Kim Gullberg — Director for District 1



Kim is the Director for the entirety of WIEC's territory in Henderson County. He is a Western Illinois University graduate - Go Leathernecks! -

as well as the owner of and engineering manager at The D.C. Cooper Company, located in Stronghurst. D.C. Cooper is in the architectural and structural metals arena, manufacturing metal parts and industrial vessels, tanks and containers. Kim is also a farmer. He and his wife, Sherry, have been married for 42 years and have raised their four children in that time. One of Kim's biggest joys in life is working on projects with family, and that now includes several grandchildren to help.

Kim has served on the WIEC board since being appointed in March 2014. He also serves on the board of his local

grain elevator, as well as on the Henderson County board. When asked about a skill he wishes he could learn, Kim replied, "Create time." That makes perfect sense with all he has going on! 3823-31

Jay Morrison — Director for District 3



Jay is a Colusa native who graduated from Nauvoo-Colusa High School and went on to earn his bachelor's degree in ag business from Western Illinois

University. While at Western, Jay was introduced to his wife Lisa by mutual friends and the two have been married for 33 years. Their grown and married children, Rachel and Ryan, have given them two granddaughters to spoil. Jay is currently a grain farmer, retired from his former position as executive VP and loan officer at State Bank of Colusa.

He has a long history of service. In addition to being a WIEC board member, Jay has also served on the boards of the telephone cooperative and the bank. Another way Jay serves his community is by being a volunteer firefighter. He was asked to run for the WIEC board in 1994 because members thought that his financial background would be helpful ... and they were right. Jay has served as vice president and assistant

secretary-treasurer during his time on the WIEC board.

Jay says the most interesting thing he's learned as a WIEC board member is just how complex the operations of electrical generation and distribution are. He believes the biggest change he's seen is in renewable energy and the more complex decision-making regarding it.
