# Chairman's and President's Report



Nobody knows you better than the friends and neighbors you grew up with, and, since 1939, Clinton County Electric has been growing up with you. We now serve 6,259 accounts

in Clinton County and parts of Fayette, Madison, Marion, St. Clair and Washington counties.

Clinton County Electric operates on a not-for-profit basis for the mutual benefit of its member-owners, and we are democratically governed by the membership. In short, Clinton County Electric is a business owned and controlled by you, the member.

You have the opportunity to become engaged in the democratic process controlling your cooperative by attending your Annual Meeting on Aug. 21. Matters of interest concerning your cooperative will be discussed, and you can participate in the election process for the Board of Trustees.

From the beginning, Clinton County Electric has had one central mission — to enhance the quality of life for our members. Your cooperative is committed to safe, reliable and reasonably priced electricity.

Clinton County Electric is a company that cares about the people it serves. That service goes a long way beyond keeping the lights on. It is neighbors helping neighbors. That is what it is all about — that is the electric cooperative tradition that started three quarters of a century ago.

Clinton County Electric has continued to develop our two main initiatives: “Enhance our Member Communications” and “Infrastructure Improvements.” We worked vigorously on these in 2024 and continue to work on further development of these initiatives in 2025. Remember, all initiatives we embark upon always have our members’ best interests in mind.

At the Dec. 17, 2024, regular meeting of the Clinton County Electric Cooperative (CCECI) Board of Trustees, the board approved the 2025 Operating and Capital Improvement Budget that incorporated the second and final phase of a new wholesale rate for the power we purchase from Southern Illinois Power Cooperative. The new wholesale rate is better aligned with today’s energy market and will give CCECI the ability to offer new types of rates and programs that will give the membership the ability to better manage energy costs. The board and CCECI management are committed to providing safe and reliable services to benefit our member-owners while maintaining reasonable rates and financial stability. Undoubtedly these topics and many more will be discussed at the upcoming Annual Meeting.

# Board Candidate Profiles

## District 1



**Brad Knolhoff** has been a member of Clinton County Electric Cooperative (CCEC) since 2013 and has lived on CCEC lines his entire life.

He resides north of Carlyle with his wife Erika and his sons, Bennett (10), Clark (8), Evan (6), Addin (4) and Wyatt (2).

Brad is a 2007 graduate of Ranken Technical College with a degree in electrical automation technology. He later returned to Ranken and received a bachelor's degree in management in 2015. For the past 17-plus years, he has been employed by a global leader in electrical safety, Underwriters Laboratories (UL). With UL, he has worked as a field engineer and most recently as a program/project manager and field supervisor.

In 2018, Brad was elected to the Clinton County Board. In 2022, his fellow board members unanimously elected him Chairman of the Board. In the past six years, he has overseen more than \$10 million of capital projects, negotiated agreements benefiting Clinton County more than \$2 million, and has implemented budgets that have decreased the county's property tax levy each of the past four years.

Brad's intent is to ensure the success of his community. He currently serves as treasurer of Carlyle North Water District, on the St. Mary's Church Finance Council and on the St. Joseph Hospital Foundation Board. Brad has previously served as the president of the Clinton County Township Officials Association and as a member of

the Clinton County Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee.

When Brad was asked for his reason for running for the CCEC Board, he stated: "I have the skills required to help the cooperative improve every aspect of its day-to-day operations. But most importantly, we are at a stage in Illinois where board members cannot just 'show up.' Board members must be engaged and be able to use their resources to ensure the future success of our cooperative. If the cooperative does not take a proactive approach in lobbying for good energy policy within the state, our members will suffer from high rates and an unreliable electrical grid. I have the desire, resources and skillsets to ensure Clinton County Electric is a leader in energy policy in Illinois."

## District 1



**Cary Dickinson** has represented District 1 as a trustee of the Clinton County Electric Cooperative (CCEC) Board since 1996.

He was a previous chairman of the CCEC Board and a previous treasurer of the Association of Illinois

Electric Cooperatives (AIEC) Board of Directors. Cary has completed two years as chairman of the Southern Illinois Power Cooperative (SIPC) Board, where he still serves as a director.

After many hours of training, Cary is a National Rural Electric Cooperative Association Credentialed Cooperative Director,

earning his Board Leadership Certificate and is "Director Gold" status.

Cary and his wife Sharon live in Hoffman. They are the parents of two sons, Kyle of Nashville, Tenn., and Brett of Hoffman, Ill. They have two grandsons and two granddaughters. Cary retired from Monken Chrysler Dodge Jeep Ram and Nissan in Centralia.

## District 2



**Justin Detmer** - A lifelong resident of Clinton County, Justin Detmer is proud to seek election to represent District 2 on the Clinton County Electric Cooperative (CCEC) Board.

He and his wife Lisa live in rural St. Rose, where they are raising their four children. Deeply rooted in his community, Justin has long demonstrated a commitment to service through leadership roles in several local organizations. He has been a member of the St. Rose Fire Protection District for 25 years, serving as Assistant Chief for over a decade.

In this capacity, he has helped secure grants, managed departmental projects and worked alongside District trustees on budgeting and tax appropriations.
