Stay Safe During Fall Projects


Fall also is a good time to complete those do-it-yourself projects that you've put off all summer. But before you tackle any project, remember to always practice safety measures to avoid injury. Just like a helmet and pads are required on a football field, safety items are essential for home projects. Wearing eye and ear protec-

tion as well as gloves are important to

keeping you safe.

For outdoor projects, first check the area where you'll be working. Identify potential hazards and take time to avoid or correct any problems. Don't forget to look up for power lines, and avoid using long poles or ladders within 10 feet of overhead wires.

If your project involves digging, call 811 beforehand even if you think you know where the underground lines are. The 811 service will mark all underground lines in your area for free before you start work.



See You at Member Appreciation Day


When planning fall projects, remember to keep the morning of Saturday, Sept. 14, open for Rock Energy's Member Appreciation Day. See page 16c for all the details.






Have a Safe and Happy Labor Day!
