Minutes of the 83rd Annual Meeting

he 83rd annual meeting of the members of Southern Illinois Electric Cooperative was held at Shawnee Community College, Ullin, Ill., on Aug. 10, 2023, pursuant to Section 1, Article II of the ByLaws and notice printed in the July 2023 edition of JAMUP mailed to all members of Southern Illinois Cooperative dated the 26th day of June 2023.

SIEC Director David Martin offered the invocation. The National Anthem was performed by Julia Watkins.

Board President William E. Littrell called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m. with a quorum present.




