At Jo-Carroll Energy, we are invested in youth education and engagement programs throughout our communities. Youth Tour is one of the programs for which electric cooperatives across the country are best known.

Youth Tour was established with one thought in mind – to inspire our next generation of leaders. Since 1964, more than 50,000 young Americans have taken advantage of this special opportunity offered by their electric cooperative. Each year, Jo-Carroll Energy participates in the Youth Tour by sending two area high school students on the trip to Washington, D.C.

Youth Tour brings together some 1,600 teens from 43 states for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. It all takes place June 8-15, when hundreds of electric co-ops across the country send their participants to our nation's capital for a chance to learn about the cooperative business model and a full week of sightseeing.

While in D.C., participants have a chance to meet with their elected officials and discuss the issues that are important back home. Without a doubt, Youth Tour has grown into an invaluable program that gives young Americans an experience that will stay with them for the rest of their lives.

Youth Tour is so much more than a sightseeing trip. Students have repeatedly shared that this experience has helped them grow into successful professionals. It has also benefited our local communities. Youth



Tour participants return home with a deeper understanding and skillset of what it takes to be a leader, and as a result, they put these skills to use right here in our community.

In March, Jo-Carroll Energy will begin the interview process to select local students to attend Youth Tour 2018. Students who apply must be the sons or daughters of Jo-Carroll Energy members. # Petitions available for 2018 director nominations

Nomination petitions for the 2018 Jo-Carroll Energy Board of Directors are now available.

Five director posts are up for election including:

- District 8, currently represented by Russell Holesinger of Fulton
- District 7, currently represented by David Senn of Mount Carroll
- District 5, currently represented by Pat Smith of Galena
- District 10, currently represented by Ronald Hallendorff and Robert Kuhns, both of Geneseo. With this election, the number of representatives from District 10 will be reduced to one.
- District 4, currently represented by Dan Tindell. Tindell was appointed in 2017 to fill a vacancy to fill the unexpired term until the next election. The District 4 term ends in 2019.

The deadline for filing petitions is March 23, 2018. Members interested in seeking

election to the board may pick up a petition at one of Jo-Carroll Energy's offices or download a petition from the cooperative's website at [www.jocarroll.com](http://www.jocarroll.com).

In order to qualify to have their names placed on the ballot, all nominees must participate in an orientation process provided by the attorney for the cooperative, assuring that all nominees fully understand the expectations and responsibilities of directors. These include but are not limited to: time demands, education expectations and fiduciary duties.

All eligible candidates will be announced and listed on the cooperative's website and in Hi-Lines.

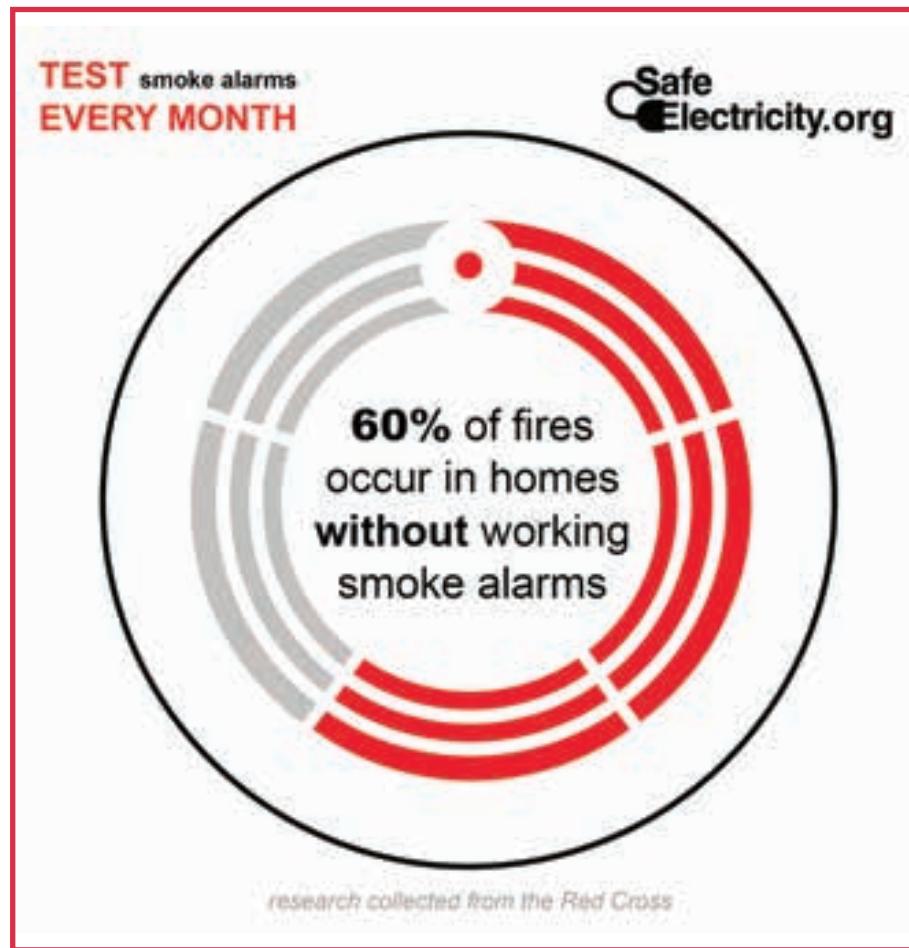

# Keep your home safe from electrical fires

Your lights turn on in an instant, and your plug slides into outlets without sparks or shocks. You can't see it, and typically don't think much about it. However, the electricity that we take for granted every day requires attention to prevent potential hazards. Safe Electricity offers these tips to help keep your home safe from electrical problems and fires:

- Have all work done by a qualified electrician.
- Get regular check-ups for older homes, which have older wiring and are often designed for fewer appliances and electronics. Have the electrical system checked every five to 10 years, depending on the age of your home. If your home is older than 30 years, make sure the wiring meets updated National Electrical Code standards.
- Watch for warning signs such as hot or discolored switch plates, cords or plugs; dimming or flickering lights; buzzing or sizzling sounds. If you smell a burning odor, check it out immediately and unplug electric items in that area.
- Immediately repair loose outlets, and discard or replace cracked, cut or broken insulation on electric cords.
- Keep cords out of walkways and high traffic areas so they don't get stepped on, damaged or cause a tripping hazard.
- Use extension cords



temporarily, not as permanent wiring. Too many extension cords in one area creates a risk of overheating or overloading circuits.

- Never use cords or appliances that have exposed, damaged or faulty wiring. Have them repaired or replaced.
- Avoid using nails or staples to secure electric cords in place. When an electrical cord is punctured, it increases the likelihood of electric shock and fire.
- When you replace light bulbs, ensure that you match the recommended wattage for your lamp or other light fixtures. Using an incorrect wattage increases the likelihood for electrical fires.

- If small children are present, install tamper resistant outlets or use outlet covers to reduce the risk of shocks and fire.
- Educate your loved ones on the dangers of electricity and provide guidance on care for your appliances and electronics.

Electrical safety can also reduce energy waste and save on the power bill. Turn off electronics and lights when they are not in use. This reduces heat as it lowers electricity use.
