The COVID-19 virus changed life as we know it in the blink of an eye. Life at Clinton County Electric Cooperative was no exception. Within a few short days, CCEC management and the board of trustees had to implement big changes in a small amount of time.

With the uncertainty of the COVID-19 virus, the first big decision made was postponing the annual meeting set to take place on March 19, 2020. We then closed our lobby to all walk-in traffic on March 16. A few days later, all outside personnel started working remotely, with the underground crew reporting to the Old State substation and the overhead crew to the pole yard. The remaining two outside employees started taking their trucks home with them daily. Later in March, CCEC's engineer and one member service representative started working from home. All remaining office staff continued reporting to the office. Masks, sanitizer and gloves were provided for all employees.

All the changes taking place posed a few challenges in the beginning. However, just like everyone else, we quickly figured out the workings of our "new normal."

The swift actions taken by CCEC management and board of

trustees are insuring the health and well-being of our membership, as well as our employees. With the two line crews separated and some office personnel working from their homes, CCEC is confident that even though we are divided, we stand united in continuing to provide safe, reliable service to the member-owners of Clinton County Electric Cooperative.

At the time of publication, decisions had not yet been made on rescheduling the annual meeting, nor was a date determined to bring employees back to the office or reopen the lobby. Please

Concern for community

If you have attended a Clinton County Electric Cooperative Annual Meeting in the past couple of years, you have probably heard about some, if not all, of the 7 Cooperative Principles: Voluntary and Open Membership; Democratic Member Control; Members' Economic Participation; Autonomy and Independence; Education, Training and Information; Cooperation Among Cooperatives; and Concern for Community.

Cooperatives around the world operate according to these same set of core principles and values. Understanding these principles is imperative to knowing the difference between a cooperative and an investorowned utility. That is why we are taking this opportunity to explain them all, one month at a time.

This month we feature "Concern for Community." This principle states: Cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies supported by the membership.

On an annual basis, CCEC awards \$4,000 through the Touchstone Energy Teacher's Grant program. We send high school sophomores and juniors, whose parents reside on our lines, to Springfield to understand more about the inner workings of our government. From

there we pay for two lucky winners to participate in an all-expenses paid trip to Washington, D.C. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 Springfield and Washington trips were canceled. CCEC also awards \$8,000 in scholarships to seniors whose parents reside on our lines and attend area high schools or Kaskaskia College.

All these programs set us apart from Investor Owned Utilities, as well as demonstrates our dedication to sustain the development of CCEC's members, their children and the community we serve.

As interest in "green" energy and ways to save money on utility bills continue to grow, some cooperative members may be considering the installation of a solar array.

Since these types of systems have the capability of returning electricity back to the electric grid, there are some major safety considerations to sort through before a system is installed.

Before deciding to buy a solar array, examine the economics to determine if such a system will lower your monthly electricity costs. If you do decide to install a solar array, contact our office as early as possible in the process.

A CCEC representative will provide information on our interconnection process and policies, as well as answer any questions you may have. That way, you and your installer will have the information needed as you progress with your system.
