Don't Become Electricity's PATH TO GROUND

When electric utility equipment becomes damaged, the ground and objects can become energized.

If you are in a situation where there could be downed power lines or a damaged pole, guy wire or padmount transformer (green box), know what to do to save your life and the lives of others:

CAR ACCIDENT

Stay inside your vehicle or cab since the ground or objects could be energized.

Call 9-1-1 and report that there are downed or damaged power lines or a dislodged green box.

Wait for the utility crew to arrive to deenergize the power.

Do not exit until someone from the utility says it is safe to do so.

ONLY EXIT IF THE VEHICLE IS ON FIRE

Cross your arms over your chest and make a clean jump out.

Do not touch the vehicle and the ground at the same time.

Make solid hops with your feet together as far away as you can.

Do not return to the vehicle.



IF YOU ARE A Bystander

Do not approach the scene to try and help.

Stay at least 50 feet away and do not lean on or touch anything, including fences or guardrails.

2022 Classroom Empowerment Grant Official Rules

APPLICATION PROCESS

Submit the completed Grant Application Form, AND a doublespaced typewritten request (not to exceed three pages) that includes the following:

- 1. A description of the project, what the project will accomplish, and why it should be selected for funding.
- 2. The estimated cost of the project based on researched and provided data.
- 3. An explanation of why funds are necessary for the completion of the project.
- 4. If other funding options have been pursued, the status of those requests.
- 5. When the project will be completed.
- 6. The number of students impacted by the project.
- 7. How the goals of the project will be measured, and what would determine the project to be a success.
- 8. How the project ties to our Touchstone Energy core values: integrity, accountability, innovation and Commitment to community.

WHO MAY APPLY

Teachers, administrators, and/ or qualified employees of K-12 public or private schools within the Egyptian Electric Cooperative (EECA) service territory footprint can apply.

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS

Qualifying projects are those that improve the learning environment for students and/or increase educational resources for the school.

SELECTION PROCESS

An impartial judging panel will score the applications based on which projects best demonstrate improving the learning environment and/or increasing educational resources for the school. Decision of the judging panel is final.

IMPORTANT DATES

All completed applications must be received by the office of EECA, by *Friday, Nov. 4, 2022*. The winners will be notified no later than **Dec. 9, 2022**. Funded projects must be completed by the end of the 2023 spring semester.

With winter weather on the way, now is the time to seal drafty windows. If you can see daylight around a window frame or if you can rattle a window (movement means possible leaks), the window likely needs to be sealed.
