vouchers for the month in the amount of \$5,528.39 were approved.

Director Goetsch reported that there was no AIEC meeting this month.

The board discussed in detail the Soyland CCS power supply options. Manager Frasco presented to the board, along with Director Carls, a detailed analysis of their thoughts and comments with regard to the Prairie State Proposal. After much discussion, it was the recommendation of Manager Frasco that the cooperative only consider participation in Prairie State with certain conditions, such as the participation be limited to 50 megawatts with RUS financing. Manager Frasco reported that he and Director Carls would be discussing and pursuing the matter further through the Soyland Board. It was the consensus of both Manager Frasco and Director Carls that this was something that Soyland should consider participating in, as it would provide for long time rate stability. They also discussed with the board the global energy option.

The board had previously asked Manager Frasco to prepare a report with regard to rebates provided by the cooperative. The board reviewed the report that compared the rebates given by the cooperative to other cooperatives and utilities in the area. After discussion it was the opinion of the board that the Manager come to next month's meeting with recommendations as to a revision of the rebate program.

Director Brooks reported on the annual meeting committee meeting and discussed the status of the plans for the 2004 Annual Meeting.

Manager Frasco discussed the capital credit refund report.

Director Carls reported on the Soyland/CCS activities during the month.

The manager reported that Cingular had contacted the cooperative with regard to its desire to place an antenna on the cooperative's tower east of Petersburg. The manager advised that he proposed that they construct a new tower on the cooperative's site, with the understanding that they permit the cooperative to place any and all of its equipment on the new tower. Cingular would own the new tower, but they would pay a monthly lease fee to the cooperative for the utilization of the cooperative site. He advised that Cingular had submitted a proposed lease and that he would get the lease to attorney Smith. It was the consensus of the board that the manager proceed with the negotiations.

Manager Frasco reported on the January 29, 2004, meeting with Illinois Rural.

Under other business Manager Frasco reminded the board about the NRECA Legislative Conference, which was scheduled for Washington, D.C. May 3-6, 2004.

It was moved and seconded that Director Goetsch be appointed as a delegate to the Illinois workers compensation annual meeting and that Manager Frasco would be the alternate.

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, March 23, 2004, at 6:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

According to Frasco, this is important for co-op members as nearly two-thirds of the co-op's total cost of operations is driven by the wholesale power cost.

Frasco said construction of the new centralized headquarters facility near New Salem will begin later this summer. He stated that during the past 67 years, expansion has forced the cooperative to be spread among four different buildings on seven sites throughout the community. Frasco said, "The primary reasons for this move are to improve operating efficiency and reduce future building maintenance or modernization costs for existing facilities that cannot meet current building codes and government regulations. This will greatly improve our overall productivity, and the resulting savings will offset the cost of the new headquarters."

He also talked about implementation of the new customer billing and collection software system, and its member benefits. He said the new system will include additional information for members, such as a 13-month usage history and pertinent co-op updates. It will also allow (Continued on 16b)

the co-op to offer a wider range of payment options, such as automatic bill payment.

Frasco also announced that PNG, the co-op's long distance carrier, has dropped its rates.

The out-of-state rate decreased 2 cents to 4.9 cents per minute, and the in-state rate decreased from 4.9 cents per minute to 4.5

cents per minute.

Treasurer Roy Seaney said Menard Electric added 155 new services and 53 miles of distribution line in 2003. The co-op ended with margins of \$672,066, a slight decrease from the prior year's margins. Seaney added that the cooperative was able to retire \$389,254 of capital credits to members.

Board President Gary Martin discussed the theme of this year's annual meeting, "Grounded by Our Promise," saying that doesn't mean that the co-op can keep the lights on all of the time. "He said, "There are some things we can't control like the weather or the transmission grid, which would make that an impossible promise to keep. What we can promise is that we will do our best to serve your needs." He

also said the co-op is not beholden to shareholders to make a profit. "Your board is elected from the membership and through us, you have a voice in the direction of your cooperative." That is the cooperative way.

During the meeting, Ierry Brooks of Oakford, Roy Seaney of Tallula, and Steve Worner of Manito were re-elected to the co-op's board of directors.

Menard Electric Cooperative is a not-forprofit cooperative serving

9,973 homes, farms, and businesses located in mostly rural areas of Cass, Logan, Macon, Mason, Menard, Morgan, Sangamon, and Tazewell Counties.

Menard Electric Cooperative From the Board Room March 23, 2004

Menard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 23, 2004, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Michael E. Carls, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, Steve Worner, Ed Allspach and Jerry W. Brooks. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco, and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the February 24, 2004, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed February 2004 general fund checks #12651 - #12831 amounting to \$1,354,867.51. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

Agreements for electric service for Dennis O. Hollenbeck and James W. Roberts were approved as presented.

Manager Frasco advised that for the month of December 2003 there were 47 membership applications and 19 service permits.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. Under the operations report the manager discussed work completed by Terry Entwistle and the operations department. He reported that things were continuing to go well with the ATS Conversion. He reported on the revised Blue Cross Blue Shield Plan and reported on the rate comparison with the current plan. He advised that Cingular was still investigating the possibility of utilizing the cooperative's tower site for the construction of its own tower. He advised that he signed a temporary access agreement for Cingular for them to go on the property and do their own site survey. He advised that the Thompson service was scheduled for connection this week. He advised that Sheriff Smith or a deputy would be present to enforce the cooperative's right to enter upon the Thompson property to provide electrical service.

The manager advised that he had gone to a meeting before the City of Virginia Board of Trustees to discuss the possible franchise agreement. He advised that he made a presentation to the trustees. The city attorney advised that he would be in contact with Attorney Smith to discuss the matter. The manager reported that Kevin Kelso would be present at the May meeting to present the results of the annual audit. The manager reported that he had a conference call with the Illinois Bio Energy Group to discuss the possibility of the cooperative supplying energy to the ethanol plant at Elkhart.

The manager presented the financial report for the month of February 2004. Year to date margins totaled \$125,269 compared to \$208,693 for the same period in 2003. Equity as of February 2004 was 37.37 percent and the number of members served was 9,885 compared to 9,909 a year ago. The average farm and residential bill was \$121.74 compared to \$121.04 a year ago. Net utility plant at the end of February 2004 was \$26,594,453 compared to \$25,430,348 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders, RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The manager's report was accepted as presented.

Directors' special occasion vouchers for the month in the amount of \$186.00 were approved.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities.

Director Carls reported on Soyland/CCS activities.

Manager Frasco reported to the board the details of the proposed new rebate program. The new program provides adjustments to the existing rebates. The board adopted the new program effective October 1, 2004. Director Brooks made a motion to drop the Certified Comfort Home rebate program entirely. Director Carls seconded the motion. By roll call vote there were four votes to adopt the amendment and four opposed to the amendment. President Martin broke the tie by voting against the amendment.

Manager Frasco reviewed with the board the tree trimming bids. There were only two bids, which were submitted by Burton Tree Service and Wright Tree Service. The manager recommended that the board accept the Burton bid.

Director Brooks reported on the annual meeting committee meeting and discussed the status of the plans for the 2004 Annual Meeting.

Manager Frasco discussed the capital credit refund report.

Under other business Manager Frasco reminded the board about the NRECA Legislative Conference which was scheduled for Washington, D.C. May 3-6, 2004.

The manager reported on the status of the building project. He advised that the project was let for bids and the bids were to be received the first week of April. He recommended that when the bids are received that the building committee meet to review and analyze the bids so that the committee could make a recommendation to the board.

The next meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, April 27, 2004, at 7:00 p.m. There being no further business to come before the board, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

More than 1,400 students from 43 states descended on the nation's capitol in June for the 40th anniversary of the National Youth Tour. Sixty-four outstanding young leaders from throughout Illinois joined the tour this year. The students wrote essays, applications, or were personally interviewed by representatives of their local electric and telephone cooperatives for selection for the trip.

The participants saw some amazing sites in Washington, D.C., including Gettysburg; the Smithsonian Museums; memorials of Lincoln, Jefferson, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the Vietnam War, the Korean War and World War II; the Washington National Monument and National Cathedral; an Iwo Jima Parade and Pageant; the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery; the Royal Embassy of Saudi Arabia: and the Memorial Holocaust Museum.

In addition to these sites that gave

the students a feel for their country, its wars, its presidents and its history, the students toured the Capitol, saw a debate in action in the House Gallery, and met with their local congressman and Senator Dick Durbin to discuss current events and what young voters can do to change their country for the better. Durbin discussed the current situation overseas, education and health care issues, current bills affecting energy prices, and other issues important to the students.

In addition to watching democracy in action, the students practiced democracy by voting for an Illinois representative to the National Youth Leadership Council. Max Nash-Howe of Macomb, sponsored by McDonough Power Cooperative in Macomb, was selected and will represent Illinois students at events throughout the year.

The students also learned The board of directors (voted on by

the members) held an annual meeting, and determined pricing of items, membership fees, salaries of employees and capital credit returns for members. All of the students who paid the \$.50 membership fee, and purchased from the co-op, received capital credits before going home. The chip n' pop co-op taught the students all the basic workings of a cooperative.

The Illinois students also joined the other 42 states for a National Youth Day Assembly. New Rebates Effective October 1, 2004

Water Heater Rebates and Rate

This water heater rebate program is available on a One-time basis to all members who install a new electric water heater or an existing fossil fuel-fired water heater with an electric water heater that has at least a 40-gallon capacity. If the new electric water heater is installed in a new structure or replaces a fossil fuel fired water heater you will receive a \$100 rebate. For the second new water heater you will receive \$75. If the new electric water heater replaces an existing electric water heater you will receive a \$75 rebate. To qualify for the rebate you must sign up for the cooperative's load management program. In addition to the rebate above you will qualify for a 3 cent per kilowatt-hour rate reduction on kilowatt-hours used between 600 and 1,000 every month of the year. This could save you up to \$144 each year in addition to the rebate.

Geothermal Rebates & Rates

The rebate is \$600 per unit regardless of the size of the unit installed. The unit can be installed in either a new or existing home. If you install a geothermal heating and cooling system in an all-electric home you will also be eligible for your cooperative's geothermal rate. Under this rate you will be billed 5 cents per kilowatt-hour for all kilowatt-hours used between 1,000 and 6,000 for the billing months of October through May each year.

Heat Pump Rebates

Your cooperative is offering a \$200 rebate regardless of the size of the unit installed.

Certified Comfort Home Rebate

If you build a new home to the standards described in the Certified Comfort Home book you will receive a one-time \$100 rebate.

Menard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, April 27, 2004, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were Michael E. Carls, James G. Graff, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, Steve Worner, Ed Allspach, and Jerry W. Brooks. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the March 23, 2004, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed March 2004 General Fund Checks #12832 - #13008 amounting to \$1,438,734.13. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

It was moved and seconded that the inventory of work orders for the month of March in the amount of \$167,464.95 be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Agreements for electric service for Rudolph Nordhausen, Dennis R. Hahn, Zachary A. Charlton, Dennis Hubert, and Carolyn Thies were approved as presented.

Manager Frasco advised that for the month of March 2004 there were 45 membership applications and 17 service permits.

Manager Frasco presented the manager's report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. He reported that there were applications to install 24 new irrigation systems. He advised the board about the transfer of duties between staff members Jones and Hinton. He advised that there was no further action by Cingular with regard to the tower site. He reported on the numerous outages for the month and the reasons for them. He reviewed the status of the water heater load control investigation and also reported on the ATS conversion.

He reported on the staff testing of the Capital Credit Checks and that the testing was not going well. He stated that there was a possibility that the Capital Credit Checks may not be mailed out until after the annual meeting.

Manager Frasco discussed with the board the Sherman Franchise and the meeting he had with the Mayor and Attorney of Sherman. He advised that the cooperative's franchise with Sherman was up for renewal. He advised that the mayor wanted some proposal with regard to a municipal rate for Sherman residents who were being served by Menard. There was a lengthy discussion with regard to this request. After much discussion it was agreed that the manager have authority to develop and propose a municipal rate to obtain a franchise renewal from Sherman.

The manager reported on the Northern District managers' meeting. He also reported that St. John's Hospital was offering a member discount to cooperative members. The board instructed the manager to investigate the discount program further.

He discussed with the board the status of developments with regard to the Menard Rural Water Cooperative. Manager Frasco advised that he had been approached by Wayne Jones, President of the water cooperative, to inquire if Menard Electric would be interested in discussing some sort of future involvement between the two cooperatives. It was the consensus of the board to investigate this matter further and to appoint a committee to meet with representatives from the water cooperative. President Martin appointed directors Seaney, Brooks, Goetsch, and Carls to the Committee and appointed Director Carls

as Chairperson.

The manager discussed the Youth to Washington Trip and advised that Nathan Averbeck was awarded the \$1,000 IEC Memorial Scholarship.

The manager advised that he had sent a letter to the Village of Mechanicsburg requesting consideration of granting the cooperative a franchise. He proposed that the franchise be similar to the one recently approved by the City of Virginia.

The manager presented the financial report for the month of March 2004. Year to date margins totaled \$77,743 compared to \$190,571 for the same period in 2003. Equity as of March 2004 was 38.31 percent and the number of members served was 9,892 compared to 9,874 a year ago. The average farm and residential bill was \$107.45 compared to \$104.03 a year ago. Net utility plant at the end of March 2004 was \$26,608,657 compared to \$25,556,519 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders, RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The manager's report was accepted as presented.

Directors' special occasion vouchers for the month in the amount of \$1,342.51 were approved.

Director Goetsch reported on AIEC activities.

Manager Frasco reported on Soyland/CCS activities. He discussed the status of the Ameren/CIPS Intervention and advised that Attorney Tice was representing nine of the 11 Soyland members in the intervention.

The board of directors reviewed the proposed franchise agreement with the City of Virginia. Manager Frasco advised that he anticipated receiving the signed franchise agreement in the near future. It was moved and seconded that the cooperative be authorized to enter into the franchise agreement once the signed agreement had been received. Motion approved.

Manager Frasco reported on the evaluation of the two bids to be considered for the construction of the cooperative's new headquarters building. Those bids were from Jones-Blythe and River City. The board reviewed in detail Manager Frasco's evaluation of the two bids and his price analysis thereof. After much discussion, it was moved and seconded that the cooperative hire Jones-Blythe to construct the new headquarters. Motion carried. He advised that he would inform Jones-Blythe of this decision and would then be discussing with them the finalization of their bid. It was his suggestion that the building committee have a meeting prior to next month's board meeting.

St. John's Hospital offers savings to Menard members

Members of Menard Electric Cooperative who have no medical insurance are eligible to save on the cost of services from St. John's Hospital in Springfield, under an arrangement that became effective on July 1, 2004. The savings are being offered by St. John's to help those who, for whatever reason, are uninsured and are not eligible for healthcare benefits such as Medicare or Medicaid.

"This new agreement will mean a huge savings for a co-op member who needs treatment and goes to St. John's Hospital," says Menard

General Manager Lynn Frasco. "Today's medical procedures are often expensive, but this plan makes them more affordable for the consumers who may be most vulnerable to a financial hardship."

A 30 percent discount is available to active co-op members and their spouses and dependents. It applies to inpatient and outpatient charges from St. John's Hospital, but not to physicians' charges or services from other companies. Examples of covered outpatient services include Home Health Care, Home Infusion Therapy, AthletiCare, Wellness Care, and the Mind/Body Medicine Program.

St. John's is offering the savings to active members of Menard Electric Cooperative. Patients covered by insurance typically receive a negotiated discount on medical services provided by hospitals. St. John's also offers a prompt payment discount and will work with the uninsured patient to set-up an affordable monthly payment plan.

Co-op members can bring a copy of a recent electric bill to the hospital upon registration to

show their membership. The hospital will then issue a member card, to be used for subsequent visits. The 30 percent discount will automatically be applied to any charges billed for St. John's Hospital.

"St. John's has a long tradition of providing quality health care services to the people of central Illinois. We are pleased that we were able work with the Cooperative to offer a special savings plan to its members," said Richard Carlson, FACHE, executive vice president, St. John's Hospital. "We hope this agreement will

serve as a model for other organizations.

These types of arrangements help us fulfill our commitment to providing the very best health care to all our patients."

Menard Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, May 25, 2004, in the office at Petersburg. President Gary L. Martin called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Directors present in addition to President Martin were: Michael E. Carls, Roy H. Seaney, D. Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, Steve Worner, Ed Allspach, and Jerry W. Brooks. Director James G. Graff was absent. Also present were Manager Lynn A. Frasco and Attorney Charles K. Smith. After roll call, the agenda for the meeting was approved.

Minutes of the April 27, 2004, board meeting were reviewed and approved as presented.

The board reviewed April 2004 General Fund Checks #13009 - #13209 amounting to \$1,270,980.42. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

It was moved and seconded that the inventory of work orders for the month of April in the amount of \$114,955.65 be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Agreements for electric service for Linda Davis, David & Iodi Daykin, Candace M. Cooper, and Gary Hodgson were approved as presented.

Manager Frasco introduced the cooperative's auditor, Kevin Kelso, who reviewed the 2003 audit with the board. After Mr. Kelso's review the president called the board into executive session to discuss the audit further with Mr. Kelso. President Martin adjourned the executive session and reconvened the regular session.

The building committee presented its report with regard to the construction of the new cooperative headquarters. The board reviewed the proposed contract with Jones & Blythe. Manager Frasco reviewed in detail the committee's recommendations with regard to additions and deletions to the contract, and the final cost figure of the contract. After discussion it was moved and seconded that the design build contract with Jones & Blythe be approved. Motion carried.

Manager Frasco then introduced Aaron Johnson, General Field Representative of the Rural Utilities Service. Mr. Johnson presented three board resolutions for consideration related to the cooperatives new applications for loans and for a 10-year financial forecast.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the outage summary and safety reports. He advised that he had not been able to schedule a time to meet with Sherman's Mayor and the Attorney for the Village of Sherman to discuss further the cooperative franchise. He advised that staff had met with AmerenCIPS representatives to discuss territorial issues with regard to East Bluffs Subdivision. He advised the two entities had agreed upon a service area with regard to the new addition to the East Bluff Subdivision.

Manager Frasco advised that NRECA was canceling the Supplemental Life Insurance Program for cooperative employees. He discussed with the board the proposed Bad Debt Policy and Collection Procedure. He advised that Wayne Iones had suggested changes as a result of the Menard County Circuit Clerk increasing filing fees substantially for small claims and other collection matters. Manager Frasco recommended that rather than pursuing matters in small claims court all unpaid bills would be turned over to a collection agency. He also suggested tightening up the cooperative's security deposit policy and raising such from \$100 to \$200 for new accounts. He suggested modifying the way security deposits were returned to members. He suggested that there would be a longer time that the security deposit was held before it was returned to the member and rather than sending a check it would be credited to the member's bill. After discussion it was the consensus of the board that the manager come back to the board with suggested modifications and changes to the policy.

Manager Frasco reviewed with the board the letter of agreement with St. Johns Hospital for the discount program to be offered to uninsured cooperative members. Manager Frasco reviewed with the board the contract extension for Park Place Subdivision. The board approved the extension. The manager presented to the board a two-year audit agreement with Dreyer & Kelso. The board approved the agreement.

The manager presented the financial report for the month of April 2004. Year to date margins totaled (\$43,023) compared to \$166,291 for the same period in 2003. Equity as of April 2004 was 38.10 percent and the number of members served was 9,919 compared to 9,922 a year ago. The average Farm & Residential bill was \$96.92 compared to \$96.24 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of April 2004 was \$26,601,402 compared to \$25,766,918 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of its lenders, RUS, FFB, and NRUCFC. The manager's report was accepted as presented.

The board reviewed September 2004 General Fund Checks #13867 - #14038 amounting to \$1,902,299.86. After discussion, the payment of bills was approved.

It was moved and seconded that the Inventory of Work orders for the month of August in the amount of \$425,716.18 be approved as presented. Motion carried.

Manager Frasco reported that there were 48 Membership Applications and 14 Service Permits for July and 60 Membership Applications and 15 Service Permits for August. Agreements for Electric Service for United Realty Consultants and Kathleen Davis were approved as presented.

Manager Frasco presented the Manager's Report for the month. He reviewed the Outage Summary and Safety Reports. Under the operations report the Manager advised that the cooperative had done an automated meter reading test and the automated meter reading seemed to be working well. He advised that an appeal had been received by the AIEC from the Alabama State Wide Association for crews to assist with hurricane damage repair. He advised that Menard had sent men and equipment. He advised that there was an article in the State Journal Register with regard to assistance provided by local cooperatives to the Alabama Statewide. He anticipated that Menard men would be home shortly. Manager Frasco advised that he would be attending a Sherman City Council Meeting on October 5th to discuss the Sherman Franchise. He advised that the cooperative was involved in the new process of Dispute Resolution with Ameren/CIPS on the Latham Subdivision. He stated that Menard was one of the first cooperatives to enter into the new Dispute Resolution process.

The Manager presented the Financial Report for the Month of August 2004. Year to date margins were \$259,267 compared to \$250,690 the previous year. Equity as of the end of August was 37.72% and the number of members served was 10,019 compared

to 9,989 last year. Net Utility Plant at the end of August was \$26,801,101 compared to \$25, 990,497 a year ago. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of RUS, CFC and the FFB.

Director Goetsch presented the report of the building committee and discussed the status of the plans related to marketing the cooperative's property that would now be for sale as a result of the construction of the cooperative's new headquarters building. He advised that an analysis had been made of the asking price for the cooperative's existing properties. He discussed and reviewed those asking prices. Manager Frasco suggested that he contact the individuals who had informed him they were interested in purchasing certain properties. He would then give them the first chance to purchase the property or properties at the asking price. If the properties did not then sell they would then be listed with the realtors. The Board gave approval to the Manager to market the properties in such a manner. Manager Frasco reported on the status of the Headquarters building.

The Board considered the non-union salary adjustments. The board approved the same COLA and 40lk adjustments as they did for the union employees in July.

St. John's Hospital offers savings to Menard members

Members of Menard Electric Cooperative who have no medical insurance are eligible to save on the cost of services from St. John's Hospital in Springfield, under an arrangement that became effective on July 1, 2004. The savings are being offered by St. John's to help those who, for whatever reason, are uninsured and are not eligible for healthcare benefits such as Medicare or Medicaid.

"This new agreement will mean a huge savings for a co-op member who needs treatment and goes to St. John's Hospital,"

says Menard General Manager Lynn Frasco. "Today's medical procedures are often expensive, but this plan makes them more affordable for the consumers who may be most vulnerable to a financial hardship."

A 30 percent discount is available to active co-op members and their spouses and dependents. It applies to inpatient and outpatient charges from St. John's Hospital, but not to physicians' charges or services from other companies. Examples of covered outpatient services include Home Health

Care, Home Infusion Therapy, Athleti-Care, Wellness Care, and the Mind/Body Medicine Program.

St. John's is offering the savings to active members of Menard Electric Cooperative. Patients covered by insurance typically receive a negotiated discount on medical services provided by hospitals. St. John's also offers a prompt payment discount and will work with the uninsured patient to setup an affordable monthly payment plan.

Co-op members can bring a copy of

a recent electric bill to the hospital upon registration to show their membership. The hospital will then issue a member card, to be used for subsequent visits. The 30 percent discount will automatically be applied to any charges billed for St. John's Hospital.

"St. John's has a long tradition of providing quality health care services to the people of central Illinois. We are pleased that we were able work with the Cooperative to offer a special savings plan to its members," said Richard Carlson, FACHE, executive vice





NEW REBATES Effective October 1, 2004

■ Water Heater Rebates and Rate

This water heater rebate program is available on a one-time basis to all members who agree to replace an existing fossil fuel fired water heater with an electric water heater that has at least a 40-gallon capacity. If the new electric water heater is installed in a new structure or replaces a fossil fuel fired water heater you will receive a \$100 rebate. For the second new water heater you will receive \$75. If the new electric water heater re-

places an existing electric water heater you will receive a \$75 rebate. To qualify for the rebate you must sign up for the cooperative's load management program. New Security Deposit Policy Effective November 1, 2004

t the discretion of the cooperative, a Adeposit of \$200, or one-sixth (1/6) of estimated annual energy charges for each service location is required of each member prior to installation or connection of a single phase, residential, or seasonal energy account, except those members who provide proof of acceptable payment history. Acceptable payment history is generally defined as having the current 12-month payment record free of collection notices or visits to a service location by a utility employee as certified by the electric utility providing service during that period.

Members who request installation, re-connection, or connection of irrigation, three phase, or commercial energy accounts will be required to pay a deposit for each service location in the amount of \$200 or 1/6 the estimated annual energy charge, whichever is greatest, except those members who provide proof of satisfactory payment history acceptable to the cooperative.

Members who have received service from Menard Electric Cooperative in the past and have a past due balance or have had amounts written-off, and who are requesting installation, re-connection, or connection of an energy account, are automatically required to make security deposits as well as making payment to settle the past debt.

Current active members who have no deposit on file and are subject to collection for past due energy bills or other charges will be required to make a \$100 security deposit at the time the cooperative employee visits the service location for collections or reconnection.

Current active members who file Bankruptcy are required to make a deposit in the amount of 1/6 the estimated annual energy charge for each active residential service or 1/3 the estimated annual energy charge for each active nonresidential service.

The security deposit collected due to Bankruptcy will be refunded only toward the settlement of the final energy bill. All other security deposits will be refunded during the 25th month after the acceptable payment history as defined above, and having no late fees for the past twelve (12) months, has been met or subsequent to settlement of the final energy bill. The cooperative may choose to apply the security deposit refund as a credit to active accounts or to issue a refund check.

This water heater rebate program is available on a one-time basis to all members who agree to replace an existing fossil fuel fired water heater with an electric water heater that has at least a 40-gallon capacity. If the new electric water heater is installed in a new structure or replaces a fossil fuel fired water heater you will receive a \$100 rebate. For the second new water heater you will receive \$75. If the new electric water heater replaces an existing electric water heater you will receive a \$75 rebate. To qualify for the rebate you must sign up for the cooperative's load management program. In addition to the rebate above you will qualify for a 3 cent per kilowatt-hour rate reduction on kilowatt-hours used between 600 and 1,000 every month of the year. This could save you up to \$144 each year in addition to the rebate.

■ Geothermal Rebates & Rates

The rebate is \$600 per unit regardless of the size of the unit installed. The unit can be installed in either a new or existing home. If you install a geothermal heating and cooling system you will also be eligible for your cooperative's geothermal rate, if

■ Heat Pump Rebates

Your cooperative is offering a \$200 re-bate regardless of the size of the unit installed.

you have an all electric home. Under this rate you will be billed 5 cents per kilowatthour for all kilowatt-hours used between 1,000 and 6,000 for the billing months of October through May each year.

■ Certified Comfort Home Rebate

f you build a new home to the standards described in the Certified Comfort Home book you will receive a onetime \$100 rebate.

Incandescent, Halogen, or Compact Fluorescent?

The least expensive bulbs may cost you the most.

n 1879 Thomas Edison had a bright idea – a light bulb – now the icon for all bright ideas. While many of us still use a version of Edison's incandescent bulb, grabbing the first one we glide past while speeding through the supermarket aisles, this least expensive of bulbs may not be the most economical in the long run.

Shopping for new light bulbs can be confusing. Which is best? Which lasts longest? Which will save you money? Below, we have broken down and simplified the different bulb types to make the comparison easier.

- Incandescent- The most common light bulbs are the incandescent bulbs. They cost about \$0.75 per bulb and last about 750 to 1,000 hours (long-life bulbs may last up to 2,500 hours). They give a comfortable spectrum of light and work well with the dimmer switches that are so popular in homes. They also waste energy. Lots of it. In fact, about 90 percent of the energy they produce is released not as light, but as heat. While this may be fine during the cooler months, it can mean higher air conditioning bills in the warmer ones.
- Halogen- Halogen bulbs are more efficient than incandescent bulbs and burn longer. They have a standard life of approximately 2,250 to 3,500 hours and with continued use maintain their clean white light without fading. Unfortunately, rather than using energy efficient standard halogen bulbs, most halogen users employ high-wattage halogen tubes. These energy gluttons create four times more heat than incandescent

bulbs and, with temperatures reaching about 1,200 degrees, they can be serious fire hazards.

■ Compact Fluores-

cent- The words "fluorescent light" may bring horrifying recollections of buzzing light fixtures and visions of dull, sickly, institutional type lighting. But it's time to rethink that image. Today's fluorescent bulbs are the most energy efficient form of lighting out there and the most economical to operate. New electronic ballasts have quieted the buzz and the phosphor-coated glass tubes produce a soothing spectrum of light that closely mimics that of the incandescent bulbs. Fluorescents consume only about one-quarter to one-third of the energy as incandescents and last 10,000 hours or more! Replacing the high-use bulbs in your home with fluorescent bulbs can reduce your lighting costs by about half. The newest bulbs are about the same length as traditional bulbs and will fit in most light fixtures. And for those die-hard dimmer users out there, new dimmable fluorescent bulbs are being marketed for home use.

The initial cost of fluorescent bulbs is higher, around \$5 compared to the \$0.75 incandescent bulb, but you should keep in mind that the operating cost of a 75-watt incandescent bulb will be about \$6 over its relatively short life span. Replacing a 100-watt incandescent bulb with a 32-watt compact fluorescent bulb can save about \$30 in operating costs over the life of the bulb and provides the same light output. You should also consider the environmental benefits when deciding whether

A 20-watt compact fluorescent bulb will use about 550 kilowatt-hours of electricity less than a 75-watt incandescent bulb. That equates to 500 pounds of coal that will not be used in coal-fired power plants and 1,300 pounds of carbon dioxide and 20 pounds of sulfur that will not be released as environmental pollution. The government estimates that replacing one incandescent bulb in every U.S. household with a compact fluorescent bulb would be the pollution-saving equivalent of removing one million cars from our streets.

There are several lighting options to choose from when illuminating your home. Many people will remain loyal to Edison's "bright idea," but the new fluorescent lighting options are certainly worth a look. They are more energy efficient, more economical to operate, and environmentally friendlier. 

Menard Electric breaks ground for new facility

More than 40 employees, board members, local officials, and other participants were on hand last week when ground breaking ceremonies were held for Menard Electric Cooperative's new facilities.

"I think this represents one of the defining moments in Menard Electric Cooperative's history," commented Board President Gary Martin. "It's very exciting to turn a new page and look to the future."

Two years ago the MECC board decided to build a new facility, and nine acres of ground located south of Petersburg on Rt. 97 at Coal Mine Road were purchased from Robert Sampson. Company officials say the move will allow them to increase efficiency by merging its seven current locations into one.

Co-op General Manager Lynn Frasco noted that business has been headquartered in downtown Petersburg for more than two-thirds of a

century, so leaving htat area will bring definite changes. At the same time, he said, the move is a sign of growth for Menard County. "One of the big decisions was leaving downtown Petersburg," Martin said.

Adams and Associates of Nevada, MO designed the new facility, which includes an 8,500 square foot office building and 15,000 square feet of warehouse and garage space. Jones-Blythe Construction Co. of Springfield is general contractor for the facility, which should be completed by May 2005.

"We'll be able to offer better service to our members, and they'll be able to go to one place for all their needs," Frasco said. "This project demonstrates a commitment by Menard Electric Cooperative and its board to provide the best possible service to its members for the long term."
