PRESIDENT'S REPORT

When rural electric cooperatives brought power to areas no one else could or would serve, you could say they were investing in economic development. Farms prospered; businesses thrived; new housing developments sprung up. Co-ops across the country lighted the way for economic vitality.

Through the years Jo-Carroll Energy, its directors and employees, have filled essential roles as community leaders. Community and economic development are not just good business but are an essential part of the cooperative principles – "cooperatives work for the sustained development of their communities." We know that small, rural communities are often dependent on a few employers to keep local economies alive.

In the past two decades our region of northwest Illinois has seen factories close their doors, businesses move off our Main Streets and populations decline as jobs have slipped away. As the recession refused to relinquish its grip on the nation, Carroll and Whiteside counties both saw unemployment figures top 10 percent in September of last year.

The cooperative took a major leadership step last year with the founding of the Tri-County Economic Development Alliance (TCEDA), a regional public/private partnership to promote, encourage and support industrial and economic development in Jo Daviess, Carroll and Whiteside counties. Jo-Carroll Energy

and TCEDA are committed to helping our communities grow and creating new jobs. I am delighted with the recent hiring of Randy Prasse, the new Executive Director of TCEDA. Hired after an extensive search, Prasse plans to hit the ground running to assist with economic development in our region.

Just as Jo-Carroll Energy provided the catalyst for TCEDA, the sale of the under-utilized Thomson Correctional Center to the federal government will provide a much needed boost to our local economy and offer more opportunities to the residents of northwest Illinois. The initiative potentially means an influx of jobs and people, creating a ripple effect throughout the region's economy. An increased need for goods and services will benefit small businesses, the local housing industry and our schools.

Quality of life is dependent on the availability of jobs and good wages. Good jobs will ensure that people will want to live and work in our communities.

Census 2010

IT'S IN OUR HANDS

When the 2010 Census form arrives for your household in March 2010, you may wonder why the U.S. Census Bureau counts the number of people in our nation every decade. The answers might surprise you.

First and foremost, the Constitution of the United States mandates that every person living in the United States must be counted every 10 years. This includes people of all ages, races, ethnic groups – citizens and noncitizens. The purpose of the census is primarily to reapportion the U.S. House of Representatives based on population, but census data also are used to determine the locations for schools, housing, child-care and senior centers,

shopping centers, businesses, roads and more. These improvements can have a significant impact on the lives of everyone in the community.

Did you know that every year, the federal government distributes more than \$400 billion to state, local and tribal governments based on census data? That means an accurate count of the population can result in significant improvements in the quality of life in communities all across the country. Jo-Carroll Energy is partnering with the U.S. Census Bureau to raise awareness of the 2010 Census and help achieve a complete and accurate count of the growing and changing U.S. population.

Completing the census form is easy, important and safe, and everyone's participation is vital. By law, the Census Bureau cannot share respondents' answers with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement entities. All Census Bureau employees take an oath of nondisclosure and are sworn for life to protect the confidentiality of the data. The penalty for unlawful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment of up to five years, or both.

One of the shortest census forms in history, the 2010 Census form asks 10 questions and takes about 10 minutes to complete. Census forms will be delivered or mailed to households in March 2010. Census Day is April 1, 2010, the official day of the population count. All 2010 Census responses should represent the household as it exists on this day. Households should complete and mail back their forms upon receipt. Census workers will visit households that do not return their forms to take a count in person.

We move forward when you send it back.

Keeping Warm with Window Treatments


Window treatments and coverings aren't just for decoration — they can also go a long way in saving energy. Carefully selected window treatments, such as draperies and insulating panels, can keep heat from escaping through window panes in winter.

A drapery's ability to reduce heat loss and gain depends on several factors, including fabric type and color. Although it's difficult to generalize about energy performance, when drawn during cold weather most conventional draperies can reduce heat loss from a warm room up to 10 percent. In winter, keep draperies that don't receive direct sunlight closed during the day, and close all draperies at night.

Draperies should be hung as close to windows as possible to reduce heat exchange and should fall onto a windowsill or floor. For maximum effective-

ness, install a cornice at the top of a drapery or place the drapery against the ceiling. Then seal the drapery at both sides with Velcro or magnetic tape, and overlap it in the center. Such snug window treatments can reduce heat loss by up to 25 percent.

To trim high heating costs, open draperies and shades on south-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to enter your home. Close them at night to reduce the chill of cold windows.


Curves in Savanna, III.

Keep Your Valentine Safe this Year

Mylar Balloons create electrical hazards on Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is a special day for sweethearts and families to celebrate love each year. People flock to their local grocery and party stores to buy candy and balloons for the people they care about. However, the cute heart-shaped metallic balloons that are so popular every year could have costly and even deadly side effects. As part of the "Teach Learn Care" TLC campaign, Safe Electricity urges consumers to understand the proper safety steps that must be taken.

"Many people are unaware that metallic balloons, called Mylar balloons, are actually powerful conductors of electricity," Kyle Finley, owner of Live Line Demo Inc. said. "In fact each Mylar balloon carries a warning label which states that it can conduct electricity, it should not be released outdoors, near overhead power lines, and misuse may cause personal injury. Buying Mylar balloons is so commonplace, people just completely over look the warning

and never realize that they're creating an electrical hazard for themselves and their loved ones."

Metallic balloons that are not secured properly can float up into power lines or come down into electrical substations. The consequences can lead to substantial impacts ranging

from power outages to extensive equipment damage. The cost of these impacts can cost thousands



and even millions of dollars.

Finley states another risk could actually lead to injury or even death.

"As parents, we often tie balloons to our children's wrists to keep them from floating away,"

Finley said. "If we tie a metallic ribbon to a Mylar balloon and then attach it to our child, we have actually created a potential path to ground for electricity. The results can be deadly."

For example, if the balloon is carried outside near equipment like the electrical service connection or if it happens to touch

an exposed wire indoors, it could potentially cause electric shock injury or kill the person holding it.

Safe Electricity wants everyone to enjoy their Valentine's Day with their special someone. However, when the celebration is over please remember to puncture the balloons and throw them away to keep them safely away from power lines and electrical equipment.

A few days remain to file nomination petitions

Jo-Carroll Energy members have until Feb. 16 to file petitions to compete for a seat on the cooperative's board of directors.

Board directors up for reelection in 2010 include Martin H. Werner, District 1; Joseph W. Mattingley, District 2; and Chris A. Stadel, District. 4.

Petition forms can be obtained from the Cooperative's headquarters in Elizabeth or on the cooperative's website at www.jocarroll.com. Candidates must obtain at least 25 signatures of cooperative members from the same district in which

they live and are seeking election. Completed petitions must be submitted to the cooperative by Feb. 16. In order to qualify to have their names placed on the ballot, all candidates must participate in an orientation process provided by the cooperative's attorney.

Ballots are mailed to each member residing in a district from which a director is to be elected. Each member may vote for one director for the district in which the member resides or in which the member is entitled to vote. If a member prefers, instead of using the mail ballot, he or she may cast their vote by ballot in person at the Cooperative office.

All balloting concludes at 4 p.m. of the day prior to the annual meeting. The ballots are counted by the Credentials and Election Committee. Results are reported at Jo-Carroll Energy's 71st Annual Meeting to be held Saturday, April 17, at Highland Community College West in Elizabeth. A hot meal at the Elizabeth Community Building will precede the meeting.
