

Getting Real with Marla and Windows

People often think replacing their home's windows will drastically reduce their energy bills. While replacing windows can help with energy bills and comfort, homeowners may not realize just how long it can take for those new windows to pay for themselves in energy savings. An article in Time magazine estimated it could take the average homeowner in America more than 100 years to earn back the investment! As Brian Kumer, owner of Thermal Imaging Services of Central Illinois, Inc. says, "If small animals can't pass through them, they don't need to be replaced."

Comfort, functionality, safety, and appearance may be reason enough for homeowners to choose to replace their windows. Before replacing windows, evaluate their condition. It may be time to replace them if:

- Wooden frames are rotted or damaged.
- Aluminum or vinyl sashes are broken or not square.
- Sashes are not operational.
- Seals on insulated glass panels have failed, leading to condensation or fogging between panels of glass.
- Wooden frames and sashes are covered with lead paint that may become damaged.

If the windows are determined to be in satisfactory condition, consider the following suggestions to help save energy, improve comfort, and save money.



Air seal: Caulking and weatherstripping are low-cost solutions that maybe beneficial to your home. Do not assume it has been done *and is still in good condition*. Air sealing and weather-stripping products can deteriorate after years of use.

Utilize window treatments and coverings: Often, window treatments are only considered for their decorative purposes. However, they can also provide energy savings, privacy, and relief from drafts and glare. Exterior coverings, such as awnings, can also help provide relief from the sun's heat and glare. Visit efficientwindowcoverings.org to learn what options might work best for your home's needs.

In some cases, such as historic homes, replacing windows can reduce the value of the home as original wood windows are architectural features. The slow-grown hardwoods used for building many years ago are much stronger and can often be repaired compared to the fast-grown lumber of today.

If you determine replacement windows are in your future, always look for the ENERGY STAR and National Fenestration Rating Council (NFRC) labels. Proper installation is also necessary to ensure energy efficiency and comfort. Air sealing and insulation need to surround the new windows, or you may still have drafts and comfort issues.

Additionally, many new windows have features that make cleaning them an easier task. Try as I might, I have been unable to find self-cleaning windows.

🔼 tate Senator Chapin Rose and Representatives Avery Bourne and Brad Halbrook met with 14 High School students representing Shelby Electric Cooperative during the Illinois Electric and Telephone Cooperatives Youth Day on Wednesday, April 18 in Springfield. More than 210 students representing 24 co-ops from around Illinois had an opportunity to visit the State Capitol, view state government in action, and question their legislators on key issues. They also were invited into the office of Secretary of State Jesse White.

During lunch, Lt. Governor Evelyn Sanguinetti addressed students and chaperones. Sanguinetti discussed her humble beginnings and being encouraged to not allow her background to limit her future. With her passion for volunteerism in local communities, she challenged students, "you never know where life may take you. Volunteer, make a difference. If not you, then who?" Illinois State Fair Manager Luke Sailer, a former Illinois Youth Leadership Council representative, challenged the students to take an interest in the political process and stressed how important their voices and actions are. He encouraged them to "take a leap of faith and work hard, and doors will open for you and your future."

After lunch, the students visited the Old State Capitol and Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum.
