When Kevin purchased the rural spot, which would later become the center of his business away from work nearly 30 years ago, he had little interest in nor knowledge of electric cooperatives. “I just wanted to get my electricity,” he jokes. A far cry from an aspiring board member, his then-lack of interest in serving on the Board, combined with career and family responsibilities, made him seem an unlikely candidate for the job.

Fast-forward to 2017, when a seat on the Board became available, and Kevin found his job and family were demanding less attention than they previously had. Joining the Board of Directors for an electric cooperative allowed Kevin to play to some of his greatest strengths: namely, a career teaching all levels of economics to college students, and experience starting and operating his own business. “It’s a really good fit for me.” He has since furthered his commitment to board membership by completing multiple levels of training offered to board members through the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), which include Credentialed Cooperative Director (CCD), Board Leadership (BL), and Gold qualifications.

The commitment to both personal and professional growth does not end there. Kevin also brings to the Board his desire to listen to the wants and needs of members and fellow Directors. He believes an understanding of all sides of an issue, as well as the motivations behind them, allows for a keener understanding of the problems, the potential solutions, and the people involved. As for his colleagues, Kevin thinks very highly of his fellow board members. “I am proud to serve with such a high quality group of people who care.”



Right-of-Way Spraying

Spraying is a very important part of our right-of-way maintenance program. The co-op is continuing to do scheduled treatment of cleared areas in an effort to maintain the right-of-way in the most cost effective way possible.

The areas highlighted in purple on the map above are line sections we have already cleared, and now due for follow-up spraying. The cost of clearing can range from \$6,000 to \$12,000 per mile, depending on the density of brush. To spray the same area costs about \$700 per mile.

Obviously, it's more cost effective to control re-growth through spraying, rather than re-clearing at a much higher cost. The co-op has maps from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to ensure that we are within guidelines when spraying in sensitive ecological areas in the service territory.

We will send notification to landowners prior to beginning this process. All of our personnel who spray have passed the IDNR tests to ensure full compliance. As always, if you have any questions or concerns, please give us a call


