### **WIEC Board approves capital credit** retirement

anager Todd Grotts is pleased to report that the WIEC Board of Directors has once again approved capital credit retirements for this fall. A refund of over \$256,000 was approved earlier this year. This will retire the capital credits from both 1990 and 1991. The Board (directed by co-op bylaws and separate co-op policy) can only approve the retirement of capital

credits when it will not adversely impact the cooperative's financial condition. Keep your eyes out for checks to arrive in late September or early October. 561-43

Capital credits represent the cooperative members' equity in (or ownership of) their cooperative. Your credit for a specific year reflects your individual portion of any margins (a.k.a. profits) earned that year by the cooperative.

### **Energy Efficiency** Tip of the Month



Water heating accounts for a large portion of home energy bills. To save energy (and money!) used for water heating, repair any leaky faucets, install low-flow fixtures and insulate accessible hot water lines. When it's time to purchase a new washing machine or dishwasher, look for models that are ENERGY STAR®-certified.

## The power of preparation

With severe weather events occurring more frequently, now more than ever it makes sense to be prepared. During a prolonged power outage or other emergency, this means having enough food, water and supplies to last at least a few days.

In honor of National Preparedness Month in September, I want to remind members of our community about the power of preparation. While you don't have to achieve a "doomsday" level of preparedness, there are several practical steps you can take to keep you and your family safe.

Even at a modest level, preparation can help reduce stress and anxiety and lessen the impact of an emergency event. We recommend starting with the basics.

Here are general guidelines recommended by the Federal Emergency Management Agency:

- Assemble a grab-and-go disaster kit. Include items like nonperishable food, water (one gallon per person per day), diapers, batteries, flashlights, prescription medications, first-aid kit, battery-powered radio and phone chargers.
- Develop a plan for communicating with family and friends (i.e., via text, social media, third party, etc.)
- Have some extra cash available; during a power outage, electronic card readers and cash machines may not work.
- Store important documents (birth certificates, property deed, etc.) in safe place away from home (for example, a bank safe deposit box).
- Keep neighbors and co-workers apprised of your emergency plans.
- Fill your car with gas.
- Organize your supplies so they are together in an easily accessible location that family members know about.

#### Caring for vulnerable family members

If you have older family members or those with special needs, make sure they have enough medication and supplies for a few days. If they don't live with you, arrange for a neighbor

to check in on them. If a severe weather event is expected, consider having your relative stay with you if feasible, otherwise call them daily. If you have an infant or young children, make certain that you have ample formula, diapers, medications and other supplies on hand to weather an outage lasting several days or more.

#### Keeping four-legged family members safe

Having a plan in place for pets in the event of a prolonged outage or an emergency will also help reduce worry and stress, especially if you need to make a decision during an emergency.

· Bring pets indoors at the first sign of a storm or other emergency. Pets can

- become disoriented and frightened during severe weather and may wander off during an emergency.
- Microchip your pet and ensure the contact information is up to date.
- Store pet medical records on a USB drive or in an easy-to-remember location. 6621-26
- Create an emergency kit for pets (include shelf-safe food, bottled water, medications and other supplies).

# What is a Generator SWITCH?

A transfer or throw switch, sometimes called a double throw switch, is an essential mechanism that shuts off power to the grid before backup power is used.

#### The transfer switch has an important job.

The switch is typically used for generators rated at 5,000 watts or more.

It connects the generator to your home's main circuits to provide backup power during an outage.

In other words, the transfer switch changes or transfers the power load from one source to another.

It prevents power from backfeeding into the power grid and endangering utility workers and others.

### The type of switch depends on the type

A permanent standby generator has an internal switch that



automatically transfers the source of power. Standby generators must be installed by licensed contractors, usually at the side of a home.

Standby generators are called just that because they automatically turn on when the power goes out.

Not all permanently installed generators are standby versions. Some have manual transfer switches. Make sure your permanent generator and switch are installed to code and working properly.

Portable generators can also be connected to your home's electrical service panel that is properly wired through a transfer switch. If you use a portable generator, never plug it into a wall outlet as this can cause backfeed.

#### Always use a generator safely.

## Five Easy Ways to Exercise Your Civic Duty



- Work a National Voter Registration Day event (visit www. nationalvoterregistrationday.org/ events), volunteer to be a poll worker during midterm elections or offer to drive others to their polling places.
- **5. Vote!** It's the easiest—and most important-way you can exercise your civic duty.
