New local business, Etc. Shoppes & Storage, opens doors amidst the pandemic

Shoppes & Storage has been a popular shopping stop for locals and visitors to the Bloomington-Normal area since opening November 10, 2020. "I am very determined to keep going," said Etc. Shoppes & Storage proprietor Karen Wingo about opening her new business amidst the pandemic.

Wingo is not a stranger to business ownership in Central Illinois. Her previous store location, originally established in 2016 in Lexington, closed due to pandemic related impact on the small business. However, that did not stop Wingo from picking up the pieces and opening a business in the Bloomington, Illinois, area.

At the current location, Etc. Shoppes & Storage has become



a labor of love that is full of something for everyone. The customer friendly store featuring brand new to antique items to meet almost anyone's budget. Popular items for sale include furniture, antiques, metal art, vintage signs, jewelry, and seasonal décor. And the inventory

is refreshed often so customers can find unique items each time they visit.

In addition to Wingo, three other employees assist with the day-to-day operation of the business. The employees at Etc. Shoppes & Storage also specialize in crafts of

The ETC included in the name, not only stands for what Wingo describes as, "everyone else's etcetera," indicative of the wide variety of items available at the store but more specifically is an acronym for the key types of merchandise available in the store – estates, thrift and consignments.

their own such as custom floral décor by Kay Fifer and hand-crafted barn wood items by John Fifer. “We create custom items by request, and we love to help people decorate,” said Wingo.

For those looking for a creative outlet, they offer walk-in painting classes for individuals, a 2-hour session is \$35 and private parties are accommodated by appointment. Local artist, Sue Hufford, who heads up painting classes at the shop has some of her artistic creations there for sale as well.



They also offer a variety of other classes throughout the year such as necklace and bracelet making, cricut classes, and many seasonal and holiday activities.

Realizing that the pandemic has changed the way people shop, the Etc. Shoppes & Storage store is large and open with room for social distancing. The employees have taken careful precaution for sanitizing and items are also individually cleaned before placed for sale.

In addition to the storefront, they also have a storage portion of the business which includes 38 indoor self-storage units in six different sized options including 16 RV and boat storage spots as well as 50 outdoor spots for RVs or boats. Know what's below: steps for safe digging

Spring is just around the corner, and there's never been a better time to get outside and enjoy the fresh air. Perhaps you're making plans for a new garden or a lawn makeover. However you're planning to revamp your backyard oasis, remember to keep safety in mind for all projects—especially those that require digging near underground utility lines.

Most of us never think about the electric, gas, water and other utility lines buried below the ground, but hitting one of these lines while digging is not the reminder you'll want—trust us! Corn Belt Energy reminds all members who are planning a digging project to

call 811 at least three business days before you start. Or you can submit a request online by visiting <http://newtina.julie1call.com/erequest/>

Here's how the process works: After you call 811 or submit your request online, all affected utilities will be notified of your intent to dig. It may take the utilities a few days to get to your request, so please be patient. The affected utilities will send someone out to mark the buried lines with paint or flags. Before you break ground, confirm that all the utilities have responded to your request. If you placed your request by phone, use the process explained by your 811 call center

representative. If you submitted your request online, refer to your 811 center ticket to confirm everything.

By taking this important step before you break ground on your project, you can help protect not only yourself but our community. Disrupting an underground utility line can interrupt service, cause injuries and cost money to repair, so remember to call 811 first and know what's below.
