Jo-Carroll Energy 2020 budget approved with inflation driven rate increase

t the December meeting, the Jo-Carroll Energy board approved a budget that includes a rate increase of 2.5 percent to recover expected increased costs from suppliers and to maintain adequate financial ratios with our lenders. The 2.5 percent increase will also apply to our natural gas members, primarily due to increased costs from one of our natural gas transmission pipeline suppliers, Northern Natural Gas (NNG). Please note that we have intervened. along with other end-users, in the rate case at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding NNG to try and minimize the increase. Prior to last year, Jo-Carroll Energy had not raised rates for five years.

Despite the increase, electricity and natural gas are still some of the greatest values in our everyday lives. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, average annual nationwide price increases between 2013 and 2018 (5 years) for rent has increased 3.6 percent and for cable and satellite TV 3 percent.

We understand that rate increases are never welcome news. As a notfor-profit cooperative, Jo-Carroll must recover the costs of doing business, as well as maintaining sufficient margins to reinvest in the distribution system and to satisfy covenants with our lenders. Today, just as for you and most of the businesses we serve, the cost for materials, products and services continues to increase. In 2018

the average U.S. inflation rate was 2.4 percent. The 12-month increase through November 2019 is 2.1 percent (latest data available at time of submission).

As you may recall, in 2018 we hired a consulting firm to conduct an independent cost of service study (COSS). The COSS identified the equitable contribution to margins by the respective rate classes. Using the results of the COSS, we will review each of the current rate designs to recover an equitable amount from each rate class. The objective is for each consumer class to pay for the costs incurred by the cooperative to serve them while contributing a reasonable margin to reinvest in upgrading and maintaining the system, as well as meeting financial requirements.

The new rates will be reflected on bills issued on or after April 10, 2020. Specifics will be communicated in a later newsletter inside Illinois Country Living magazine.

Resume of Minutes

Oct. 23, 2019 - Open Board Meeting

The open board meeting of Jo-Carroll Energy, Inc. (NFP) was held at the cooperative's office in Geneseo, Illinois on Wednesday, Oct. 23, 2019 at 9 a.m.

A Safety Moment was provided by Director Larry Carroll.

Member Comments - None

Chairman's/AIEC Report - Senn discussed beginning preparations for strategic planning. Senn also discussed current interest in solar distributed generation and steps the cooperative is taking to accommodate members who want to pursue solar while balancing the requirements for running the cooperative in the interest of the entire membership.

Policy 133 - A motion was made seconded and carried unanimously to approve Policy 133, Wage and Salary Plan, as written.

Governance Overview Topic – Director Russ Holesinger discussed "Member Access to Information" from the Electric Cooperative Governance Task Force Report.

CEO Report - President and CEO Casper reviewed the cooperative's unbundled rates, their components, and how that information is presented to members.

Financial Operating Report - YTD operating margins through September were approximately \$3.9 million vs. a budgeted amount of approximately \$2.5 million. The current equity of the cooperative is 25.74% compared to 22.96% this month last year.

Operations Update - Senior Vice President and Assistant General Manager Kyle Buros provided an update on strategic priorities in the fourth quarter.

External Relations Update - Chris Allendorf, Vice President of External Relations and General Counsel, had nothing to add outside of his written report.

Board Issues and Action Items - A motion was made, seconded and car-

ried unanimously to approve a new policy regarding cybersecurity.

A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to approve the Capital Credits General Retirement.

A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to approve the Position Statement (Beneficial Electrification).

Executive Session - A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to go into executive session at 12:08 p.m. A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to come out of Executive Session at 12:55 p.m.

Action items as a result of Executive Session - A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously that, pursuant to the terms of an employment contract with Michael Casper as President and CEO, Casper's performance is found to be satisfactory and to proceed with fulfilling certain contractual obligations as a result of that finding.

Adjournment - Chairman Senn adjourned the meeting at 12:57 p.m.

Petitions available for 2020 director nominations



Nomination petitions are now available for the three districts up for election on the Jo-Carroll Energy Board of Directors in 2020.

The director districts up for election include Districts 3, 6 and 9. Any Jo-Carroll Energy member residing in a district up for election – including the incumbent – may petition for nomination in that district.

The board of directors is made up of members and consumers just like you who live in and are a part of communities we service. Running for the board and voting in elections are benefits of being a co-op member.


Members interested in seeking election may download a petition from the cooperative's website at jocarroll.com or pick up a form at any of JCE's offices.

Petitions must be signed by at least 25 JCE members residing in the district for which the director is to be elected. Petitions must be filed at the cooperative's headquarters in Elizabeth no earlier than Jan. 13 and no later than April 9.

In order to qualify to have their name on the ballot, all nominees must also participate in an orientation process provided by the attorney for the cooperative, assuring that all nominees fully understand the expectations and responsibilities of directors. These include, but are not limited to, time demands, education expectations and fiduciary duties.

All eligible candidates will be listed on the cooperative's website and in Hi-Lines.



lectric vehicle (EV) drivers now have a new place to get a charge with installation of an EV station in the front parking lot at Jo-Carroll Energy's office in Savanna.

Co-op crews finished installation of the EV station in December. The dual station includes two Level 2 chargers that provide about 20 to 25 miles of battery range for every hour the vehicle is plugged in.

Location of the EV station at the co-op office helps support the community, noted Dean Skinner, manager of engineering services. Just off Highway 84, the location is near downtown commercial businesses and restaurants as well as outdoor recreation. sauor : M uyor

The EV station hardware was provided to the co-op by our power supplier, Dairyland Power Cooperative, as part of its program to encourage EV use, Skinner noted.

The Dairyland program helps create awareness of EVs and promotes EV travel between its member cooperatives. Installing EV stations along major highways helps alleviate range anxiety, according to Dairyland's website.

A second EV station was installed for the cooperative's own use at the headquarters in Elizabeth. It is used to charge Jo-Carroll's hybrid Honda, as well as EVs driven by visitors from Dairyland and other cooperatives. The station also removes some restrictions to expanding the cooperative's own fleet.

Eligible members can qualify for rebates on electric clothes washers, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, refrigerators, room air conditioners, freezer recycling, refrigerator recycling, window air conditioner recycling, and CFL and LED light fixtures; electric HVAC; natural gas HVAC; and natural gas water heaters, stoves and dryers.

To qualify for one of our incentives in 2020:

- Purchase and/or install a qualified energy efficient product in 2020.
- Submit required documentation as soon as possible as funds are limited. Incentives are in place through Dec. 31, 2020 or until funds are depleted.
- Submit forms and documentation by Jan. 3, 2021.


