Dear fellow members of Southern Illinois Electric Cooperative,

President Roosevelt issued an executive order to create the Rural Electrification Act in 1936. Thus began a marvelous success story told each time we turn on our lights, prepare a meal, or charge an electric car. It was a story of unity of purpose lighting up a darkened landscape. That purpose was to build the infrastructure to deliver electricity to rural areas in order to provide benefits once only enjoyed by our family and friends in towns and cities. In 1938 farmers from our area banded together, braved the elements, and even skepticism to ask for \$5.00 for a membership in an unproven, untested entity that would become Southern Illinois Electric Cooperative (SIEC).

Unity of purpose is the cooperative foundation upon which the cooperative business model has thrived which now includes more than 900 electric cooperatives across the United States. This makes SIEC a part of the largest electric utility in the nation. These numbers enable our voice to be heard from the county courthouse, to Springfield, and Washington, D.C. Our voice is heard through your directors and our state and national associations comprised of representatives from local cooperatives. Thus our position is heard when legislation and regulations are considered that will affect your electric service.

Unity of purpose is demonstrated in the operations of your cooperative. Your board of directors set policy so that safety, reliability, and affordability are placed foremost in the staffroom, each office, and service truck. Plans are formulated to provide electricity in the most safe and reliable means available. Purposeful effort is made for reliability even during the most inclement weather. BYLAW AMENDMENTS

Periodically, the Board of Directors reviews the Cooperative's bylaws to determine if changes are required. Co-Generation of electricity and shortened timeframes for publishing notice deadlines have caused the Board to recommend revisions. The bylaw revisions recommended by the Board are listed below.

Note: The complete bylaw article or section is printed in full in *italicized print*, and the applicable portions of the bylaw to be deleted are shown in strikethrough print and the wording to be added shown in **bold print**.

ARTICLE I MEMBERS

In this section we recommend adding Co-Generation of electric energy when self-generating systems, such as wind and solar applications, are interconnected with the Cooperative's facilities:

Section 3. Purchase of Electric Energy.

Each member shall, as soon as electric energy shall be available, purchase from the Cooperative all electric energy used on the premises, except electric energy generated on the premises ("Co-

Generation"), specified in his application for membership, and shall pay therefore monthly at rates which shall from time to time be fixed by the board of directors, provided, however, that the board of directors may limit the amount of electric energy which the Cooperative shall be required to furnish to any one member. Co-Generation of electric energy, regardless of the source thereof, by means of facilities, which are interconnected with Cooperative facilities, shall be subject to appropriate regulation as shall be fixed from time to time by the Cooperative. Payment for such electric energy shall include for each member a subscription to JAMUP, its successor publication or any other publication of the Southern Illinois Electric Cooperative and to any member publication published by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives. It is expressly understood that amounts paid for electric energy in excess of the cost of service are furnished by members as capital and each member shall be credited with the capital so furnished as provided in these by-laws. Each member shall pay to the Cooperative such minimum amount per month regardless of the amount of electric energy consumed, as shall be fixed by the board of directors from time to time. Each member shall also pay all amounts owed by him to the Cooperative, as and when the same shall become due and payable. Each member shall also pay collection fees, including reasonable attorney fees and court costs, in the event of non-payment of accounts.

ARTICLE II MEETING OF MEMBERS

This section of the bylaws states the minimum and maximum number of days a notice can be delivered prior to the annual meeting. Deadlines imposed by the publisher for the submission of material to be printed and mailed for the annual meeting have been considerably shortened over the last several years. The Board recommends lengthening the timeframe to provide notice to not more than ninety (90) days which will allow meeting notices to be delivered by publication to our members in ample time prior to the meeting:

Section 3. Notice of Members' Meetings.

Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting and in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than seven (7) days nor more than twenty (20) ninety (90) days before the date of the meeting, by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or by the persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than seven (7) days nor more than fourteen (14) ninety (90) days before the date of the meeting. Such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the Cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members, shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members at such meeting.

ARTICLE III DIRECTORS

This section states the various ways a qualified member can be nominated

for election to the Cooperative's Board of Directors. The Board of Directors recommends changing the length of time from twenty five (25) days to forty five (45) days prior to the actual meeting when a member can submit a "Petition for Nomination". This change is also due to the lengthening timeframe imposed by the publisher for printing and mailing meeting notices:

Section 3. Nomination. It shall be the duty of the President by and with the advice and consent of the members of the meeting of which directors are to be elected beginning with the year 1948 to appoint a committee on nominations for the coming year consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) regular members, and also an alternate member for each regular member appointed to such committee on nominations, who shall be selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee or the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. No officer or member of the board of directors shall be appointed a member of such committee. The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least thirty (30) days before the meeting a list of nominations for directors, but fifteen (15) or more members may make other nominations in writing over their signatures not less than twenty five (25) forty five (45) days prior to the meeting and secretary shall post the same at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. The secretary shall mail with the notice of the meeting a statement of the number of directors to be elected and showing separately the nominations made by the committee on nominations and the nominations made by petition, if any. Nothing contained herein shall, however, prevent additional nominations to be made from the floor at the meeting of the members. The members may, at any meeting at which a director or directors shall be removed, as hereinbefore provided, elect a successor or successors thereto without compliance with the foregoing provision with respect to nominations. Notwithstanding anything in this section contained, failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any election of directors.
