



Spring is just around the corner, and there's never been a better time to get outside and enjoy the fresh air. Perhaps you're making plans for a new garden or a lawn makeover. Remember to keep safety in mind for all projects--especially those that require digging. IInus uuor

5 STEPS FOR SAFE DIGGING

Working on an outdoor project? Careless digging poses a threat to people, pipelines and underground facilities. Always call 8-1-1 first. Here are five easy steps for safe digging:



1. NOTIFY

Call 8-1-1 or make a request online two to three days before your work begins. The operator will notify the utilities affected by your project.

2. WAIT

Wait two to three days for affected utilities to respond to your request. They will send a locator to mark any underground utility lines.



3. CONFIRM

Confirm that all affected utilities have responded to your request by comparing the marks to the list of utilities the 8-1-1 call center notified.





4. RESPECT

Respect the markers provided by the affected utilities. The markers are your guide for the duration of your project.

5. DIG CAREFULLY

If you can't avoid digging near the markers (within 18-24 inches on all sides, depending on state laws), consider moving your project location.

ELECTRICAL LINEWORKERS

Lineworkers install and maintain overhead and underground electrical systems. We rely on their expertise to power our world. They must commit to safety above all else for the benefit of those they serve (you!), fellow crew members and themselves.

WHAT THEY WEAR

Protective clothing is required to shield lineworkers since they work around high voltages. Gear can vary depending on pole structure (wood or steel) and weighs up to 45 pounds.

Hot stick Insulated and made of electrical-grade fiberglass, used on

of electrical-grade fiberglass, used on energized or "hot" lines

Flame-resistant clothing

Helps protect the skin in case of flames or electric arc flash

Rubber gloves

Specialized, insulated gloves that protect against electric shock and burns

Tool pouch


Allows essential items (connectors, wires, etc.) to be close by

Climbers or leg shanks

These hold the gaffs securely in place

Work boots

Aid in climbing and protect the leg and foot



Insulated hard hat

Provides protection from electrical hazards and blows to the head

Safety glasses

Protect eyes and block sun glare—especially important when working on energized lines

Safety strap

Once safely attached to the pole, the strap allows the use of both hands

Hand line

Rope strong enough to hoist equipment; it has steel clips and a pulley block

Gaffs

Steel points used for climbing wood utility poles
