The Jasper County Imagination Library received a \$1,000 donation in memory of Sarah Semple from Norris Electric Cooperative. This memorial will be reflected on book labels with “Remembering Sarah Semple & Her Love for Books — Norris Electric,” in June, July and August 2025. NEC’s board of directors plans to make this an annual donation to remember Sarah. Sarah’s parents, Charles and Lynn Semple, joined Norris Electric staff recently to present the donation to “Dolly.”

Sarah Semple joined Norris Electric in 2012, bringing her skills and knowledge to the engineering department. At the time of her passing in December 2024, she was working in the role of mapping technician. NEC General Manager Tamara Phillips shared, “Sarah had a deep love for reading and was always

excited to share her collection of books with fellow book lovers in the office. She loved recommending a good read or discussing her latest literary finds with anyone who was interested. Sarah was also a devoted aunt to her niece, Norah, and nephew, Miles.”

The Jasper County Imagination Library launched earlier this year through the generous support of local businesses and community members. As of March, 142 children were already enrolled to receive their first book in April. Children who reside in Jasper County receive in the mail a carefully selected, age-appropriate book each month from birth to age five at no cost to parents or caregivers. In April, 80 employees and directors from 29 electric cooperatives across Illinois gathered at the State Capitol to meet with senators and representatives. Their mission: to voice concerns over proposed legislation that could strip co-ops of local control, increase electric rates, and impose rigid, one-size-fits-all solar net-metering requirements. STAY COOL THIS SUMMER

Summer heat can strain both your comfort and your budget. As temperatures soar and energy demand peaks in the late afternoon and evening, it's time to take action.

7 cost effective tips to help lower energy consumption:

1. Request a home energy audit from your local utility to reduce energy loss.
2. Change your air filter regularly to help your HVAC system work efficiently.
3. Increase your thermostat by two degrees and set it to a higher temperature when you're away.
4. Install a smart or programmable thermostat for automatic temperature control.
5. Run dryers, washers and dishwashers during off-peak hours in the early morning or late evening.
6. Wash full loads of laundry in cold water. Detergent, not hot water, cleans the clothes.
7. Reduce indoor heat by limiting cooking and the use of heat-producing appliances during the hottest parts of the day.
