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Youth Tour

acKenzie Case and Bridget Redmond met with Congressman Aaron Schock as they represented Menard Electric Cooperative in Washington, D.C., during the 53rd annual "Youth to Washington" Tour, June 15-22. This event, sponsored by the electric and telephone cooperatives of Illinois since the late 1950s, is an introduction to our democratic form of government and cooperatives for rural youth.

MacKenzie and Bridget were among 76 rural Illinois youth leaders selected for the trip. The Illinois students joined more than 1,500 young leaders from 43 states. Over the years, more than 50,000 young people have made the trip.

In addition to the Capitol, they also visited Arlington National Cemetery, the Washington National Cathedral, several Smithsonian Museums,

the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, the World War II Memorial, memorials to Presidents Lincoln, Jefferson, Washington and Roosevelt, the National Archives, the Newseum and a number of other historic sites.

"The kids spend a lot of time touring museums and monuments and learning about our shared heritage," said Steve Uram, National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) grassroots senior advisor. "Their main reason for being here is to remind lawmakers that they share many of their parents' concerns about the future."

5 ways to stay safe this harvest



- 1. Keep farm equipment at least 10 feet from power lines.
- 2. Use a spotter when moving large equipment near power lines and be aware of higher antennas on large modern tractors.




- 3. Use care when raising augers or truck beds. Lower portable augers or elevators to their lowest level before moving. Variables like wind, uneven ground, shifting weight or other conditions can combine to create an unexpected result.
- 4. Never attempt to raise or move a power line to clear a path.
- 5. Don't use metal poles when breaking up bridged grain inside and around bins. Be careful not to raise equipment such as ladders, poles or rods into power lines.

How to pay online

- 1) Visit www.menard.com and select the blue Online Bill Pay icon. Then click on Register
- 2) Enter your account number, social security number and email address.
- 3) The system will verify your information and send you an email asking you to click on a link. (If we don't have your social security number on file your verification will not process. You'll need to contact the office to update that information.)
- 4) Create a password and log into the Electronic Bill Payment Processing service to see each of your accounts.
- 5) View your historical information and pay your current bill with a credit card. An email will be sent to confirm your payment was received.

Present were Manager Lynn Frasco, Attorney Charles Smith and Directors Gary Martin, Jerry Brooks, Michael Carls, Jay Frye, Warren Goetsch, Donald McMillan, Michael Patrick, Roy Seaney and Steven Worner.

Frasco advised that 44 new irrigation systems were completed.

He demonstrated the new online bill payment program.

He reviewed Member Installed Alternative Energy Output Systems.

The board adopted a resolution expressing support for the Illinois Grass Roots Campaign Issues as submitted by NRECA.

Review of January retirement of capital credits in 2012 for 1985-1986

allocation showed that 1,260 members received checks and \$82,341.89 went to active members.

Frasco reported on a loan advance in the sum of \$1,000,000.00 for 30 years at a 2.5% interest rate.

Frasco reviewed the RUS Community Connect Grant Program, which should promote rural high speed broadband service.

A field audit by an administrator of the Smart Grid Program found no problems.

Carls advised Prairie State was not yet online and this was creating positive margins for Prairie Power, which would result in a future power bill reduction to the co-op by \$700,000.00 to \$800,000.00. He and Frasco discussed the effect this would have on co-op margins.

Board approved entering into twoyear audit agreement with Dreyer & Kelso at rate of \$11,250.00, an increase from the previous agreement by \$150.00.

Year to date margins were (78,588) compared to 172,306 a year earlier. Equity as of the end of April was 33.61% and members served was 10,567 compared to 10,503 a year ago. Net Utility Plant at the end of April was \$37,537,697compared to \$35,738,382 last year. The cooperative continues to meet the requirements of the RUS, FFB and NRUCFC.

Safety award

Safety is a top priority at Menard Electric. When you're working with high voltages it has to be. All of our employees focus on safety and we have a program in place to continually instruct our linemen on measures they need to take to stay safe. We recently earned two safety honors from the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives for Best Accident/Illness Record and Best Lost Time Record in 2011.

We have continued that safety record and have more than 2 1/2 years now without having an employee involved in an accident.

Bob Burris, General Foreman, says, "Safety always has, and will be, Menard Electric's number one priority."
