This year's fair is scheduled for Sept. 11 and will endeavor to educate youth at a critical age, when they are just starting to be given more freedom to be independent and handle situations on their own. Past sessions have focused on bicycle safety; farm safety; how to make a 911 call and the interaction with an ambulance and its crew; ATV safety, including the importance of wearing proper safety gear; boating safety and how critical it is to wear the correct size life jacket, as well as other boating safety techniques. The presenters do a fantastic job of engaging with the students. Some bring games to play and also have prizes to win! Presenters allow kids to ask questions while helping them to understand the need to be safe. **6814-16**

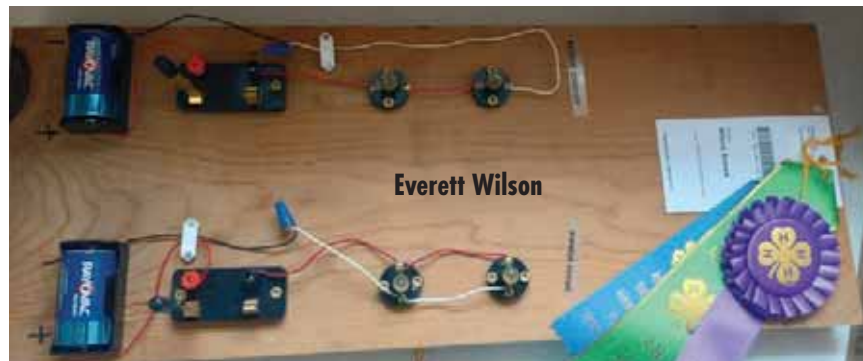

WIEC board approves capital credit retirement

Manager Todd Grotts is pleased to report that the WIEC Board of Directors has once again approved capital credit retirements for this fall. A refund amount of \$325,000 was approved during the budgeting process for this year. This will retire the remaining capital credits for 1995 and a majority of 1996. The board (directed by co-op bylaws and separate co-op policy) can only approve the retirement of capital credits when it will not adversely impact the cooperative's financial condition. Keep your eyes out for checks to arrive toward the end of September or early October. **861-22-1**

Capital credits represent the cooperative members' equity in (or ownership of) their cooperative. Your credit for a specific year reflects your individual portion of any margins (aka profits) earned that year by the cooperative.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIP OF THE MONTH

Take advantage of "shoulder months," which refer to the transitional periods between peak heating and cooling seasons. During the fall, these milder weeks typically occur between September and November. Shoulder months offer a great opportunity to reduce home energy consumption as the need for extensive heating or cooling is reduced. Look for simple ways to boost indoor comfort without running your heating and cooling system. Use ceiling fans and open windows on breezy days to ventilate your home. On cooler days, add a layer of clothing and avoid running the heat. **8613-56-1**



FARM SMART:

5 Safety Tips for Kids



Farms and ranches are full of valuable lessons — but also serious risks, especially for kids. More young people die working in agriculture than in all other industries combined, often due to taking on tasks beyond their abilities.

Five ways to keep kids safe around equipment, animals and chores:

- 1 Keep kids off tractors.**
Tractors cause more than 40% of fatal farm accidents involving children. Most kids are not tall or strong enough to operate them safely. Only let youth operate tractors if they meet age, size and maturity guidelines.
- 2 Supervise and restrict access.**
Never leave young children alone near work zones. Lock or fence off danger zones like grain bins, pens and machinery.
- 3 Assign age-appropriate chores.**
Match tasks to age and maturity. Teens may take risks, so set clear rules and supervise closely.
- 4 Create a safe environment.**
Eliminate slip hazards, lock up keys, limit heavy lifting and provide protective gear like gloves, non-slip shoes and hearing protection.
- 5 Model safe behavior.**
Teach tasks step-by-step and demonstrate safe habits — kids learn by watching adults.

Make safety a family priority so future generations can enjoy the rewards of farm life with less risk.
