sense of community as people of all ages gathered to have some fun and fellowship.


The weather on Sept. 15 was as close to perfect as possible, and smiles were seen on faces everywhere.

Energy Assistance Available for Low-Income Households

or many Illinois households, energy costs place a severe and continuing stress
on the family's budget. In some cases, families will be forced to make painful
decisions about which bills to pay and which necessities to cut.

The federally funded Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps eligible low-income households pay for winter energy services. Fortunately, Rock Energy Cooperative works with LIHEAP, which benefits about 300,000 Illinois households each year.

LIHEAP Details

LIHEAP heat and electric assistance is a one-time benefit payment per heating season that is intended to help pay a portion of a household's heat and electric costs. The benefit amount depends on household size, income, and energy costs.

In most cases, the benefit is applied as a credit directly to the household's Rock Energy account. You do not need to duplicate your efforts by applying for assistance with both your local agency and Rock Energy.

You are eligible for heating assistance if your household's combined income is at or below the levels shown on this chart:

Where to Apply

To apply for assistance, you'll need to complete a Home Energy Plus application and provide information on each household member and their income as well as records of your heating costs.

Weatherization Services

When you apply for energy assistance, the local agency also will see if you qualify for the Weatherization Assistance Program, which helps fund energy-efficiency, home improvement projects. If you are eligible for weatherization services, an energy auditor will look at your home to see what can be done to make it more energy efficient. Weatherization services differ with each home, depending on how it was built and its condition.

FORMER CO-OP DIRECTOR DIES

Jo Miller, the first woman elected to the Rock Energy Cooperative Board of Directors, died Sept. 12 after a vearlong illness.

Miller served as District 9 director from 1992–2016 She received her Credentialed Cooperative Director certificate from the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association after participating in many educational offerings over the years.

"Jo was a strong supporter of the cooperative," said Shane Larson, chief executive officer. "She loved to share our Rock Co-op message, especially at

She was active in Magnolia and Rock County 4-H, FFA Alumni, and the Rock County Pork Producers. She also was a life member of the Friends of the Evansville, Orfordville, and Janesville Hedberg Public Libraries.

Her daughter, Barbara Miller, currently serves on the board, representing District 1.
