Identifying the 'Silent Killer'

Protect Your Family from the Dangers of Carbon Monoxide

t's silent, deadly, and lurks in the home while your family sleeps. Dubbed the "silent killer," carbon monoxide kills 500 people and sends 20,000 more to the hospital each

Because it is odorless and colorless, people can be exposed to the poison without even knowing it. However, carbon monoxide poisoning is avoidable and preventable if the necessary safety measures are taken. Underwriters Laboratories, a product safety certification organization, recommends a three-part strategy to help consumers protect themselves and their loved ones from the poisonous gas: inspect, protect, and detect.

Inspect

Fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, hot water heaters, and stoves require yearly maintenance. Over time, components can become damaged or deteriorate.

Protect

- ■Purchase and install carbon monoxide alarms outside each sleeping area.
- Test and replace the battery in your alarm at least once a year. If your alarm is wired directly into your home's electrical system, you should test it monthly. If your unit operates off of a battery, test the alarm monthly and replace the battery at least once a year.
- ■Know the signs of potential poisoning. Carbon monoxide poisoning may be the cause of flu-like symptoms such as headaches, tightness of chest, dizziness, fatigue, confusion, and breathing difficulties. Because it often causes a



victim's blood pressure to rise, the victim's skin may take on a pink or red cast.

Detect

■ If your alarm goes off, get out quickly and safely! Practice a safety escape plan with your family so everyone knows how to react. If your alarm sounds, evacuate the building and call the fire department, not Rock Energy Cooperative. If you or your loved ones experience symptoms — headache, dizziness, or other flu-like symptoms — seek medical attention immediately. When you return home, be sure to open windows and doors for ventilation. Then, call a qualified technician to inspect your appliances.

How does the program work?

- Decide what work will be completed and submit a proposal form and cost estimate to us. We will return a signed copy, stating that funds have been set aside for
- Work must be completed within 60 days.
- Send us a completion form with copies of your receipts.
- We will issue a check to you.
