Four tips for winter safety

It is no surprise that winter months bring increased potential for fire risks and electrical safety hazards. During the coldest months consumers are using additional electrical appliances and devices, such as space heaters, electric blankets, and portable generators.

The National Fire Protection Association estimates that 47,700 home fires occur each year in the U.S. due to electrical failure or malfunction. These fires result in approximately 418 deaths, 1,570 injuries, and \$1.4 billion in property damage annually. This winter, safeguard your loved ones and your home with these electrical safety tips from the Electrical Safety Foundation International.

- 1. Do not overload outlets. Overloaded outlets are a major cause of residential fires. Avoid using extension cords or multi-outlet converters for appliance connections. Appliances should always be plugged directly into a wall outlet. If you are relying heavily on extension cords you may need additional outlets to address your needs. Contact a qualified electrician to inspect your home and install new outlets.
- 2. Never leave space heaters unattended. If you are using a space heater, turn if off before leaving the room. Make sure heaters are placed at least three feet away from

- flammable items. It should also be noted that space heaters can add a significant toll to your energy bill. If you are using them throughout your home, it may be time to upgrade your home heating system.
- 3. Inspect heating pads and electric blankets. These items cause nearly 500 fires every year. Electric blankets that are more than 10 years old create additional risks for a fire hazard. Inspect your electric blankets and heating pads; look for dark, charred, or frayed spots, and make sure the electrical cord is not damaged. Do not place any items on top of a heating pad or electric blanket and never fold them when in use.
- 4. Use portable generators safely. Unfortunately, winter storms can cause prolonged power outages, which means many consumers will use portable generators to power their homes. Never connect a standby generator into your home's electrical system. For portable generators, plug appliances directly into the outlet provided on the generator. Start the generator before you plug in any appliances. Run it in a well-ventilated area outside your home. The carbon monoxide it generates is deadly, so keep it away from your garage, doors, windows, and vents.



Getting Real with Marla and electrical interrupters

2020 is underway and most homes probably added an electricity-using item or two during the past year. In many homes, the electrical system may not have been designed to handle today's electrical needs. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, half of the occupied homes in the United

States were built prior to 1973, before many of the electronics and appliances we use today were even invented.

The addition of Arc Fault Circuit Interrupters (AFCIs) and Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs) have provided significant safety protection within our homes. The question may be, which one does what?

AFCIs protect against arc faults, a dangerous issue caused by damaged, overheated, or

overloaded electrical wiring or devices that may result in a fire. Electricity is a major cause of home fires. Electrical fires can spread quickly behind

GFCIs help prevent electrical burns, shocks, and electrocutions. A person (or pet) that becomes part of the path between a source of power and a grounded surface will get shocked or electrocuted. GFCI outlets are required in areas around

water like near a kitchen or bathroom sink or outdoors, but many older homes do not have these safety measures installed.

Another option, especially convenient for kitchens and laundry circuits, is dual-function circuit breakers. These circuit breakers combine the two technologies (GFCI and AFCI) into one device.

Although it is not nearly as fun as

buying a new large screen television or updating your appliances, making sure your electrical service is updated and safe should not be overlooked. If you have any concerns or questions about your home's electrical service, contact a qualified electrician.

EASY WAYS TO SAVE ENERGY

WEATHERIZE Seal doors and windows with caulk, weather stripping. and/or plastic film.

SEAL IN WARMTH

Close blinds and curtains during the night to keep cold air out. Open them during the day to let sunlight in.



COOK UP SAVINGS

Use smaller appliances, like microwaves, toaster ovens, and slow cookers when possible.

Winter weather and your propane tank

Winter can produce some of the most magnificent scenery, but it can also be challenging. Accumulated snow and ice have the potential to damage your propane system. While you can not always predict snowstorms or hazardous weather conditions, you can take measures during and after winter storms.

Keep snow and ice from accumulating on propane equipment.

Snow or ice accumulation can potentially cause parts of your propane system to crack or break, resulting in a gas leak. It is your responsibility to make sure that all propane pipes, valves, regulators, and tanks are clear of snow and ice. Gently brush away snow or ice that has accumulated around the tank, meter, regulator, and any other piping. Do this using a broom or by hand. If you must use a shovel, use extreme caution around all equipment. If you notice any snow or ice buildup that cannot be removed easily, contact Shelby Energy Company. DO NOT attempt to remove snow or ice by kicking or hitting any equipment.

Be alert to snow buildup on rooftops and other areas.

Frequently check where snow or ice collects on your roof, structure,

or nearby trees, and clear it if you believe it might fall on any part of your propane system. Never shovel snow off of roofs and onto propane equipment. Heavy accumulations of snow or ice falling on tanks, regulators, meters, piping, or valves may cause damage that could result in a gas leak.

Keep vents clear.

Appliance vents and chimney flues must ALWAYS be clear of snow or ice. Some homes may have "direct" vents, which are close to the ground. Improper venting can cause carbon monoxide to

become trapped in your home, resulting in serious illness or even death.

Clear driveways and pathways to propane tanks.

Please remember that a propane delivery truck needs at least a 10-footwide path to be able to deliver fuel to your home. Also, keep the tank area and a path to the tank free of snow. When plowing, snow blowing, or shoveling, do not push or pile snow around your tank, meter, regulator, or piping.

Talk to your contractors.

If you use a snow removal service, make sure that the service knows the location of all propane equipment on the property. Instruct them to keep their equipment clear of all parts of your propane system. If your snow removal service shovels snow off your roof, instruct them to never shovel snow onto any part of the propane system.



Propane safety tips



- Handle any propane-powered equipment cautiously and always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Cylinder tanks for equipment such as stoves and ovens must be located outside
- Never store or use propane gas cylinders larger than one pound inside the home.
- Never operate a propane-powered gas grill inside the home.
- Have propane gas equipment inspected periodically by a professional for possible leaks or malfunctioning parts.
- Carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions when igniting a pilot light.
- If you smell a strong odor of gas, leave the area immediately, call 911 from outside the home, and then call your propane provider.
