Stay vigilant against utility scams

Every day, millions of Americans are targeted by scammers through phone calls, emails, text messages, online or in person. Scammers' tactics can change daily.

Be aware of two trending scam tactics. One is the overpayment trick, where a scammer contacts you and claims that you have overpaid your utility bill. The scammer will say they need your personal banking information to deposit the credit back to your checking account. Do not fall for this scam! If you make an overpayment on your energy bill, we apply that credit to your account, which will carry over to your next billing cycle.

Another trending scam is smishing (short for SMS phishing). Many consumers know to watch out for suspicious emails, but we tend to trust text messages sent to our smartphones. Always question suspicious texts, especially from someone claiming to represent a utility.

Here are a few tips to take control when you have been targeted by a scammer:

- **Take your time.** Utility scammers try to create a sense of urgency so that you will act fast and hand over personal information, especially over the phone. Take a moment to think before acting.
- **Be suspicious.** Scammers typically request immediate payments through prepaid debit cards or third-party apps. Unusual requests like this should raise red flags. Remember, if the request seems strange and out of the ordinary, you are likely being targeted.
- **Confirm before you act.** If you are contacted by someone claiming to represent MEC or another utility but you are unsure, just hang up the phone and call the utility directly. Our increasingly connected world provides scammers with more opportunities to connect with unsuspecting consumers. Be vigilant!

Even routine work has the potential to be dangerous and requires every crew member's full attention. Please allow them ample room to work and take pets inside.





STORMS CAN BRING



Outside

Severe weather can sometimes cause damage to overhead power lines. That damage could be noticeable — a downed line across an open road, for instance. However, it may not be as obvious if it is camouflaged by storm damage.

In either case — whether you see a downed line or you suspect one could be hidden under debris or standing water — do not go near the area. Stay away and call 9-1-1, and a crew will be dispatched to deenergize the line. Warn others to stay away as well.

Power lines and other electrical equipment do not have to be sparking, arcing (giving off a flame), or on fire to be energized.

At Home

Never step into a flooded basement or other standing water. The water could be covering electrical outlets, appliances, or cords.

If your home's electrical system has been damaged, water-logged or otherwise compromised, have it thoroughly inspected by a professional electrician before using any electricity (inside or out).

Ways to save energy this summer

- Replace indoor air filters as needed.
- Keep your air conditioner outdoor unit free of debris.
- Use fans to circulate air and make you feel cooler.
- Turn off lights and fans in rooms you aren't using.
- Unplug chargers and turn off office equipment/electronics when not in use.
- Let dishes in the dishwasher air dry.
- Use cold water when washing clothes; hang to dry.
- Close shades/drapes in the hottest parts of the day to keep sunlight from warming up your home.
- Keep warm air out and cool air in by weather stripping and caulking windows/doors/pipes and other openings to your home.
- Grill out or enjoy simple sandwiches and salads that don't require indoor cooking.
- Set your thermostat as high as is comfortable – energy experts recommend 78 degrees.
