Tips for using a programmable thermostat

In most homes, heating and cooling costs are the largest part of energy bills. Staying comfortable as efficiently as possible is an excellent way to conserve energy and reduce bills. Programmable thermostats can help do this. However, the Energy Education Council wants consumers to know that programmable thermostats must be used properly to achieve any benefit.

A programmable thermostat works by changing the temperature depending on your work and sleep schedules. When done correctly, your house will be at a comfortable temperature when you return home or wake up. The only difference you (8611-4) will notice is on your utility bill.

The Energy Education Council has the following tips for better results with a programmable thermostat:

- Only adjust the thermostat for long periods of time—around 8 hours.
- Do not micromanage the thermostat. Pick a temperature for when you are at home and for when you are away. Stick with these tem-



peratures. Frequently adjusting the thermostat increases energy costs.

- Do not create large temperature swings. Adjust the temperature 5 to 8 degrees when you are away from home or sleeping. If you change the thermostat too drastically, your home's heating/cooling system will have to work longer to return your home to a comfortable temperature, running up your energy costs.
- If your home has a heat pump system, you should set your thermostat to run at a constant temperature in the winter in order for your heat pump to perform at its best. You can still make use of a programmable thermostat's settings in the summer months though. There are some programmable thermostats that are specifically designed to work with heat pump systems. If you are interested in one, you should contact an HVAC technician.

Fighting winter chills? A crackling fire in the hearth warms the house, but don't let it heat up your electric bill. To cool energy costs, keep the fireplace damper closed when not in use. Caulk around the fireplace hearth. **(7513-9)** Double up on wood-earned warmth by lowering the thermostat setting to between 50 degrees and 55 degrees Fahrenheit. Learn more at www.energysaver.gov.

Fact or fiction—myths about electrical safety

Sometimes conventional wisdom, even if it comes from a trusted source can be deadly—especially if it pertains to electrical safety. This is one time that checking facts just might save your life.

Here are some common electrical safety myths and the truth behind them:

■ MYTH – A downed power line will be arcing and smoking if it still has power.

FACT – Power lines do not automatically shut off when they fall and do not necessarily arc, flash, pop, or smoke when they hit the ground. There is no way to know for sure if a line has potentially deadly current running through it unless it has been properly discharged by a utility crew, so stay away from all downed power lines and keep others away.

■ MYTH – Household current cannot kill you.

FACT – Household current can and does kill. Case-in-point, 10-year-old Caitlyn Mackenzie was killed by household current when she touched a lamp while still damp from a swimming pool. You can see Caitlyn's story at SafeElectricity.org.

■ MYTH – Power lines are insulated.

FACT – The majority of outside power lines are not insulated. The coating you might see on the lines are just weatherproofing that will offer no protection from the electricity flowing through the lines.

■ MYTH – Light digging in the yard won't be deep enough to hit any wires or pipes.

FACT – Unless you call 811 and have a professional come to your home and locate the utilities, you

can never be sure where lines and pipes are buried. Even if you are just planting flowers or a shrub, you might come into contact with power lines that could kill you. Keep in mind that the locations are approximate, so if you are digging near one of the marked lines, do so with caution. ■ **MYTH** – Tires insulate my car from electrical dangers.

FACT – If a wire falls on your car while you are in it, the tires are not keeping you from being injured by the electricity. You are not being hurt because you are not a path to ground for the electricity—as long as you stay in the car. Once you step out of the car, you become that path to ground and can be seriously injured or killed. If you

find yourself in a situation where your car has hit a utility pole or has a power line come down on it, the best place for you to be is in the car. Call for help, and keep others away until a utility crew can kill the wires. If you must exit the car, it is critical for you to make sure not to touch the ground and the car at the same time. Jump out of the car, keeping your feet together. Then bunny-hop away. Find out more by watching Safety Expert Kyle Finley's Live Line Demonstration at www.youtube. com/SafeElectricity.
