Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is a mental health condition that is caused by an extremely stressful or terrifying event. According to the National Center for PTSD, an estimated 7% of veterans have experienced PTSD at some point in their life after returning home from war. On average, 22 veterans per day commit suicide.

Gary Shuck, an Assumption native, served in the Vietnam War from 1966 to 1967. "I never brought up anything to do with the war for 20 years," he said. "On a Monday I was in Vietnam and by Wednesday I was sitting at the supper table with my wife and folks."

Over the years, he has researched PTSD extensively, trying to better understand it. "They didn't 'deprogram' us when we came home from the war. A lot of the things we saw doesn't just go away once you get home," he explained. "You never forget what you saw and experienced. Anything can trigger it, whether it's a song, date, the weather, that's just how PTSD works."

After being home from Vietnam for 30 years, Gary got diagnosed with cancer caused by Agent Orange, which is an herbicide and defoliant used by the U.S. military during the war to remove

vegetation. "You know, you work hard, raise a family, and work multiple jobs when all of a sudden the doctors say that you have cancer and are going to die," he shared. Shortly after he received the news from the doctor, the animal shelter called him about a dog they had and wanted to know if he was interested in adopting her. "That dog taught me more about loyalty than anyone ever had," he laughed. "Dogs don't care what

your problems are, they are a comforter and can sense so much about a person."

Throughout the next couple of years, Gary began studying service dogs and how they can help people. One Sunday at church, the sermon was called "What Breaks Your Heart," which really inspired Gary to start Soldiers and Dogs. He began forming a board of directors, went through the steps of forming a nonprofit, and spent a year

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
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



and a half learning how to be a dog trainer with his dog, Lieutenant Dan (LT). In 2017, Soldiers and Dogs was officially established. Their mission is to pair veterans with service dogs, and the goal is to prevent suicide for those who suffer from combat fatigue, depression, isolation, and other issues.

Gary focuses on training the veterans who will be receiving a service dog. They must provide Gary with a DD214, which is a discharge paper that shows if they had an honorable discharge. He then schedules 1:1 visits with the veteran, as well as home visits to make sure that the dog will have a good home. Over the years, Gary has kept in contact with every person who has received a dog.

TW Houk and his daughter Avery focus on dog training and initial obedience. "Dogs are easy conversation pieces," TW shares. "They always know how you are feeling, most times even before you know how you're feeling." TW and Avery normally get the dogs at around 5-6 months old and spend time doing informal obedience with treats and formal obedience with consequences. "Most of the biggest battles don't happen overseas," he said. "They happen once the soldiers get home and try to adjust back to regular life."

Mandy Shuck-Moore, who is the daughter of Gary and Rosie, got enlisted to help in the beginning. "The biggest job initially was

to raise awareness," she shared. "My sister Tricia was teaching at Central A&M, and I live in Mt. Zion, so it was a great way to tackle different areas." "We all have our jobs. Tricia approaches everything from the perspective of the children of veterans, while my mom (Rosie) approaches everything from the perspective of wives of veterans," she said.

Now, eight years into Soldiers and Dogs, Gary has paired many dogs to

help veterans and has given over 100 presentations. "When I take my last breath, what matters most is that I can tell myself I made a difference. I think that's what it's all about," he shared.
