# Clay Electric Co-operative to open doors to new building in February

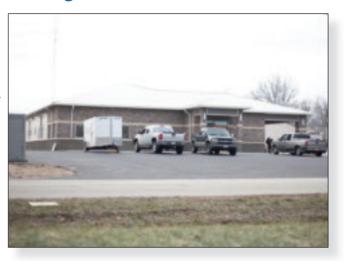
