

Each June, hundreds of electric co-ops across the country send participants to Washington, D.C., for a chance to learn about the cooperative business model and a full week of sightseeing. While in D.C., participants have a chance to meet with their elected officials and discuss the issues that are important back home. Without a doubt, Youth Tour has grown into an invaluable program that gives young Americans an experience that will stay with them for the rest of their lives. **This month, EECA will begin the application process to select local students to attend Youth Day and Youth Tour June 16-23, 2025.**

LIHEAP

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a heat and electric assistance program through the state of Illinois that is a benefit payment program, per heating season, that is intended to help with a portion of a qualified household's heating and electric costs.

The benefit amount depends on household size, income and energy costs where the benefit is applied as a credit directly to the household's Egyptian Electric account. Qualifications are based on income and household size, if your household's combined income is at or below the levels shown on this chart. To apply for assistance, go to helpillinoisfamilies.com for the online application or contact your local administering agency at the applicable phone number below. Applications for the 2025 LIHEAP season are available Oct. 1, 2024-Aug. 15, 2025 or until funding is exhausted. **Amy D Carter**

Are you eligible? If your household income is within 200% of the federal poverty level for the 30 days prior to the application (gross income for all household members, before taxes are deducted) you could be eligible.

Sixteen IEC memorial academic scholarships will be awarded again to high school seniors this school year. Each scholarship is worth \$2,500. Deadline to apply online is Dec. 31, 2024.

10 scholarships are awarded to students who are the sons or daughters of an Illinois electric cooperative member receiving service from the cooperative.

5 scholarships are reserved for students enrolling full-time at a two-year Illinois community college who are the sons or daughters of Illinois electric cooperative members, employees or directors.

1 scholarship, the Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship, is awarded to a student who is the son or daughter of an Illinois electric cooperative employee or director.

Keep your family safe and your holiday season merry with these winter fire safety tips

Cooking Safety

The kitchen is a top spot for holiday fires. Keep safety in mind:

- Never leave the oven or burners unattended.
- Keep a fire extinguisher nearby.
- Ensure children stay clear of the kitchen.
- Install smoke detectors at least 10 feet from cooking appliances and test monthly.

Fire Risks

Holidays bring additional fire risks from candles, fireplaces and decorations. Fire departments respond to an average of nearly a thousand holiday-related fires annually.

Candle Safety

- Only burn candles when you're in the room and extinguish them when leaving.
- Use heat-resistant surfaces and keep candles away from flammable objects.
- Opt for battery-operated candles near flammable items.

Christmas Tree Safety

- If using a real tree, choose a fresh tree, keep it away from heat sources and check water levels daily.
- Place trees away from high-traffic areas, and if using an artificial tree, ensure it's labeled fire-resistant.



Lighting Safety

- Purchase lights from reputable retailers and ensure they are approved by recognized testing labs like UL or CSA.
- Only use lights designed for outdoor use when hanging outside.
- Use circuits equipped with ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) for outdoor lights.
- Avoid water and snow when using extension cords and outdoor lights.
- Stay at least 10 feet away from power lines while hanging lights.
- Check for broken sockets and frayed wires before use.

- Avoid plugging too many devices into a single outlet.
- Turn off indoor and outdoor decorations when going to bed or leaving the house.

Fireplace Safety

- Avoid hanging flammable decorations on the mantel, and have the fireplace cleaned annually.
- Use a screen to prevent embers from escaping, and don't burn trees or wrapping paper.
