Save money with your new Co-op Connections Discount Card!

Monroe County Electric Cooperative (MCEC), in conjunction with the other Touchstone Energy cooperatives serving 17 million member-owners nationwide, has **relaunched** the **Co-op Connections Card Program**.

This new card-based member benefit program is designed to deliver added value to our members – residential and business – by offering valuable discounts at participating local and national businesses.

The original launch of the Connections Card happened in 2008. Some members may have misplaced their cards since then, so we are sending all our members a new card with an information sheet.

Whenever a Co-op Connections cardholder – whether from Monroe County Electric Cooperative or from one of the hundreds of Touchstone Energy cooperatives across the country – shows the Co-op Connections card

at a participating business, they receive a discount. Equally, those businesses benefit from increased customer visits by cooperative members participating in the program.

It is easy to spot which local businesses are participating. Look for the Co-op Connections sticker in their windows, or simply log on to connections.coop to view a complete list of participants by state or by cooperative.


Prescription Drug Benefits

MCEC members can now save 10 – 85 percent on most prescriptions at more than 60,000 independent pharmacies and national chains, including CVS, Walgreens, Wal-Mart, Target and more.

You can search online to find the discounted price of your prescription: rxpricequotes.com and click on “Drug Pricing Lookup” to find your prescription discount.

Solar comes to cooperative office



Recently, your cooperative hired Ag Industries, Inc. to install a solar panel array at our office headquarters.

The 10 KW array was installed to provide us information on what a solar panel system actually produces over the course of a year. We plan to pass this information on to our

membership through our website at mcec.org.

With all that's been happening in the solar industry, we have had quite a few questions from members, who have or are considering the installation of these systems for their homes or businesses.

Your cooperative wants to be a key information resource for the members to help them decide if solar is something they want to get involved with.

MCEC helps Maey's Creek Pumping District secure zero-interest REDLG loan for improvements

The Maey's Creek Pumping District recently received a check for a \$103,000 zero-interest loan thanks to assistance from Monroe County Electric Cooperative (MCEC) and the USDA Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant program (REDLG).

This loan will help finance soft start equipment for the pumping district's three 900 horsepower pump motors. These devices will help reduce the high electric demand that the motors generate when first turned on. This reduction in demand should save the district significant power cost dollars from MCEC, their electrical supplier. MCEC is itself billed on these demand costs from its electric supplier, Southern Illinois Power Cooperative (SIPC) out of Marion, Ill.

These high-powered pumps help keep seep water out from the bottoms area and moves it to the river side of the levee. Each 900 hp pump can move up to 90,000 gallons per minute.

The REDLG loan starts out as a grant to the cooperative which can then be loaned out to rural non-profits and businesses that it serves. This

revolving loan fund is available for qualifying projects that will promote rural economic development or aid rural non-profit organizations.

"Investing in the rural communities Monroe County Electric Cooperative serves is at the core of why electric cooperatives were formed some 80 years ago," said President/CEO Alan Wattles. "This continues to be a cornerstone of the rural cooperative movement, whether through direct resource allocation or through opportunities to partner as in the case with the USDA Rural Economic Development program (REDLG).

USDA Rural Development provides loans and grants to help expand

economic opportunities and create jobs in rural areas. The funding for these projects is part of the REDLG program to support local rural businesses and non-profit organizations like the pumping district. For more information about this program, visit rd.usda.gov.
