after a year off," said Jennifer Sellars, the Morgan-Scott and Greene-Calhoun CEO program facilitator. Students in CEO learn and practice valuable skills, such as public speaking, crafting a business plan, and ultimately launching a product or servicebased business of their own.

First-year facilitator of the Pike CEO program, Colin Kutchy, says he's learning a lot, just like his students. "I'm really enjoying getting to share my experience in the business world with the students and learning from them as well."

The co-op helped start the Morgan-Scott CEO program nine years ago, with Greene-Calhoun and Pike programs following two years later. The goal: to help retain young people in our service territory by introducing them to the opportunities right in their backyards.

As part of this, students in the CEO program hear from more than 50 local professionals and business owners from their communities who share their career journeys, experiences, and lessons learned along the way. These connections help students develop professional networks, which sometimes lead to internship opportunities and ongoing mentorships.

"The CEO programs in our area have been very popular and received great support from our communities. Through this program, local students are gaining a better understanding of the region and the opportunities it can offer. We have a growing number of CEO Alumni that have or are choosing to come back to the region to live and work," said Shawn Rennecker, **Economic Development Director and** chairman of the Pike CEO board.


Batchtown construction will be starting this month. We will continue to share updates on the Calhoun Fiber Facebook page to everyone informed.

## Fifteen 2023 IEC Memorial Scholarships available



Illinois electric cooperatives will award 15 scholarships in 2023 to financially assist deserving students in the electric cooperative family. The 15 scholarships, \$2,000 each, will be awarded through the Thomas H. Moore Illinois Electric Cooperatives (IEC) Memorial Scholarship Program.

Nine scholarships will be awarded to high school seniors whose parent(s) are an Illinois electric co-op member. A 10th scholarship, the Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship, will be awarded to a student who is the child of an Illinois electric cooperative employee or director. Four additional scholarships are reserved for high school seniors enrolling full time at a two-year Illinois community college whose parent(s) are an Illinois electric cooperative member, employee or director.

The 15th scholarship, the LaVern and Nola McEntire Lineworker's Scholarship, will help pay for costs to attend lineworker school conducted by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College. Springfield, III. Children of co-op members, relatives of co-op employees or directors,


and individuals who have served or are serving in the armed forces or National Guard are all eligible for this scholarship.

"We hope to assist electric cooperative youth while honoring past rural electric leaders with these scholarships," says Randy Long, General Manager. "Illinois Electric Cooperative and the other electric cooperatives are always seeking ways to make a difference in our communities. One of the best ways we can do that is by helping our youth and investing in them through programs like this one."
