Shelby Electric Cooperative (SEC) has partnered with local libraries to make this service available to you! SEC has provided the libraries, listed on the right,

with Kill A Watt Meters that will be available for checkout.

Anyone can check out a Kill A Watt Meter just like a book or video. Patrons must abide by all rules set by the library for use, check out and late fees. This is a free service within our territory. Kill A Watt Meters are also available from the SEC office in Shelbyville, IL.



Getting Real with Marla ~ Refrigerators and Freezers

As summer shifts toward fall, I would like to issue a challenge. Unplug that second refrigerator you may have as well as any empty freezers. Now for the challenge - get rid of it before you are tempted to use it again next summer! Many scrap metal facilities will pay for the metal components. Call before you go in case they do not accept appliances. If your old, frosty friend was manufactured prior to 1980, you potentially just saved approximately \$300 per year!

Save energy by following these tips for any refrigerators and freezers that remain in use.

- Refrigerators should maintain a temperature between 35° - 38°F.
- Freezer temperature should stay between 0° - 5°F.
- Test the seal by closing the door on a piece of paper or dollar bill in several places. If it pulls out easily, the seal is not tight enough.
- Cover or wrap foods before refrigerating. Uncovered food and liquid releases moisture in the unit, making it work harder to remove the humidity. Besides, who wants their sweet tea to smell like last night's leftover beefy-bean burrito?

- Make a five-second rule. One study found that households spend approximately 10 hours annually looking in an open fridge or freezer. Wishing and searching will not turn your fridge into a deli.
- Regularly defrost freezers and refrigerators. The interior of the freezer should not look like the Rocky Mountains in January. Efficiency is diminished by frost buildup.
- Clean the hidden parts. Fingerprints on the door handle

are noticeable but do not affect energy efficiency. However, the dust bunnies and creeping crud under and behind the appliance do affect efficiency. When refrigerator coils collect dust, they use more energy.

Your refrigerator will thank you for helping it work more efficiently and you can now enjoy an efficiently-cooled, fresh-smelling, glass of tea.
