## Building Local Connections with the Next Generation

Nearing the midway mark of the school year, the CEO (Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities) programs, unique in their focus on life, business, and leadership skills, are in full swing. The Morgan-Scott, Greene-Calhoun, and Pike programs, each with their distinct approach, consist of 62 students representing more than a dozen schools in our service territory. The

CEO program's goal is not just education but also forming a close bond with their community.

"The CEO program continues to experience remarkable growth and success in our region. This year, Morgan-Scott CEO class includes 29 students

representing five high schools, while the Greene-Calhoun CEO class includes 25 students from four area schools. With a combined total of 54 participants, the largest enrollment in program history, these students are engaging in hands-on entrepreneurial experiences, developing leadership skills, and building meaningful connections with local business and community leaders that strengthen the economic future of our rural communities," said Jennifer Sellars, the Morgan-Scott and Greene-Calhoun CEO program facilitator.

The facilitator of the Pike CEO program, Colin Kutchy, is pleased with how the year is going. "It's been a busy but productive first half of Pike CEO for the students so far. They had a successful Name Badge business and are moving into their class business while learning from local business owners throughout the county. It's shaping up to be a very good year for our students and I'm excited to see what they continue to achieve."

The co-op helped start the Morgan-Scott CEO program 12 years ago, with

Greene-Calhoun and Pike programs following two years later. The impact of these programs is significant, as they aim to help retain young people in our service territory by introducing them to the opportunities right in their backyards.

As part of this, students in the CEO program hear from more than 50 local professionals and business owners from their communities who share their career journeys, experiences, and lessons learned along the way.

These connections help students develop professional networks, sometimes leading to internship opportunities and ongoing mentorships. "The CEO programs in our area have been very popular and received great support from our communities. Through this program, local students are gaining a better understanding of the region and the opportunities it can offer. We have a growing number of CEO alumni who have chosen to come back to the region to live and work," said Shawn Rennecker, Economic Development Director and chairman of the Pike CEO board.
