our area will experience "vicious cold" this winter with monthly average temperatures below what happened last winter. The folks there even coined a new term: "Refriger-Nation."

Others look for signs in nature to predict what's ahead. Rock Cooperative Care is partially funded by Project Lift Up, a voluntary member donation program that allows members to round up their monthly energy bill to the nearest dollar, add a set monthly contribution, or make a one-time donation.

As you count your blessings this holiday season and are planning your holiday giving, please consider making a donation to Project Lift Up. Just as the name implies, Project Lift Up helps give people a financial lift. The people who benefit truly are grateful for the assistance. 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# **Rock Cooperative Care Offers Energy Assistance**

Some Rock Energy Cooperative members need a little help paying their energy bills. They might earn too much to qualify for state and federal energy assistance, or they might need some extra money to supplement the other programs.

Either way, Rock Cooperative Care is available to help. Since 2010, more than \$110,000 has been distributed to help members.

A one-time grant of up to \$500 is available to help residential members who are struggling to pay their energy bills but do not meet more stringent state and federal requirements.

Check the following chart to see if your household qualifies for assistance. For example, a four-person household would be eligible if the total annual income is \$71,550 or less.

The Salvation Army office administers the Rock Cooperative Care

program. If you meet the eligibility requirements, call either of these offices during regular business hours to schedule an appointment: Janesville, (608) 757-8300, extension 26; Beloit,

(608) 365-6572; or Rockford, (815) 972-1135. Be sure to point out that you would like to schedule an appointment to apply for the Rock Cooperative Care program.

# **Scholarships Offered to High School Seniors**

Rock Energy Cooperative again is offering scholarships of \$500 to graduating high school seniors who enroll at an accredited school. Students whose parents or guardians are active members of REC are eligible.

Our independent scholarship committee will judge applicants based on general merit, cooperation, leadership abilities, financial need, and class ranking.

Since 1989, Rock Energy has awarded more than \$82,000 in financial aid to deserving students.

An application form must be completed by the student as well as by the student's guidance counselor. Applications are available at area high schools, at our
